Incomplete information released from non-official sources indicates that the City may embark on a "remodel the city hall pro-

This proposal, first discussed in May 19 city commission meeting, was made by City Manager

Though it was tabled for later action, sources indicate a State architect is already laying a master plan that "would be drawn up to cover the future development of the city hall."

Suggestions so far heard indiate the "piecemeal" remodeling would be accomplished a "roomor-two" at a time. First on the alleged remodeling schedule are the police office and squad room, and the city clerk's office that will be relocated to a point ad-



Fire Chief Pleads With Motorists to 'Give Us Chance'

Police and fire departments are keeping a wary eye on "curious" motorists following fire trucks close behind as firefighters answer fire alarms in the City.

The reason for this is "because too many motorists are either failing to yield the right of way to fire trucks or speeding behind trying to beat the truck to the fire," asserts Fire Chief Robert McAllister.

"Firemen's lives are being unnecessarily endangered by such motorists and curious onlookers,' Chief McAllister says.

He pleads with such motorists to observe "the rules of the road, helping fire fighters speed to the scene of a fire that may be endangering someone's life or prop-

This latest plea from the fire chief was backed up with a warn ing from Police Chief Carl Green lee, who says that motorists impeding fire trucks going to the scene of a fire "are violating the law and liable to fine or court

This plea and warning comes as a result of a June 30 fire at Wall Wire Products company, 11333 General drive.

The 7:30 p.m. blaze was touched off when acetylene and oxygen storage tanks caught fire, causing nearly \$300 damage.

Quick action by Plymouth township and City firemen, who arrived after evading curious motorists, saved the blaze from causing a "100-to-one-chance"



"Antiquated" Pumpers Seen as Threat to City Fire Safety

(Continued from Page 1) igan instructor- who, earlier, between 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. severely criticized Plymouth's fire fighting equipment as "substandard and hazardous to public fire safety."

During an inspection here, in April, Fire Marshall Walter Gannon stressed the need for a new fire truck and submitted a revised "sleep-in" plan for firefighters on night duty.

Though two months have passed, the revised "sleep-in" plan and new fire equipment suggestions have not been adopted by

Fire Chief McAllister outline his plan for a northside fire station, disclosing its approximate cost of \$6,000. The new station, would house one fire truck that would serve the north part of the city, at a location not yet named,

Its probable staff of fire fighters would not be noticeably increased over the current number, he predicts, emphasizing that the added protection would outweigh "sun-

"The new firefighting equipment would be the most modern. up to-date ladder-pumper truck available. The ladder would be hydraulically lifted and the pump would "spurt" 750 to 1,000 gallons of water a minute through the fire hoses at high pressure.'

Once purchased by City, the fire chief believes the new fire truck would provide "adequate fire protection" for the 7,300 Plymouthites, who now have three "antiquated" fire trucks protecting their property.

Present fire fighting equipment being used by the City consists of fire truck number one- a 1937 pumper, rebuilt by firemen at a cost of \$750. A week ago this truck was "out-of-service" for several hours with electrical

Fire truck number two is a 'loaner" from the State fire marshall. It was used during the war by the Office of Civilian Defense and could be recalled to be used elsewhere. The third truck is one of 1925 vintage.

Fire Marshal Gannon, who earher examined this truck calling it "inadequate and not dependable" cites his revised "sleep-in" plan that calls for three to four firefighters sleeping nightly in the 530 Holbrook firemen's barracks.

"This would be a distinct advantage during the first five min-

utes of a fire," he is disclosed to have said. "The first five minutes are extremely important- a fire is either won or lost during this crucial period," he declares, marshall— a University of Mich- warning that most fires take place







Services Held for Check Reveals Albert Otto to Machinery Value Speak at Rotary

Overhead costs of owning a lot of high-priced farm machinery can eat up the profits of a harvest

On the other hand, failure to plant or harvest a crop at the right time because of a lack of the right machinery can greatly reduce the cash farm income. That makes ownership of farm machinery largely a problem of individual management— there needs to be some balance between expenditures for machinery and cash income.

There are several factors to take into consideration in deciding how much machinery to buy. They are volume of business, labor available, availability of custom equipment, physical handicaps and pride in owner-

Volume of business and pride in ownership often go together. Purchase of a new three-plow tractor may be necessary to increase the tillable acres on the farm, even though the purchase might not be justified from the standpoint of present income.

Costs per hour for using farm equipment decreases as the numper of hours of use increase. Farm tractors should be used in the neighborhood of 500 hours per year to reduce the hourly overhead cost to an economic level. Other farm equipment should be used in the neighborhood of 100 hours per year.

Here's a handy rule of thumb to figure cost of owning machinery. In terms of dollars a new machine will cost the owner approximately 15 per cent of the purchase price each year for 10 years running. For example, a \$1,000 machine would cost the owner about \$150 a year to own.





Postage rates on all bulk third class mailings were increased as

The minimum charge per piece

In determining the pound or room and grill, which the City piece rate for circulars, miscellaneous printed matter, merchandise, and the like, if 14 pieces weigh 1½ pounds or less the piece rate of one and a half cents applies. If each piece exceeds 1.714 punces, the 14 cents a pound rate shall be used. For books and catalogs having 24 pages or more, at least 22 of which must be if 10 pieces weigh one and a half pounds or less the piece rate of one and a half cents applies. Otherwise, the 10 cents a pound rate is applicable.

"In no instance shall the postage on such mailings be less than one and one half cents for each piece," stated Mr. Timpona.

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Homegrown Raspberries Available Soon

Tempting boxes of fresh raspberries and blueberries are ap-BRIDE'S DINNER FOR TWO pearing in the markets. Homemakers who are planning to can or freeze some for later use will be eager to know when these will be at their best in quality and plentiful in supply.

Michigan will have about an verage crop of red and black raspberries. The Michigan season runs about July 15 to September 15 with the peak of the crop coming between August 1 and September 1. The berries on the market now are shipped in from the

The homegrown crop of raspperries will give the best quality and be less expensive than those hipped in, because raspberries re a very fragile fruit and deteriorate very quickly. For top flavor and quality, they should be canned, frozen or made into jam or jelly soon after picking.

Choose raspberries that are plump, free from green and stem caps. Caps indicate the berries ere under-ripe. Watch for stained boxes as this indicates over-ripe or crushed berries. Fresh, quality berries will also have a slight gloss. Old or over-ripe berries are full in appearance.

Because berries lose their qualty rapidly, they must be kept refrigerated. Store them so the air chor a slice of onion and a slice of the berries.
