NO ONE FOR INTERFERENCE.

Great wars, like great football games, depend much upon the help we get-from the interference that enables us to cover the ground we need to cover if we are to reach the

Some months ago we made comment in this column complaining about the lack of help, or interference that our allies were not providing.

Our information at that time was gained from Washington news dispatches.

But in recent weeks some Washington columnist who has access to the records, took the time to search out just how much help we have had from other United Nations in

our Korean struggle. We were amazed at how little it has been. We were under the impression that it was far in excess of what has been provided.

Following is what this able Washington correspondent reveals about our United Nations help:

India has sent no troops, one field ambulance unit, and negotiations are under way for 400,000 jute bags.

Ethiopia has offered \$100,000 and 1,000 men. Neither offer Denmark sent one hospital ship, medical supplies and 500

tons of sugar. Norway sent a few merchant ships, no fighting men.

Sweden sent one hospital unit. Australia has 1,000 infantry men in Korea, 40 fighter planes, two destroyers, one frigate and medical supplies.

Greece sent 800 troops, six planes. Canada sent 15,000 fighting men, one air transport squadron, three destroyers. She has 10,000 men in training.

Turkey has one infantry combat team of 5,000 men in action. Belgium has 1,000 men, enroute to Korea, plus 400 tons of sugar and medical supplies.

The Netherlands sent an infantry battalion and one

France has supplied an infantry battalion of 1,000 men, one gunboat and medical supplies. England has 6,000 ground troops in the area, one aircraft

carrier, four cruisers, seven destroyers and eight frigates. The bulk of all the forces of the countries listed above stayed at home. Only the United States stripped itself of fighting men for the war in Korea, to the tune of 100,000 soldiers and marines.

George C. Williams, retired New York state college president and for the past dozen years or so leader of the famed William Jenaings Bryan Bible class of Miami, took an odd way recently to tell everal hundred Rotarians his impressions of European people he ained during an eight months' trip he recently completed through

He said he wasn't going to make a speech-but instead proposed o try and answer questions that were asked him about the people

and conditions as he found them on the other side of the Atlantic. The very first question was about France-would France help is in case of war? His answer was definitely NO. There is really no government in France he said. It is ruled by a dozen or more parties and from his conversations with American officials and peo-ple living in that country, he gained the impression that all France wanted was what it could get out of America.

Speaking of the English people and not the English officials. had done to help England. In every way possible, he declared, they tried to impress upon him their gratitude for what the aid given by ne United States has done for them. There will be no question about English help in case of trouble, he said. In Italy, a country America has done more for than any other place on the continent, there was not the slightest gratitude expressed for anything this country had done - the people care nothing about their government and seemed perfectly willing to let any group, Communist or otherwise, try to un it. There will not be the slightest help from Italy, he believes.

Smaller nations on the continent can be expected to give some nelp. His impressions were not gained, he said, from a sight-seeing bus, but from contacts with the type of people who make up cities like the smaller communities of these United States. He branded Italy as a spineless, ungrateful country. In Spain there was but one thing that impressed him-and that was the poverty of its people. What might be expected of Spain, he declared he could not find out.

As much space, if not more, is devoted in Florida newspapers to its gambling problem than to the threat of another world war. But that is not surprising, as the newspapers of Florida are trying to drive out the racketeers, mobsters, and others of their kind who have invaded this state in recent years.

One can realize just how bad the situation is by one incident recently revealed in the senate crime inquiry. Miami had asked the Governor of Florida to send a special investigator to look into the crime situation of this city. What did the Governor's personal investigator do? He helped a Chicago gangster to "muscle in" on the Miami Beach gambling racket. The president of the Miami Crime Commission recently asserted that seventeen billion MORE dollars were spent last year in gambling in these United States than was spent on national defense.

Delas W. Rentzel, chairman of the Civil Aeronautics Board in Washington, while in Florida, recently making an inspection of the civil air bases in this state, declared that "business as usual is right out of the window." "It might be," he added, "that it has been, ever since Franklin and Harry had anything to do with it."
