New Charter Eliminates Curb on Special Assessments

Take Away 25 Percent Limit and Need for Waivers from Residents

One of the most significant and far reaching changes in the new proposed city charter is the provision which takes away the 25 percent limitation on special assessments a city may levy against the residents for the cost of public improvements.

As it now stands in the old city charter adopted in 1932, the city can not levy a special assessment over 25 percent of the assessed valuation of prop-

But if residents wish to have public improvements such as sidewalks, paved streets, storm and sanitary sewers, curb and gutter, and water. For Next Year the cost of these improvements must be defrayed by special assessments.

However, under the old charter, if residents wish to have public improvements on their street - one property owner can stymie the whole program.

Waivers must be obtained from every property owner and person in the event that 25 percent of the cost of the improvement and outstanding special assessments.

The old charter states that the

city commission can not leave a special assessment over 25 percent of the assessed valuation of the property. "The public improve-ments program is held marin this way," said City Manager Glass-

"Let us take one example of Plymouth resident who owns home valued at \$8,000! The assessed valuation of that home would come to \$4,000, which is 50 to 60 percent of the home actual value. The city can only levy a 25 percent special assess ment of the assessed valuation of the property which would come

"If a typical Plymouth hom owner wanted installation of sidewalk, curb and gutter, stree pavement, water, storm and sani-

would total \$850. The special assessment of \$850 would come under the 25 percent or \$1,000 limitation. However on many of the streets there are vacant lots owned by out-of-town people, who do not care to be assessed for public improvements, These aut-of-town people will not sign waivers and the Plyntouth home-owners can not have their troit Times' Class "D" tourna public improvements, said City Manager Glassford.

With the 25 percent limitation of special assessments, the owner of a vacant lot valued at \$400 can not be assessed for a public improvement over \$100.

Urges Care in Rayon Storage

Pack away your winter rayons with care if you want them to be in good wearing condition next fall, advises Lola Belle Green of the Michigan State col-

lege of home economics.
Rayon garments require some extra care if they are to carry well through the summer storage

Posure the garments are clean before storing, Miss Green advises. Spots are harder to remove if they have become "set". Perspiration, if left, may affect colors. Rayon itself is immune to moths, but you will need to give garments made of rayon and

wool moth protection.

Guard against silverfish damage by airing and brushing stored rayons frequently. If you find any of these tiny gray insects with long feelers in your closest, remove the garments and spray with a liquid insecticide. Follow this with a dutisng of pyrethrum powder.

Do not store your acetate rayons in or near paper. It has been found that paper tends to speed up the gas fading (color change) that occurs in many acetate ray-ons. Wrap acetate rayons in old sheets, hang them in cloth bags or store them in wooden or metal containers.

Since falt and wool also tend to increase gas fading, it is important to keep stored acetate rayons away from these materials, Miss Green advises.

Several Methods Open to Farming

ed in farming? Many people are interested in this question these days says Warren Vincent, farm management specialist at Michigan State college.

Because most of the land in Michigan that is suitable for tarming is already in farms, opportunities for starting are limited largely to making the start on established farms, he points out. There remains practically no agicultural frontier in the state. Too often the prospective farm-er believes that the road of com-

plete ownership is the only way to go into farming. However, tarm prices continue high and few can afford to take this step. What remains? Vincent points out that many roads to farming are still open. For a person with little or no experience, work as a farm hand will provide an opportunity to learn the complex job of farming. It gives a chance to establish a reputation as a good tarmer, thereby leading to the opportunity to move onto a good farm as a tenant or owner when

eady for that step. The best move for some farm boys may be in a father-and-son partnership on the home farm if conditions are right for such a venture. The son gains exper-ience and the father can eventually retire.

Renting a farm offers a variety of ways to set up the farm operation. Several leasing arrangements are in common use, varying in the amount of capital

equired to go into farming.
Vincent suggests that prospective farmers talk with their local county agricultural agent. He will be able to give good suggestions on what to look for in a farm as to soils, buildings and
