One never knows. It was indeed shocking news when the phone rang last week-end and we were advised that Eugene Orndorff had died suddenly while on a brief visit with friends down in Ohio. He loved his party as he did his old home, where he lived as a boy and was indoctrinated with his strong political beliefs.

Some years ago while on a fishing trip up in northern Canada with Jack Taylor and the writer, we three stood on a rock below some falls when "Gene" suddenly slipped. He was saved from dropping some 15 feet into the foaming water below the falls when Jack fortunately grabbed him and we pulled him back to safety. He said he couldn't understand how it was that two Republicans would want to save a Democrat from drowning.

He was devoted to his home as well as his friends. Gene was a good citizen, a citizen who believed it was almost his sacred duty to vote in every election. To Mrs. Orndorff we extend our deepest sympathy. We will all miss him—miss his kindly, friendly argumentative ways ever so much.

## OUR SUPREME COURT.

The people of this great state of ours can give themselves a big pat on the back over the results of the recent state election.

On the final day of reckoning we must never overlook the fact that our peace and security lies entirely in the judgment of the members of the judicial branch of our government—both state and national.

## Eugene Orndorff Dies Suddenly on Trip to Ohio

Taken suddenly ill last Thursday night while visiting at the home of friends in Newark, Ohio, Eugene Orndorff, well known C & O locomotive engineer, prominent in Democratic circles and a charter member of the Elks lodge of Plymouth, died early last Friday morning. He had gone to Newark to attend a reunion of older C & O railway employees.

Although he had been taken to a hospital in Newark, attending physicians did not regard his condition as critical and Mrs. Orndorff who had remained at home at 14308 Northville road was not notified of his illness until after his sudden death early Friday morning.

It was in Newark where Mr. Orndorff was married to Marguerite Marcou March 21, 1911. He was employed as a railway engineer in that city for a number of years before being transferred to Plymouth in 1917.

Born in Martinsburg, Virginia November 7, 1882, the Orndorff family moved to southern Kentucky when he was a small child. He lived in Kentucky until he became a railway worker. His devotion to the southland seemingly increased with the passing years.

Besides being a charter member of the Elks lodge, he was a longtime member of the Brotherhood of Railway Engineers of Toledo and a member of the First Presbyterian church of Plymouth.

Besides Mrs. Orndorff, two sisters, Mrs. Louis Miller of Louisville, Kentucky and Mrs. Charles Smith of Harrodsburg, Kentucky, and a brother, Frank Orndorff of Louisville, survive. Mrs. Winfield Owens of Billings, Montana, a sister of Mrs. Orndorff, has come to Plymouth to remain with Mrs. Orndorff for a number of weeks.

The funeral was held at the Criss Brothers funeral home in Newark Monday afternoon. Dr. M. E. Maharg of the First Presbyterian church of that city officiating. Burial took place in the Cedar Hill cemetery at Newark, a burial place the family had selected a number of years ago.

The Newark Elks lodge held special memorial services for Mr. Orndorff last Saturday evening at the request of the Plymouth lodge.

## Bebops, Midgets, Fido Pick Out Your Port Hole

Something new has been added to the high fence which surrounds the S. S. Kresge company's excavation for their new dime store.

Recently the company cut large size knot holes in the fence so pedestrians could watch the excavation and building operations in style. The holes were placed at different levels, for small, medium height, and tall passersby.

Now the fence has a new look! Last Thursday morning the company's painters started painting thick black frames around the port holes. The holes are also labeled to add a personal touch.

For instance, the names over the peek holes are Little John, Hep Cats, Shorty, Republicans, Democrats, Tom, Dick, and Harry, Small Fry, Midgets, and Bebops. Grandpa, Grandma, Irene, Sally, Sue, Mike, Pat, Mom, Pop, Junior, Seniors, Sophomores, Fido, Pick pockets, Bookies, and We Willie.

Now Plymouth residents who belong in any of those classifications can just pick out their private port holes and peek.

What do you see when you look through the large size knot holes?

Curious passersby will see a crew of workmen busily at work laying pipes and putting in concrete walls. The fascination of constructing a new building has held the interest of millions of people from the ages of 7 to 70 throughout history.

This holds true also in Plymouth where pedestrians of all ages can be seen at all hours of

day watching the excavation proceedings with great interest.

Usually organizations, when they are constructing a new store, set up a wall to prevent people from watching construction. But Plymouth pedestrians are fortunate in having a sympathetic organization like the S. S. Kresge company which has installed several conveniences for passersby.

Onlookers need not squint through a tiny, natural knot hole, straining their eyes to see something. No indeed! Plymouthites instead can look with ease through Kresge's large size knot holes.

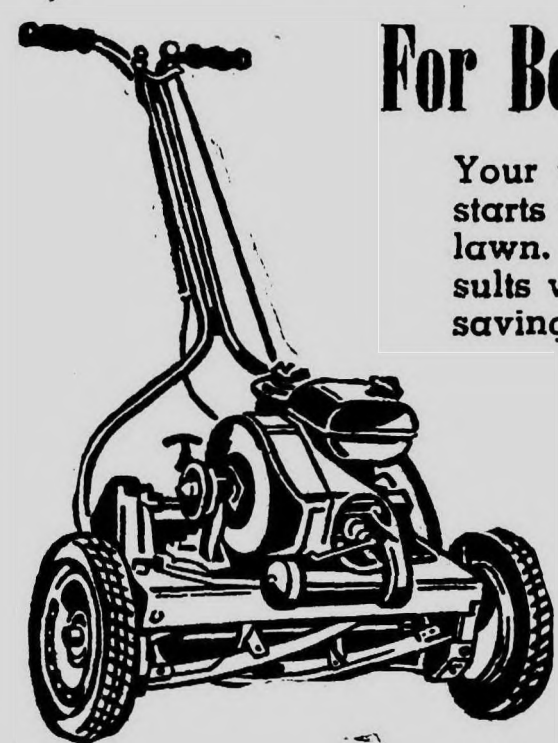

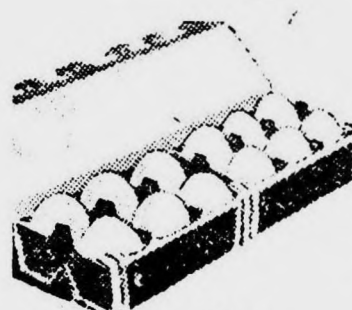

But that is not all. Through his direction and tireless efforts, the debt for this highly important venture now stands at less than a thousand dollars, which the new officers hope to pay off within the present year.

Members elected to fill the position that Dr. Champe thought he had held long enough, Gar Evans, another member of the club who has devoted much time to many of the activities of the organization.

Other officers elected at the annual meeting follow: vice president, Gayle Brewer; secretary, George Enot; treasurer, Norman Wilkinson; new members of the board of directors, John Jugua, Russell Powell, Bruce Road, Bert Coverdill, and Walter Beglinger. Hold-over members of the board are, Dr. Brick Champe, John Riser, Jack Miller, Ted Donathorn, Joe Elliott, and Kenneth Road.

The new members have decided that an immediate effort will be made to raise the \$800 or more necessary to wipe out the club debt so that future surplus funds can be used in making some necessary improvements about the club house and grounds.

The 40 acre tract, partly covered by heavy woods through which flows Tonquish creek, has untold possibilities for future development. Located on Joy road, just west of Wayne, an excellent parking area in front of the club house has been developed, but some members feel that the parking lot should be lighted as well as marked for car placements.

A bridge was erected some years ago across the creek which leads to the rifle range. The new officers hope to complete some of the improvements needed within the club house as soon as funds can be made available.

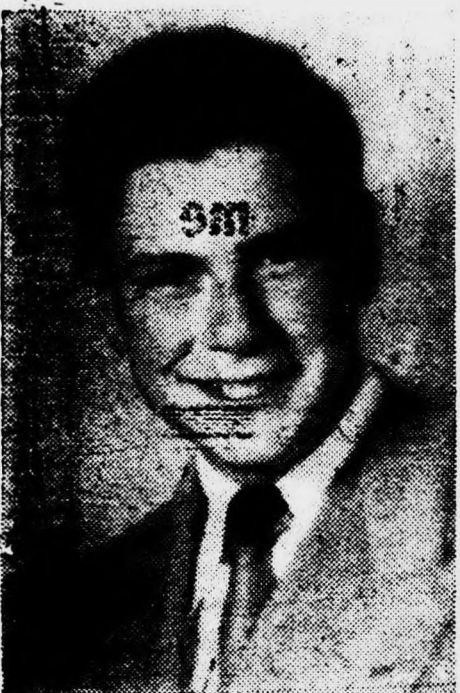

## Hints For Plymouth Homemakers

### Home Baked and Bakery Goods Show Variation In Price

If you wanted to serve cake for dessert, would the best buy be a "ready mix," a bakery cake, or home baking? For an economical breakfast would you choose an uncooked wheat cereal or oatmeal?

Cereal products account for about 11 percent of the average family food budget — a sizeable food group offering plenty of chances to save by careful planning and shopping.

Here are a few of the observations of typical food markets in Michigan.

On a weight basis there was a difference of as much as 5 1/2 cents a pound in the prices of uncooked cereals. They range from 12 cents a pound for oatmeal to 17 1/2 cents for a popular wheat cereal — a difference of about half a cent per serving.

The price range in the ready-to-eat cereals varied from 21 to 32 cents a pound — a difference of about 1 cent per serving. A serving of the higher priced ready-to-eat cereals would cost up to 2 1/2 cents more than a low cost uncooked cereal like oatmeal.

Another saving can usually be made by buying the larger packages of most items whenever storage space is available.

As for economy in the bakery vs. ready mix cakes question, we can take our choice. Bakery cakes cost from 41 to about 40 cents a pound, the mixes from 28 to 40 cents a pound. But many of the mixes require addition of ingredients, such as milk or eggs, at home. By the time cost of baking and frosting are added the ready mix cake is as expensive as the bakery cake.

The least expensive cakes, of course, are those made at home. Homemakers who have the time can turn out a home-made cake for about 26 cents a pound with an average recipe — a saving of about one-third.

Bread, however, can be bought for less than the cost of ingredients and fuel required for home baking. Here, home baking is largely a matter of preference with those who appreciate the flavor and aroma of the home-baked loaf.

Buy only enriched or whole-grain breads. The B vitamins, found in greatest abundance in our grain products, are necessary for healthy nerves. Bread made from enriched flour has been re-supplied with the vitamins lost in milling and bleaching processes. Uncooked and ready-to-eat cereals are also often enriched. Look for that information on the package label.

Cereal foods of all kinds are the source of our greatest supply of calories, about a third of the protein in our diet, iron, niacin, thiamine, riboflavin, and some minerals.

#### Fancy Sandwich Supper Party

Set up a sandwich counter for your supper party. On your biggest trays arrange an assortment of meats, spreads, preserves, cheeses and breads.

Place a completely garnished sandwich in the center of each tray as a sample and let your guests do the rest.

#### For Double Dockers

Use cottage cheese, minced chicken and half a pound of mayonnaise for a sandwich spread. For the other half of the sandwich use a combination of a cooked meat, both may be toasted or not.

Assemble and cut each sandwich in triangles holding them together with a toothpick topped with olives or tiny pickles.

#### Shrimp Spread

1 pound shrimp, cooked  
Salt  
Minced parsley  
1/2 cup softened butter  
Pound or grind shrimp several times with fine blade on food chopper. Blend with butter, parsley and salt to taste.



#### Meat Sandwiches

Cut and toast hamburger buns. Arrange on a tray with thin slices of baked ham or roast beef, cheese, sliced tomatoes and mustard. Radish roots, watercress and dill pickles make an attractive garnish.

#### Hearty Open-facers

Make one pattern using a slice of rye bread spread with butter and topped with two sardines and strips of pickle.

For the second suggestion on this tray use Vienna bread spread with peanut butter and topped with strawberry preserves.

Each guest will add to your ideas to make sandwiches that are really conversation pieces. A crisp tossed vegetable salad, hot potato salad and coffee will complete this fancy sandwich supper.

## Try Braising Pork Chops

In a covered frying-pan or in a casserole, versatile pork chops may be cooked either way. However, whether cooked on the range or in the oven, pork chops are prepared by the same method—by braising.

And whether cooking chops over a sweet potato and apple combination casserole, apple dressing or over scalloped corn or potatoes, they are first browned slowly in a frying-pan.

Next, the chops are arranged over the casserole, the cover of the utensil closely fitted and the dish cooked in a 350° F. oven.

The correct top-of-range method is an identical procedure. When the chops are browned, the utensil is tightly covered so the chops can cook in moist heat for 45 minutes to 1 hour, depending upon their thickness.

As well as various cooking possibilities, there are various chops from which to choose. There are the popular center cut loin chops which many homemakers are sure to purchase. Homemakers may also choose rib chops or the shoulder arm and blade slices which are actually steaks. These are all prepared by the braising methods and may be used interchangeably for range top or oven cooking.

## Roger Babson Says --

### Babson Discusses the Bond Market

New York City, April 12. New issues of corporate bonds bearing the highest interest rates since the late 1930's have just made the financial headlines. Business is paying more for its money, as well as for its wages and materials.

### Government Bond Market the Bellwether

Just as the old belled ram leads the rest of the flock, so does the government bond market point the way for corporate bond prices. About a month ago it was announced that the feud between the U.S. Treasury and the Federal Reserve had been ended. Both parties to the long disagreement had "reached full accord." Now, the thing upon which they had agreed was that a new issue of long-term government bonds should bear 2 1/2 percent interest instead of the 2 percent figure that had been the going rate for similar issues.

Immediately a tremor ran through the financial world. As it became clear that the Federal Reserve had really "won the argument" over raising interest rates, government bond prices softened. At the same time, corporate bonds began a price decline that is still in progress. Commercial bankers became frightened and have since been casting an increasingly wary eye

at all applications for loans. Even the stock market has lost its pep. A glance at the course of the popular stock "averages" will show you that, since early March, stocks have been reactionary. That is why I say: Watch government bond prices; they are bellwether for finance in general and for the bond market in particular.

### Possible Effects on Stocks

Going back through the years, you will find that a persistent and drawn-out decline in bond prices is frequently followed by a good-sized slump in stocks. Studies show that the time lag between the fall in bonds and the later descent in stock prices varies widely. Sometimes stocks follow bonds down only a few weeks later. At other times, close to two years have passed before stocks have taken a tumble. The reasons for this are not hard to find. As bond prices fall, the yield therefrom rises and narrows the gap between the return on bonds and the income from stocks. If the old relationship between the two is to be re-established, stock prices must decline. Only during periods of feverish speculative activity are buyers willing to overlook the need for getting a considerably bigger income from stocks, as compared to bonds, to "pay them back" for the greater risk that stocks carry.

### "Different This Time"

However, some of my friends tell me that it is going to be "different this time." They point out that the spread between stock and bonds yields, even after the recent rise in the latter, is much greater than usually exists. Therefore, they say, the return on bonds could rise quite a bit higher without greatly disturbing stock prices. They also cite the fact that very few stocks are being carried on borrowed money and that higher interest rates will not cause any amount of selling on that score.

These objections, may, of course, be right. But, I should like to leave this thought with you: When storm signals are flying, wise skippers heed them. Likewise, when old-time financial warnings appear, wise investors will diversify their funds carefully among sound, well-selected common stocks, and hold a sizable reserve in cash and high-grade short-term bonds against an "unexpected" shift in the trend.

### Advice on Bonds

My father told me years ago, "Never send a boy to do a man's errand." This advice fits today's bond buyer. Whatever you do, don't build an investment reserve of all long-maturity bonds, no matter how high the quality. A one-per-cent rise in interest rates can wipe out a number of years' income in the shape of a price fall in your long-term bonds. That is a risk you should avoid at all costs. In bond buying, stick to short-term governments, good convertible corporation bonds, and tax-exempt that you can hold to maturity.

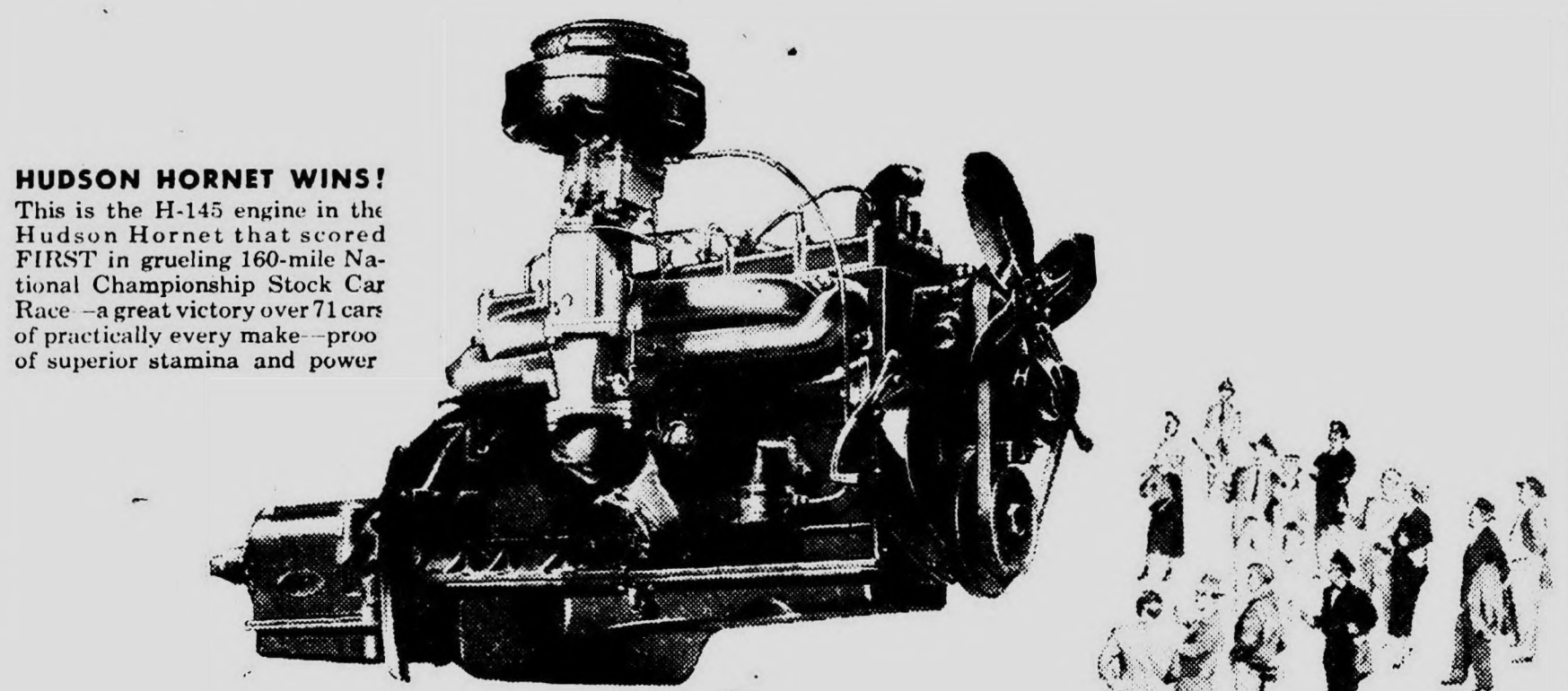
