City authorities realized curb parking would have to be eliminated, yet the lack of vacant lots in the business district to serve as parking areas posed a problem. It was hoped at first that private capital would undertake such a project. But when this was not forthcoming the citizens decided to make the building the first major post-war community project.

tract of land right in the middle of the business district--46,000 square feet, at a cost of \$114,000. Construction of the building was started in 1946. The structure, which covers the entire tract, can house 800 cars simultaneously. It is designed to make the most of the steep hillside against which it is placed. There are four parking levels--ground floor, second floor, third floor, and the roof--and each, because of the ascending hillside, can have its own exit. However, the main flow of traffic is through a central entrance on the first level, in order to simplify check-

This main entrance is on a side street where garage traffic will not empty into the town's most crowded artery. It consists of two adjacent driveways, each 25 feet wide, for coming and going cars.

EDITORIAL No Armistice In Sight

Signing of an armistice last July ending hostilities in Korea was an occasion for rejoicing throughout our

During three years of warfare with Communist armies, American forces had lost more than 25,000 men killed in action on a foreign battle field.

Today, we are still engaged in a grim fight on the home front with an enemy more deadly than all of the armies which the Communists put in the field in Korea. And on this battle front there is no armistice in sight. This current conflict is taking a yearly toll of lives nine times greater than those suffered by our armed forces during three years of war in Korea.

The foe responsible for this daily threat to the lives of Americans is cancer.

During 1953, a total of 227,000 persons in the United States died from the dread disease, which, it is estimated, will strike at one out of every five Americans at some time in their lives.

The nationwide campaign to conquer this country's second most deadly killer is being spearheaded by the American Cancer Society with a comprehensive, threefold program of public and professional education, service to patients and scientific research into the causes and most effective methods of curing or arresting the disease.

Everyone cannot engage directly in the campaign being fought by scientists, family doctors, nurses and hundreds of thousands of volunteer workers to eradicate cancer. But we all can join indirectly in the struggle by having regular physical check-ups-at least one a year, the ACS says,-and learning cancer's danger signals so that we can seek a doctor's attention at the earliest possible moment.





April Marks Opening of Annual Cancer Crusade in Plymouth

"Every housewife knows that torn sheets make good dust cloths but many are unaware they also can be made into dressings to help care for a cancer patient." Mrs. William Norman, chairman of the Plymouth Unit of the American Cancer Society White Goods Drive, observed today in commenting on the present drive. This program, she pointed out, is only one of the many activities of the society which will conduct its 1954 Cancer Crusade here and throughout the United States during April.


The local white drive has been in effect for nearly three weeks. The results are very gratifying, she said. The Girl Scout troops in this area, she pointed out, are to be especially commended upon their fine cooperation in the procuring of white goods.

Norman Marquis, president of the local unit, stressed that the preparation of dressings is only one of the activities of the local volunteers but that it is an extremely important one. Some idea of the magnitude of the dressings project, under the supervision of Mrs. Gus Lundquist, locally can be conceived from last year's reports of the ACS's 60 divisions which showed that 4,751 groups of women volunteers produced an aggregate of 11,341,510 dressings. The amount made locally is already in the thousands.

Volunteers meet in groups, sometimes as members of a club or church organization, and cut and sew dressings from donated materials. Marquis said that probably few housewives realize how expensive an item dressings are for the needy patient whose budget for sickness is either slender or non-existent. Bandages, when bought commercially, may cost a cancer victim more than \$50 a month.

The first leaves called seed leaves, do not provide food for the infant plant; but the true leaves do, and help it recover from the slight shock of moving.

The operation is done in seconds. A pointed stick is thrust into the soil near the seedling, which is lifted between the stick and a finger, moved to the new flat where a hole has already been punched for it. The tiny root is dropped in and soil is pressed against it.

If plant bands are used a seedling is placed in the center of each band, or two seedlings to a band if you wish to play safe. In case both survive, one is eliminated before they crowd.

Plant bands are made of either wood veneer or asphalted paper. They make four sides of a cube, open top and bottom and enclosing six cubic inches or more of soil. They are placed touching each other to fill the flat, then filled with soil. If the wick-watering method of irrigation is used, the bands should rest on a cushion of soil to facilitate even

HENRICH EXPECTS YANKEE PLUMAGE TO HELP BYRD SING

"I don't know this Harry Byrd personally," mused Tommy Henrich, who gained fame as the Yanks' Old Reliable outfielder, "but I believe he's a cinch to become a better player when he puts on that Yankee uniform this year."

Few players of our generation were better analysts of the science of baseball and the patterns of human behavior, so Henrich was the logical expert for The Sporting News, the national baseball weekly, to seek out to explain the "magic" inherent in the Yankee uniform.

"The first thing Byrd will learn when he joins the Yanks," Henrich predicted, "is to hustle. Not just for one play or one inning, but all the time. If he doesn't the other players will crack down on him. They'll give him the 'freeze' treatment. Their one idea is to win the pennant, and if anybody stands in the way, he's sure to be ostracized.

"Don't forget, too," added Henrich in The Sporting News, "that the Yankees have a pretty good policing system from General Manager George Weiss down. When a player doesn't do his job, they warn him, warn him . . . then sell him!"

So the secret behind the Yankee dynasty is nothing more than the hackneyed word "hustle?" Isn't it a stock phrase for every club to boast of its hustle?

"Don't kid yourself," smiled Henrich. "Other fellows who comes to the Yankees from different clubs have told me that their former teams didn't operate the same way. On the Yanks, there is always one idea—to win the game. Anyone who doesn't pull his share of the load gets the quick treatment from the other fellows, to let him know they won't stand for it."

Henrich closed his interview with The Sporting News reporter with: "Yes, other teams think they know how to win. Their players may know how to win for themselves. It's different, thinking in terms of 'team! all the time."

ROOKIE RUDY BLAZES AT BAT FOR INDIANS

The hottest thing in the torrid desert area of Tucson, Arizona, is a 23-year-old rookie named Rudy Regalado, says The Sporting News. Regalado's bat has gained more headline ink than all the other Cleveland Indian stars combined.

\$10 SEASON PASSES MAY PROVE LIFESAVER

The most interesting plan for the sale of tickets in minor league baseball is being attempted both in Norfolk, formerly owned by the Yankees, and in Binghamton, still a Yankee subsidiary, which may well revolutionize the gate problem in the lower classification minors, reports The Sporting News. Possibly in all minors.

It is very simple. Both these clubs are selling season tickets-they call them season passes-for \$10. This permits people to use them for general admission at any game in the season (except opening day.)

Now, what happens? More people come to the park, more people buy concessions. More people become interested in local baseball. Suppose 30,000 people show up on a given day? Well, something must be put on the tickets so that the buyer knows his ticket is good only when there are sufficient general admission or bleacher seats available. They do not expect that problem.

It is not known, what goals have been set, but fans in both cities are going for the deal. It is, says The Sporting News, obviously, the greatest bargain in baseball.
