Tuesday, first day of the school, was "Michigan Day" because it presented talks by a University of Michigan faculty member and by Chiefs McAllister and Calvin Roberts of Livonia.





# It's Bottoms Up

Just how important it is to pack eggs with their large ends up was shown in recent tests by Michigan State college's poultry department.

The test started with eggs grading 50 per cent "AA" and 50 per cent "A". Nearly all of the eggs which were packed with large ends up were still of "A" quality as determined by candling at the end of 14 days. But those packed with the small end up averaged a "B" quality.

The interior quality of eggs which can be determined by candling is an important factor in wholesale grading, the poultrymen explain. To grade "A" or better, an egg must have a wellcentered yolk. DOES EXPENSE OF SPRING TRAINING PAY OFF?

Why does spring training take so long? Seven weeks is a large hunk of time to reacquaint players with the positions of bases. Is it run for publicity, or for training?

According to The Sporting News there are as many opinions as there are baseball officials. George Weiss, Yankee general manager, is a straight training guy. No

"The publicity is secondary," Weiss states. Spring training should be what the term implies, without stunts or extended trips. Seven weeks is about right for a manager to size up new material, and the older player to work into shape without forcing himself."

Walter O'Malley, Dodger president, thinks of the dollar back home.

He says: "With advance ticket sales aimed at \$500,000 breaking into late February, a club must have a publicity springboard, which the training season provides."

O'Malley makes a point in The Sporting News article. "Pro athletes can get into condition in much less time. But we need seven weeks to play games, which are vital to give every man a fair chance and let the manager get a good feel of his entire squad."

Frank Lane, White Sox general manager, is more hard-boiled. "Three weeks is plenty. You justify the rest on your publicity building up. A club spends about \$75,-000 on the average, and only the top-box-office draw can get back more than half in the exhibitions. But it's worth, it."

### NIEMAN GETS COMPETITION FROM TUTTLE

Detroit is curious about the improvement Bob Nieman, who opens training as the No. 1 left fielder, reports The Sporting News.

"I've stayed in good shape this winter - only six pounds above my playing weight," Nieman reported. "But I want to nail down that job."

The Tiger stratagists agree that Nieman has earned a long look in camp. His primary contention in left field comes from Bill Tuttle, whose defensive speed and baserunning savvy mark him as the most exciting rookie outfielder in the Detroit camp.

I am told of a batch of tests given this fall to college points. Yet, these kids were admitted to college because the principals recommended them as being well qualified.

Many of these boys have already flunked out of college. Both father and son have been shortchanged by the public and private schools. When a son is graduated from secondary school, both father and son are made to believe son was somebody he really was not at all-and all because the school worshipped too long before the false shrine of mediocrity. Schools, and colleges too, need to take a closer look at their standards and values. This is a national problem. How can we develop good leaders in business, or how can we even hope

AND FINALLY, COMPETITION I have been shocked to discover the number of school principals and superintendents who seem to think there is something heathen, something un-Christian, something damaging about individual competition. They develop report cards that attempt to tell a parent how the child is doing in terms of his own ability, but hush-hush his relative standing in the group. Schools also too often measure their teachers in terms of extra summer courses taken or advanced degrees, and not often enough do they use the yardstick of class-

room discipline. I ask you, what spurs an individual on to do his best? Is it not, fundamentally, the struggle for recognition and achievement? The individual wants to prove he is a man among men, that he counts, whether he be a teacher or preacher doing for others, an inventor conquering technical frontiers, or a salesman satisfying our wants and needs. We need to rekindle this spirit of competition in the classroom. Superintendent Philip J. Hickey of St. Louis has made a good start in this direction.

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

# Orange Sponge Cake

Each of the members of the Floyd Reddeman family of 325 Blunk has his favorite cake, but the one that appeals to Mr. and Mrs. Reddeman is this recipe for orange sponge cake. In fact it is the preferred birthday cake for Mr. Reddeman.

Orange Sponge Cake

1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar 1 cup granulated sugar

2 teaspoons grated orange rind 1/3 cup orange juice

1 1/4 cup pastry flour 11/2 teaspoon double action baking powder 1/4 teaspoon salt

Separate eggs. Beat whites and cream of tartar until stiff and add yolks one at a time, beating well before the addition of yolks. Add sugar gradually, still beating with egg beater. Remove beater. Add grated rind and orange juice. Fold in flour sifted with baking powder and salt. Bake in two layer cake pans in moderate oven at 350 degrees for 25 minutes.



# Select Foods That You Like

The current interest in overweight should lead to public health improvement. Diseases of the heart, cancer and diseases of blood vessels, which are the three leading causes of death in the United States, are closely related to nutrition. An excessive intake of calories, or more food than the body burns, is associated with the increase and the severity of these diseases. For the senior citizen the person over 60, the relation of diet to health becomes more important as the life span is extended.

A good reducing diet for young and senior citizen alike should include a variety of foods from the basic food groups. These foods can be ones the individual or family consider normal and well-liked. When familiar foods are eaten, the weight adjustment is more likely to be permanent and satisfying.

The daily food essentials are milk: green and yellow vegetables; citrus and other fruit; eggs; meat, fish, poultry or cheese cereal and bread; and fats. Some of these essentials can be eaten in unlimited quantities because they are very low in calorie count; others must be eaten in 2 tablespoons finely chopped limited amount because they are be your calorie-counter. # Thrifty Dish Teams Lamb Shanks - Rice

When looking for something new and different to serve your family choose lamb shanks. Slow cooking in moisture makes these individual servings of lamb tender and tasty.

Here is how to prepare them in a casserole with rice. Brown the shanks in lard or drippings. Do this slowly and thoroughly so they will retain their well browned color after the liquid is added.

Add 2 cups of water to the meat and season with salt and pepper. Let the meat cook covered for about 1 1/2 hours or until tender. Keep the meat at the simmering stage, below boiling, until the meat is tender.

Next, remove the meat from the broth. When the shanks are cool enough to handle, remove bones. In the meantime, cook 1/4 pound of rice in the lamb broth, adding water as necessary. When tender, drain the rice, saving broth. Add 1/2 cup chopped celery and place in a baking dish. Add gravy made by thickening the remaining lamb broth. Place lamb shanks on top. Heat thoroughly in a slow oven (300° F.).


4. People who pay the tax will be building social security oldage and survivors benefits for themselves just as people employed in jobs covered by social security have for years.

5. You will need a personal social security account number. If you do not have an account card already, call your social security office.
