Businessmen reasoned that this method of paying for the parking would eliminate the necessity of writing overtime parking tickets and thus eliminate harassing customers who must pay the \$1 fine. The committee also presented a policy regarding diplomacy in issuing parking tickets.

"We can't have our cake and eat it too," Mayor Daane began as the letter was concluded. He declared that this is a poor time to think about decreasing parking fees since the city is in the midst of an expensive parking lot development program. (The Chamber suggested charging five cents for the first two hours, five cents for the next three hours and 25 cents for each additional hour. This is about half the present parking meter charge.)

"I frankly, am sick and tired of having parking problems poised at every meeting by the Chamber with apparently no study on their part," the mayor stated.



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

It assumed that the name "Buddy" was given the poppies as a result of the popularity of the name "Buddy" among men overseas during World War I.

William Norman, chairman of the Veterans of Foreign Wars section of the Buddy Poppy sale explained that one of the main uses for the proceeds from the sale is to maintain the National Home at Eaton Rapids, Michigan. At the "Home" there are more than 20 brick houses each of which houses a dozen or more children, orphaned when their fathers were killed in the war. Each house is run by a house mother, who is a carefully selected widow of a veteran. The children live normal lives, attending public schools, choosing their own religions, and so on.

"When the customer picks up his menu at the Toll House, attached to it is a list of the sandwiches, soup and beverages, and the price of each, available at that particular meal hour. In the center of this list are two lines under the word "Special." The two lines are for the customer to write in the 'entree' from the menu. If he wants a sandwich, instead of a regular lunch or dinner, he just puts a check mark, indicating the sandwich he wants. In this manner the customer has automatically written his order for the waitress who takes it directly to the kitchen. With this method, while the waitress is getting the soup or 'set up' for the customer, the order is in the process of preparation. The customers like it and it saves time. The waitress returns the check to the customer who in turn presents it to the cashier.
