A strong colony of sharp-tailed grouse is developing near the Lake Superior shore north of Wakefield in the upper peninsula, the conservation departmentere-

Field workers say the birds are flourishing in a 2,100-acre area 20 miles north of Wakefield, in an area of the upper peninsula burned in a forest fire of 1947.

Best known sharptail areas in the upper peninsula include the Drummond Island and Seney-Shingelton colonies. Other wellknown spots are north of Gladstone in Delta county, south of Crystal Falls, in the southern Houghton and nothern Ontonagon county areas generally, north of Newberry and near Trout Lake between Newberry and St. Ignace. Game men say, however, that the birds are found in a large number of areas throughout the region and that hunters this fall should be able to find good grouse hunting territory without having to stick to the better-

In the iower peninsula, Missaukee, Kalkaska, Crawford, Roscounties are the best known sharptail areas and in the past

This season, Porterfield has been among the elite both in performance and in the weekly averages, writes J. G. Taylor Spink in The Sporting News. He is being mentioned as a candidate for the Most Valuable Player award and is cited as an especially sharp thorn in the side of Casey Stengel, who, on June 15, 1951, traded him to the Senators for Bob

"The secret of my success this season?" Porterfield repeated Spink's question and laughed.

"Let me say that I have been very anxious to do something for Bucky Harris. I had to pitch well for him because I cost him his job as manager of the Yankees.

"In 1948, I was pitching for Newark in the International League. I had a record of 15 won and six lost, with an earned run average of 2.17 and 133 strikeouts in 178 innings.

"I was all set to finish out the year with the Bears," continued Porterfield in The Sporting News interview, "but had some notion that I would be invited to train with the Yankees in 1949.

"Well, you may recollect that the 1948 Yankees had some pitching trouble. The baseball writers kept hollering for George Weiss to bring me in, and he kept saying that I wasn't

"I have a hunch that Weiss thought the holler for me to come to the Yankees was inspired by Harris," Porterfield told Spink.

"Well, the Yankees finished third in 1948. Weiss had yielded to newspaper pressure and brought me in. I won five and lost three, hardly an excellent record with the

"It seems that Weiss and Harris got into some sort of

How to Banish Winter Worries



To prepare for a snug, comfortable winter, check carefully the following: 1. Heating system—check grates; boiler and fire box for cracks or leaks; covering of pipes; 2. Insulation—full-thick mineral wool insures comfort, cuts fuel costs up to 40 per cent; 3. Chimney—check to see that flue is clean, if chimney needs pointing and if cement is sound around smokepipe; woodwork adjoining chimney should be fire-proofed; 4. Roof—check from inside for holes; check for missing or broken tiles, shingles, etc.; check all flashings for rust or displacement; 5. Exterior—inspect woodwork for warping, cracking, rotting; look for holes or cracks at window sills; check windows and doors to see if calking is needed around frames; check steps for structural defects, masonry for cracks, spalling and wear; 6. Gutters and down-spouts—clean out leaves and rubbish that may block gutters and downspouts; clear out strainers; check to see if painting or replacement is necessary. A checkup now will save dollars and insure comfort in blustery winter weather.

Color Vital To Decoration Of Exterior

"Exterior decoration" is taking its place with "interior decoration" as a familiar household term. An ever-increasing variety of colorful materials now permits the home-owner to style the outside of his house, as well as the inside, in keeping with his own individual taste.

Chief among colorful exterior materials is roofing. Asphalt shingles, which are used on 8 of 10 new homes built today, are made in numerous solid and blended colors, which range from soft pastels to more familiar hues.

Here are some suggestions on roof color use: In new construction or when

the exterior of an older house is being reconditioned, the procedure used by professional color designers is to choose the roof color first and then select other colors to go with it. The roof is considered to be a permanent "background" color for the ex-

Color is useful in achieving uniformity of appearance in a group of buildings. A house and a garage, or the buildings in a farmstead, should have matching roofs. Light-color roofing makes a house seem taller, and darker roofing makes it seem lower. These effects are helpful in improving poor architectural pro-For houses in the country, earthy red colors and foliage

greens-colors of nature-are often selected. For a house in an industrial area, remember that slate grays and gray-greens don't readily show dirt.

Most of the lakes are the same ones used in experiments from county and Big Portage Lake in 1946 to 1950 that led to relaxed regulations on panfish. Those tests showed there was no good reason for size limits on panfish and that season limits on bluegills and sunfish were also unnecessary.

Today, as a result of those experiments, an angler may keep panfish of any size on lakes throughout the state and may fish the year around for bluegills and sunfish.

The new series of tests will be aimed at testing present regulations on bass and wall-eyed and northern pike.

Three of the nine lakes in the tests will be open to year-round fishing for all species of fish. However, present creel and size limits will remain in effect. This test is designed to show whether we can take more big fish from a lake than presently allowed without hurting the parent stock.

Bear Lake in Manistee county, Pontiac Lake in Oakland county and Whitmore Lake in Washtenaw and Livingston counties are the lakes chosen for this experiment.

The other two sets of lakes will be used for a study of present size limits. On three of the lakes, anglers will be able to take bass and pike of any size, while on the other three pike under 24 inches long or bass under 16 inches will be protected.

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





Whether Michigan will follow the lead of several other states in setting up a fee system for state parks will be decided by the next

Until then, and probably long afterwards, the question will be subject for many an argument by many people in many parts of

Foremost of several plans to raise additional money is one requiring windshield stickers for every automobile entering a park Stickers would be good for a year. Price could be changed from rear to year. At present, the fee most often proposed is \$1 per year. Other proposals would set a lower amount for each person who

Those who oppose a general "admission" fee suggest higher rates for campers or simply a bigger appropriation from the state

Tourist business is a big industry in Michigan and the Legisla-ure has been hesitant to do anything that would discourage the nnual influx of vacationers.

Endorsement of the fee idea has been made by the Conservation Commission several times, but the Legislature has never acted fav-

Conservation Director Gerald E. Eddy says that he understands money raised from admission fees would not be used to cover operating costs. "But we have a serious need for a source of revenue that can produce a predictable amount for capital improvement. Typical example, he said, is Sterling Park in Monroe, "Improvements there will cost nearly \$1 million," he said. "This would be spent over a period of several years, but we can't start a program until we are sure of enough funds to complete it."

Until the Lake Erie beach is improved, everyone, particularly southeast Michigan people are deprived of practical use of the shoreline, he explained.

Survey of park needs in 1946 showed it would cost \$17 million put state recreational facilities in tip-top condition. This included quired sanitation, electric, bathhouse, toilet and road installations. Cost for the same improvements today would probably be \$35

Only way conservation officials can see to get extra money is through new charges or fee plan. Hence their support of ideas.

Public reaction in Minnesota state parks will be observed by all interested parties. Fee plan for state parks was put in effect there for the first time this summer. If a sizeable amount is raised without much public objection, it will be a strong argument to start practice

National parks in both United States and Canada have admission charges which are generally well accepted by the public. Several states besides Michigan are now considering fee plans to help finance recreational facilities.

Fairly or Unfairly Michigan's Justice of the Peace system has ong been attacked as inadequate. Justices have been charged with llegal actions which resulted according to critics, from ignorance or unethical practices. Included are "paying off" arresting officers, levying excessive fines and court costs.
