The 1950 season in Michigan was "ideal" for rust, according

to Turner, who pointed to high moisture and humidity and a late

crop. Damage, however, was relatively small for all grains, amounting to less than one percent of the crop. Most of that came in late maturing fields.





The whole order of things has changed. We have made the world over. Your children are now learning the fundamentals of education much faster than you or your grandparents did.

"Let's get rid of the frills of education, did some one ask? With every boy and girl a potential automobile driver, sitting back of a steering wheel of a machine that has 110 or 120 horespower under the hood, is the school driver-training course a frill or a responsibility?

"Mother nature is an outdoor school house, one of the best there is in the world. We all profit by what it teaches. Our grandparents had the advantage of it, but do our children get their rightful share of it? Only those who can through some good fortune attend a summer school camp, have the advantages of nature study. The great mass of children who grow up in Detroit don't get it-and it is a tragedy. Is such out-door training a frill?"

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Indoor Plants Meed Good Soil For Survival

Green growing plants add much to the beauty and enjoyn of the home. Success or taiture in growing indoor plants s often determined by the growing medium-that is the soil and

The soil must be in a good physical condition and have the capacity to hold moisture and yet provide good drainage. This kind or roil can be made by mixing three parts of loam soil; one part of decomposed organic matter such as peat moss, composted ma-terial or leaf mold; and one part of sand. Into this mixture add I tablespoonful of complete plant food for each gallon of soil. Gravel or small pebbles and a little sand should be placed in the bottom 1 to 2 inches of the window box or pot before the soil is added. This is a very important requirement and should not be omitted, since the lack of proper drainage is one of the most common reasons for failure with indoor plants.





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

No. 2, Plymouth, Michigan, until 7:00 o'clock P.M., Eastern Standard Time, on December 17,1950, or they may be personally presented at the Hough School at the southwest corner of Haggerty and Warren Roads, Canton Township, Wayne County, Michigan, on the same date, at 8:00 o'clock P.M., after which time no further bids will be received. All bids will be publicly opened and read at the latter time and place.

Said bonds will be dated September 1, 1950 and will be in the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, and will be numbered consecutively in the direct order of their maturities from 1 to 20 both inclusive, and will bear interest from their date at a rate or rates not to exceed 4% per annum, expressed in multiples of $\frac{1}{4}$ of $\frac{1}{6}$. 

This Is No Time to Build Rental Units

Note that I advise building now only if you want a home to live in I do not believe it is wise to build homes to rent at this time. Thus, it appears that rent controls are here to stay for awhile longer and may even be tightened in some strategic areas. Certainly, events since June 25th clearly indicate that substantial relaxation of these rent controls is now unlikely, and sharper restrictions may be invoked if the unpaid; it is only deferred, and war should spread.


