### Architect Tells of Vacation in British Isles

"The people in England have s great deal of courage," said Thomas Moss, Plymouth architect, who returned recently from a month's visit in the British

"They have picked themselves up from the depths of destruction and the austere and rigid economy and have continued to go on with their daily lives, building up their communities again.

Mr. Moss said that the greatest damage in England during the last war was not caused by bombs but by fires which had spread quickly after a bomb hit a building. Insufficient and inadequate fire fighting equipment was the main reason why flames spread so rapidly. Mr. Moss eslimated that approximately 200,-000 homes were demolished.

"Although many of the bombed areas are being rebuilt, one can still see parts of London where buildings have been completely destroyed," said. Mr. Moss.



RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE USE AND OCCU-PANCY OF STATE LANDS Pursuant to the authority vested in the Commission of Conselvation by the provisiens of Act No. 17. Public Acts of 1921, as amended, the following rules and regulations are hereby made and

adopted concerning the use and occu-pancy of all state lands administered by or under the control of the Departby or under the control of the Department of Conservation.

It shall be unlawful:

1. To enter, use, or occupy state lands for any purpose when said lands are posted against such entry, use, or occupancy, as determined by the Director of Conservation.

To camp for more than 15 days without the written permission of an authorized representative of the Department of Conservation. To anchor or leave boats unat-tended overnight unless the ownre's name and address, in legible letters, is affixed to the boat.

To store or leave boats or lish shanties for more than 15 days

shanties for more than 15 days without the written permission of an authorized representative of the Department of Conservation. To leave unburied refuse and rubbish, including tin cans, bottles, and tish offal, or to deposit same in streams or lakes. Garbage pits or other recentaries must be used. or other receptacles must be used where available.

6. To build a fire without proper provision to prevent spreading, or to leave said fire without extin-

To peel bark from trees.
To remeve, destroy, mutilate, or deface posters, notices, signs, or markers of the Department of Conservation, or of any other agency of government.

ency of government.

To post, place, or, erect signs, to place or distribute advertising material, to erect a fence or barrier, to construct or occupy improvements, or to enclose state lands, without the written permission of an authorized representative of the Department of Conservation.

To use rakes, cradles, pickers, or other mechanical devices for the gathering of blueberries.
To use state lands for a commercial purpose without the written permission of an authorized representative of the Department of Conservation.

12. To graze state lands without the

permission of an authorized representative of the Department of Conservation.

These rules and regulations shall be in force and effect until May 1, 1961.

# He gets a picture of the weather by Long Distance

Tomorrow's weather is on the wires today for the forces which guard the nation's skies' and shores

Today the largest Long Distance network of its kind brings them detailed "isobar" weather charts around the clock.

These charts are sent by a system known as "facsimile" from the Weather Analysis Center in Washington, D. C. There, an electric eye scans the weather "picture" as it turns on a special drum. The signal waves produced go out over thousands of miles of wire to military installations throughout the country where the picture is automatically reproduced.

. This weather network was designed and completed in less than two years. It's another demonstration of the importance of Long Distance lines to the security of the nation - especially right now, when there may be stormy weather ahead.
