In obedience to the decree issued by Emperor Augustus that a census be taken of the whole world, Mary and Joseph left Nazareth to register in Bethlehem because they were of the house and family of David. There was no acclaim for Mary, Joseph, and the unborn Child when they journeyed to Bethlehem; nor any room space for them that evening when they arrived there.

Room? Yes, the ox and the ass are making room for Him, their fodder will make His first bed, and the Babe, their Creator, shows His gratitude by allowing His Mother to lay Him in their manger.

And so it was in a stable that room was made. There, Mary saw His face for the first time, clasped Him to her heart and adored Him. However, she does not continue to hold Him, for He is not only Hers, He belongs to the world, and His lot is to suffer for its redemption. So, there is room for Him on earth, for the Mother makes room for Jesus wherever She is welcome.

> O holy Child of Bethlehem Descend to us, we pray; Drive out our sin and enter in, Be born in us today.

With Mary and Joseph myriad of angels surround the Christ Child's manger-cradle exulting His birth, for He is their God, while other angels have been speeding as messengers to announce the "glad tidings of great joy," so that humanity could offer its homage. The Archangel Gabriel, descending from Heaven swifter than the lightning and more radiant than the sun, presented himself to three shepherds, keeping the night watches over their flock and announced the word so ardently desired for four thousand years-

"This day is born to you a Saviour."
Only three shepherds? Probably, for tradition and

other testimonials seemed to favor the sacred biblical number three. On the graven stones of the Catacombs we find three and only three shepherds. The paintings and inscriptions left by the first Christians relative to the birth of Christ represent three shepherds, never a greater number. In an Oriental manuscript preserved in the Grand Ducal Library of Florence, an illustration depicting the manger presents only three adoring shepherds. Their names, according to tradition, were Joseph, Jacob, and Isaac.

Then the whole hillside and even the air above was filled with angels singing their song proclaiming the twofold mission of the Babe-

What a privilege! Of all the human race those who merited to be the first to see the Christ Child were the poor, humble, and devout Shepherds of Bethlehem.

O God, give us, too, the simplicity of the shepherds that wherever and whenever You are born again into our lives in trying circumstances, we may at once say, "It is the Lord," and, kneeling adore Thee.

But is not the Christ-Child a king-the King of kings, in spite of His poverty? He puts a new star in the heavens and the three Wise Men from the East recall Balaam's prophecy:

"A star shall rise out of Jacob." (Apoc. XXII. 16) and they know that the star means the Messias. Following the star the Magi came to the stable and what did they find? The Child with Mary, His Mother. They come to see a King, they find, "a child and Mother poor," but they fall down and worship Him. They were kings, but from now He was to be their King and the King of all who diligently seek Him as they did. "And opening their treasures they offered Him

gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh."

(Matt. 11.11)

And the Babe was glad that His earliest gifts should remind Him of the great work He had come to do, as king, priest, and man.

Oh, great Wise Men, pray for us that like you we may be faithful to our stars, that we may be constantly found at the feet of the Holy Child offering our gifts and that we may never shirk the Cross, but always take the way indicated by God.

We freedom-loving Americans appreciate the privilege of commemorating the Birthday of the Christ Child by setting up creches in our churches, homes, lawns campuses and parks. But who planned the first outside crib? No one else, but St. Francis of Assisi, "the Apostle of Pure Joy," who lived always, so to speak, in sight of that wonderful vision of beauty and goodness, the Divine Babe of Bethlehem, Incarnate Love made man to save men.

"I wish to keep Christmas Night with you," said St. Francis to his devoted friend John of Grecio, a man of noble birth and no less noble mind. "You shall choose a place in your woods—a cave or grotto, if there is one; put into it a manger filled with hay, and bring an ox and an ass, in order that it may resemble as closely as possible the Stable at Bethlehem.'

On Christmas Eve, a procession of friars from neighboring convents, with the inhabitants of the surrounding villages, wound their way to the Crib bearing in their hands torches and lighted tapers. Tradition has it that during the adorable Sacrifice of the Mass celebrated in the grotto, St. Francis beheld an Infant marvelously beautiful in that manger and embraced Him with both arms as though He would awake Him from

The feast of the Nativity is essentially one of holy gladness, but how can we Christians, knowing that religion is the basic element of happiness and the first of all freedoms, look to the New Year with happy anticipation when religion is being suppressed and presecution is raging in so many countries? Let us pray that God will sustain these people in their time of trial that their happiness might be greater in their eternity of triumph.

As Cost of New Grade School

Following a special session of the Board of Education, Plymouth will get its new elementary school but at a slightly higher cost- \$432,628.96 to be exactsome \$7,628 more than earlier es-

The revised cost of the school represents the total of five low bids received for varying phases of construction and cost of equipping the 13-classroom building.

Superintendent of Schools Russell Isbister said that actual awarding of the bids has not yet been made. A special session of the school board on December 29 will be held to make the final awards. In the meantime, Isbister said that the architects, the Eberle M. Smith Associates, Inc., will examine the low bids.

A total of 37 bids were received by the time last Thursday's special school board meeting actually took place.

Tentatively, pending final approval, the architectural trades-bid will go to a Detroit firm House Causing Thomas-Wilson company, who quoted a low figure of \$305,874 for general contracting work, beating out six other competitors, one of whom bid a high \$370,140

Minute Steak Easy to Prepare

For the homemaker who works, cubed beef steaks may be a frequent purchase. These steaks, cut from less-tender steak, are put through a cubing process which shortens the connective tissue. Thus they may be cooked in only a short time for a tender

To obtain best results here's how to prepare cubed or as often termed "minute" steaks. First. dredge the steaks with seasoned flour. Then brown them in 2 or 3 tables soons of lard or drippings. When nicely browned on both sides, add just a bit of waterabout 1 tablespoon- cover the utensil closely and let the steaks cook for about 15 minutes.

Barbecued steaks are a variation in serving you'll want to try. Brown the steaks as usual. then add about 14 cup of barbecue sauce. Cover and cook slowly until the meat is tender. When prepared this way, cooking time should extend to about 50 minutes in order to obtain full flavor from the barbecue sauce. You might serve them with whipped potatoes, frenched green beans, peach and cream cheese salad and baked apples a la mode.

For extra fast serving, cubed steaks may be pan-fried. Dredge them with flour, then fry at a moderate temperature for 4 to 6 minutes. Turn occasionally so that they will cook evenly.

Pinksters

2 cup brown sugar

l egg yolk 2 cups sifted enriched flour

12 teaspoon salt egg white

12 cups chopped pecans 2-oz. jar seedless raspberry jam Cream lard until soft. Blend in sugar. Add well-beaten egg and egg yolk. Mix in flour and salt. Roll dough into small balls about the size of a walnut, Dip into slightly beaten egg white then roll in chopped pecans. Flace on greased cookie sheet and make a depression in the center of each ball. Bake 5 minutes in 300 F. oven. Remove from oven, press down center again. Continue baking for about 15 minutes. Cool slightly, then fill center with jam. Yield: 3 dozen cookies.



If everything goes well, Michigan could have a bridge across the Mackinac Straits by late 1956 or early 1957. After all the hullaballoo about the controversial span, such a statement might sound like a bit of winter wind, but progress now has reached final pre-

building stage.

"This scheme is a nation-wide problem, according to the National Better Business Bureau," Sibbold said. "The most effective way to stamp it out is for the public to know what the scheme is, how it works, and to report to us every instance of bait prac-

Labeled as typical "bait" offers by Sibbold are those of some firms engaged in the selling of rebuilt vacuum cleaners and sewing machines which feature famous brand names, ridiculously low prices, and all sorts of reinforcing inducements, such as 'free machines" to the first ten o respond.

Customers can easily detect bait and switch" selling methods, Sibbold said, by looking for three tell-tale signs. The first is 'knocking" of an offered rebuilt vacuum cleaner, sewing machine, etc., by the salesman after the consumer responds to the high pressure advertising. "He may

After making it clear that the advertised rebuilt cleaner is a poor bargain the salesman switches the customer's interest to a new one, much higher in price, and usually with a much less famous brand name than that of the rebuilt machine. From the start of the operation the intent of both the advertiser and his salesman has been to sell this new appliance. The "bait' was used to locate prospects, to get the salesman into the home for a demonstration or to bring the customer to the store.

> The second sure sign for the householder is evasiveness over delivery of the rebuilt appliance in case the customer insists on purchasing it. The National Better Business Bureau reports that salesmen who actually sell the advertised bargain often lose their jobs. So if they can't switch the customer to a new machine by running down the one advertised and building-up the new one they "just happened" to bring along, the customer is likely to find he can't have the rebuilt machine at any price.

This evasiveness, according to the National Better Business Bureau, takes several forms. The item is "sold out," and only orders against future delivery will be taken. Promise of a delivery date is purposelly vague. If the order is taken, persistent attempts follow to persuade the customer to switch to the new, and readily available, machine.

"Failure to obtain delivery is the third earmark of a bait operation," Sibbold said, and should also be reported whenever a firm engaged in promoting rebuilt appliances at ridiculously low prices, with all sorts of extravagant inducements to serve as

VA Set to Give **New Dividend** on GI Insurance

Plymouth ex-GI's along with some five million other National Service Life Insurance policies will be paid another dividend next year.

The first payment, the Veterans Administration said Tuesday, will be made in February. The size of individual dividends for most policyholders will be the same as this year's dividend, with the vast majority of men getting a

Totaling some 180 million dolars, this will be the second regular dividend on NSLI policies. Two special dividends have also been paid. Together the four total nearly four billion dollars.

Policyholders will receive their payments from 30 to 40 days after the anniversary date of their policy, the VA said. That's the date the policy first went into

To be eligible, the policy holder must have paid premiums for any three or more months between he anniversary date of his policy in 1952 and the same date in

The method of payment will be the same as this year unless the policy holder informs the VA he wants to be paid differently, by writing to the VA office to which he pays premiums.

If he holds a term policy, he can get the dividend in cash or he may tell the VA to apply it as advance premiums to his policy. If he has a permanent plan policy, he has these choices or he may ask the VA to put the dividend on deposit. That way it will draw three per cent interest and will be added to the cash value of the

The rate of dividend payment on most policies will be 50 cents for each \$1,000 of insurance for each month it was in force between the 1952 and 1953 anniversary date. Most term policies are

There are nearly 3,000 rates for dividend, payments for permanent plan policies, the VA said, and it's impossible to give a simple form-


The dividend will not be paid to servicemen who have waived their premium while in service. It will be paid, however, to servicemen who still pay premiums on their policies.





CREDIT THE PAGAN Druids for inspiring one of the nice Christmas customs—decorating with holly. The traditional holly for the holidays is widely believed to have had its origin in the Druid practice of bringing holly sprigs indoors. The Druids woodland spirits lived in the

Indoors, holly gave the spirits a nice warm place in winter. Besides, the lush green holly and the contrast of its red berries provided beauty that could be revered by men when the sacred oaks were shorn of their

The early Christian church frowned on such pagan customs and tried to stamp them out. In due time, however, it was felt that some of the customs could be adapted to the new Christmas conception.

Some beautiful legends associate the holly with Christ. In fact, it is often called the Christ thorn. One legend depicts the leaf spines as the crown of thorns; the red berries as the sins of the world and the blood of Christ. Another credits holly with first springing up from the footsteps of Christ. The plant is said to remain green all winter as a reward for once hiding Christ from his pur-

The impact of the holly on the Christmas celebration is evidenced in the traditional holiday colors, green and red. The Druids weren't the only people of old who thought the holly was something special. Pliny, the great Roman historian, insisted holly blossoms caused water to freeze. Also, that holly thrown at any wild beast would make it lie down tamely next to the branch.

These legends, forgotten by many people are said to be the reason we decorate with holly.

New Regulations Set Spring, Fall Bear **Hunting Dates in State**

Michigan's tangled bear policies got some straightening out during the December conservation commission meeting with a new set of simplified regulations to take effect in 1953 as a result of commission action.

Previously, the commission left regulation of bear pretty much to the discretion of counties involved. But recently, the resulting checkerboard pattern of regulations has caused numerous game and enforcement problems.

Starting with 1953, however, bear season will run Octobe 1-November 5 in the upper and northern lower peninsulas. Hunting will be authorized under a small game license with firearms or under an archery license with bow and arrow, and dogs will be

In the southern lower peninsula, the season will open the same day as the upland game or waterfowl season, whichever is earlier, and close November 5.

Also, hunting with firearms under a regular deer hunting license will be authorized during the regular November deer sea-

Two additional hunting periods are authorized in the upper peninsula; April 1-May 31, dogs not allowed, and August 15-September 15, dogs allowed. Female bears with cubs and cubs are to be protected during the first of

these additional hunting periods. A hunter will be allowed to take only one bear during a year and it will be unlawful after January 1 to take and keep a live bear except under permit issued by the conservation department.

To take full advantage of additional sanatoria facilities soon to be available for treatment of tuberculosis patients, efforts to find those persons with the disease in its earliest stages must be intensified, the state health department declares.

To assure maximum use of x-ray facilities, the state health department and the Michigan Tuberculosis Association are planning a cooperative program, whereby the tuberculosis association will assist in proving the promotion and publicity needed to get as many persons as possible to take advantage of the health department's mobile equipment.


The Michigan Tuberculosis Association has been giving active assistance to local health departments in promoting community x-ray surveys, but will step up its activities in this direction according to present plans.

Emphasis has shifted from x-raying specific groups, such as industrial workers, food handlers and county fair visitors, to a community-wide approach aimed at reaching everyone in the community over the age of 14.

She first came to Plymouth in her very young years with her mother and father from Detroit, who used the present Veterans' Memorial Foundation on Main street as their summer home. The family came to like Plymouth so well they moved here permanently and it was through the efforts of her father, Mr. L. C. Sherwood, that the present bank on the corner was founded. He later became Michigan's first banking commissioner,

being appointed by governor Hazen Pingree. Mrs. Cooper was one of the first young ladies from Plymouth to go east to attend boarding school and she returned here to marry Dr. R. E. Cooper who was killed many years ago in an auto crash on Plymouth road while she was traveling in Europe. Her activities in civic affairs, music, the D.A.R., the Woman's Club and her Church have spanned well over a half century in the community.

In a weak unguarded moment, Sterling Eaton with honeyed words, obtained my promise to conduct this column. Later I was appalled with the work involved — even though Ida Rose (Eaton) suggested the fitle of "Early Christmas Memories.'

Sending out an S. O. S. to my friends, Mrs. Bessie Dunning, Mrs. Otto Beyer, and C. H. Bennett, brought a wealth of interesting memories that I am happy to share with the readers of the Mail.

Mrs. Dunning spent a happy childhood on her father's 240 acre farm at the corner of Farmington and Merriman roads. It is now Rosedale Gardens.

Here are some of her memories: By Mrs. Dunning

Christmas Season was a happy time. Weeks ahead we would start to prepare the fruit for plum pudding. There were pounds and pounds of raisins to be seeded, currants to be washed and looked over, citron, orange and lemon peel to be cut in thin slices, suet chopped and dozens of eggs added. All this was done by hand. Enough pudding was made and put into different size bowls to fill a wash boiler. The bowls were covered with double factory that had been rubbed and rubbed with flour and then tied tight around the bowls so for the kitchen door and in the moment I shall never forget the water could not seep in while they were boiled five to six down he went. No thud as I expected because of the pillows hours over a wood fire. Enough mincemeat was made to last all winter. Again all the meat, apples and suet was chopped he went down. In falling his head struck the frame of the

in a corner of the garden. The leaves were gathered and left to dry. These were prepared by being rubbed and rubbed with the hands into a powder. Our seasoning consisted of sage, thyme, savory and marjoram. It was used to season poultry. fish, meat and dressing. We had a hop vine that came up every year that made our supply of yeast. The yeast was made by placing a certain amount of hops in a bag and boiling it with potatoes. Enough could be made to last for six weeks. A cup full would be used for a batch of bread. We baked twice a week and a dripping pan of current buns would be made at

the same time. The Christmas tree at the church was trimmed with homemade ornaments. Yards and yards of pop corn and cranberries were strung on cord, stars cut out of cardboard and covered with tin foil (that came around tea) cotton batting, pop corn balls and real lighted candles made as pretty a tree as any I have ever seen.

We hung up our stockings and would find in them candy, nuts, toys, sometimes a few pennies and an orange on top that was considered quite a treat. At the side of the stocking there would be something to wear that we needed.

We always went to grandmother's on Christmas Day for a wonderful feast, oyster stew, turkey with sausages around the outside, a big standing rib roast, creamed onions, squash, sweet potatoes, cranberries, mince pie and a plum pudding with brandy ablaze.

Early Memories of Christmas are told in Mrs. Bever' following letter:

"We didn't know him as Santa Claus, to us, he was al

ways pictured as the Christ Child. "One Christmas when I was four years old, the Chris Child left me a seven inch china doll—not dressed.

"My father was very sick and mother had to work is the store with brother Will to help. So mother explained tha later, when she had time she would make a dress-which she did. Mother always set a large bountiful table for ou.

"For four years I wished for a larger doll-before received one. Ever hopeful, my next wish was for a bicycle On Christmas eve I heard a door close-I just knew it had come-but I was to get my first big disappointment. No bike

"My saddest Christmas was when my older brother Louie, who had gone to Detroit to work for an uncle, couldn' come home 'til Christmas eve. He said he would take the Owl' (train) which would arrive in Plymouth at 4 a.m. We children ran down next morning to see him. Mother said 'He didn't come,' but we saw the bed clothes wiggling and there he was! His gifts to us were handkerchiefs. (I still have mine). To brother Albert he gave an air gun. Next morning Albert, Ed, and Louie went for a walk to the old railroad bridge near the water. In some way Louie fell into the icy water. They went to a neighbor's house and dried his clothe: before coming home. Nothing of this mishap was mentioned to my parents until two days later when pneumonia devel oped. He only lived three days. At that time pneumonia was considered contagious-it may have been, for within the week my eldest sister, Matilda, sickened and died of the same dread malady.

"We looked forward to Christmas eve in the little Lutherar rassed him terribly.

berries. Stockings made of a coarse netting sewed with bright colored yarns and filled with nuts, hard candy, and steam raisins were made by the Ladies' Aid society. Parents brought gifts for their childrenall of which filled the tree to overflowing.

My gaze was centered on a doll with a wax head and dressed in bright pink, all ruffles, tied to the topmost branch. I at once accepted her as my own and settled back to enjoy the festivities.

After the usual long preliminaries, Santa Claus bounced around

distributing the gifts. At last the doll was handed down. The name called was not mine. Oh the tragedy of childhood! I darted down the aisle screaming, "That's mine, That's MINE!" Someone hastily hrust my favorite doll, Old Punch, into my arms. The fact that she wore a new dress and was holding a baby doll comforted me a ot and averted what might have been mayhem on the other child.

Christmas eve, brother Lou, seven years my senior, hung my stocking for me from the clock-shelf back of the coal stove, we had no fireplace, but the coming-down-the-chimney act put on by Santa Claus in the Christmas poem didn't worry me a bit. It was enough hat he came. To make it easier for him, a lamp was left burning. Ever optimistic, I put a chair near by to catch the overflow of gifts.

The family loved to tease me (it was explained years later that my reactions were always so dramatic) so this Christmas the chair reld but one present, an interesting package. Disregarding the stocking, which always held hard candy, nuts, and stem raisins, I tore open the wrapping paper and found—of all things—two pair of grey ong-legged flannel underwear.

Even today, I can see it was a practical gift, but utterly lacking n Yuletide glamour. What followed must have been violent-anyway, it brought mother with a "real" gift and I was sent to bed to await the dawn.

A favorite gathering place for boys in winter was "Bunker lill" at the rear of the Kellogg property (now Walter Sumner's). This was before any houses were built in that neighborhood and larvey street at the corner of Sulton (Pennian avenue) was a ornfield. It was a steep hill, but with skill and sharp sled runners, lad could coast down and away across the creek. Definitely not the place for small girls. So Lou took time out and introduced me to an exciting new sport—sliding down the inclined driveway to the parn in the coal scoop.

I was to sit in the hollow of the scoop and steer with the handle between my knees. After a few trials, he gave me a mighty shove and tway I went—which left him free to go hurriedly to the hill and me be pulled out of a snowdrift by the fence. I became quite expert

Boys had wooden skates with a metal blade and straps for heel ind toe. In the heel of the skate was a screw, the thread end standing upright. This was screwed into a metal plate nailed to the boy's hoe. To make sure the skate held firmly to the shoe, Lou dipped his feet into water up to the sole of the shoe and let it freeze solid. tou can see this was quite a process. Our understanding mother alowed him to come into the house for dinner at noon wearing


