Aid Residents on Social Security

Plymouth residents will be able to receive assistance in claiming Social Security benefits and information on the act's provisions from a representative of the social security Detroits Northwest office, who will be present at the Plymouth Post Office on the second and fourth parmit in many cases payments Thursday of each month from 9 a.m. to 12 noon.

Under the 1950 Amendments to the Social Security Act, social security wage credits are provided for active service in the military or naval forces of the U.S. during WW II.

'Many veterans or their famdies at still not aware of this provision in the new social security law," Clarence Mattson, manfocial security field office announced, "and as a result are not claiming or receiving social security benefits to which they are entitled to because of this credit for military service."

WW II veterans are given a wage credit of \$160.00 for each month of active military or naval service in addition to any wages paid to them for services in employment covered by Social Security.

These eredits are allowable regardless of whether (a) the veteran is alive or deceased; (b)

"The effect of this provision ir the new Social Security law," Mr. Mattson explained, will now to survivors of a veteran whose daim was previously disallowed because the deceased veteran died in service or more than three years after discharge, Also, many survivors of service men who may never have filed a claim, are now possibly eligible for monthly benefits.

KICKING OLD PEOPLE OFF JOBS.

Apparently we are not the only one who thinks the system of kicking elderly people out of jobs is entirely wrong. Comment about our reference to this subject in the last issue has been somewhat surprising.

A day or so ago in the mail came a letter from a well known citizen of Plymouth who is beyond the age of 70, but is as active in business as he was 30 or 40 years ago, in which be enclosed a clipping telling of a recent conference held in Washington when this subject was given much consideration. We are sure that you will read it with the same interest

that we did. It follows: A redesigning of the job opportunities of American business and a restatement of its personnel policy are necessary preliminaries if

Representatives of weltare, labor, business firms, church groups, and education gathered at the Waverly Building at Washington Following up the Washington conference on aging held last Augu t, the university's division of general education conceived an working needs of a steadily growing population.

While there were only a little more than 3,000,000 persons of 65 years or over in the United States in 1900, census reports show that i there are now more than 12,000,000 in this class and that the number is increasing. Dean Paul A. McGhee of the university declared. In New York State, the number of persons in this category has increased 269 per cent since 1900, according to figures quoted by Robert T. Lansdale, New York State Commissioner on Public Wel-

f conditions which deprive large numbers of older workers of opportunities for self-support, additional job opportunities will become available to our able-bodied aged," he pointed out.

"The possibilities of employment for the aged were demonstrated in the period 1941-1945, when, because of the labor market case load declined by nearly 20,000 cases during this period."

Much of the concern felt for the older jobless stays in the realm of sentiment or apologetics, Solomon Barkin, director of research for the Textile Workers Union of America, said in a plea for action. "Labor's position is that business enterprises are economic intitutions serving to sustain the society in which we live and per-

mitting it to share in the benefits. "Until business recognizes the problem sufficiently to adopt the policies which keep the older worker from being thrown upon the scrap heap, it will be under constant attack by the trade unions.
