

Hints For Plymouth Homemakers

Expect Top Year For Berries

Now that those tempting boxes of fresh strawberries are back many homemakers may like to quickly review how the supply situation looks for this season, how long the "season" will last, and when to expect the most reasonable prices.

From all appearances this is going to be a top strawberry year, both in supply and quality. and the price is expected to be reasonable.

The heavy marketing period may be longer than usual this year because many berries from the slightly late southern states crops will be reaching our markets after local harvests are well underway. But with Michigan being a leading strawberry state. the best "buys" should still be in the locally grown fruit.

The Michigan season, just getting started, will last until about the middle of July. We can expect rapid increases in supply in the next 10 days, with the peak of production from about June 15 to 25. This should be the time for most economical buying io: home freezing and preserving.

Most homemakers know what to look for when buying strawberries ... c'ear, moisture - free, firm berries with caps on. But quite often the berries are not handled properly at home, which raises the cost per perving of edible fruit.

These precautions are advised: Don't wash or stem berries until just before use, to avoid crushing and rapid spoilage. Store the berries in the refrigerator so they have plenty of air circulation. A tray or colander is a good storage container.

Strawberries are on one of our easy-to-freeze fruits. Sort, wash, hull and drain the berries thoroughly. They may be packed whole, cut or crushed, in a dry pack with or without sugar, or in a sugar syrup.

If sugar syrup is used, cover berries with a 20 to 30 percent syrup made by mixing 1 to 112 cups sugar with 4 cups water. Bring sugar and water to a boil and the berries. One part sugar mixed with 3 to 5 parts berries is the recommended dry sugar pack.

Remember that whenever you buy strawberries you're getting much more than delightful flavor and color for your money. Our shortcake favorite is an excellent source of vitamin C which we need daily in our diets.
