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# **Fund Drive** Struggling Near Goal

A surprise donation of \$3,148 from the Michigan Bell Telephone company and their Plymouth employees brought Plymouth's Community Fund within grasp of the \$24,500 goal Tuesday.

Last-minute donations pushed the fund up to \$23,752, leaving the highest goal in Community Fund history only \$747 away.

The Michigan Bell contribution was the biggest donation in the 1954 fund drive, according to Chairman George Witkowski. With Wednesday night set as the end of the campaign, Witkowski said that workers will be doing everything possible to locate the \$747 needed to meet the goal.

Last week when the fund was still \$5,925 away from the goal, Witkowski reported that the committee had about exhausted its source of major donations. Only \$500 to \$600 in donations could be foreseen at that time.

The Community Fund started October 19 and dragged at a slow pace far behind last year when the goal was some \$5,000 smaller. Closing date of the drive was set at November 11 but when only half of the goal was reached on that date, an emergency meeting of the board of directors was called. It was voted to extend the campaign two weeks, until

#### Missing Boy Found Just too Ambitious

While thousands of cases have been recorded of little boys disappearing from home to avoid school, here's the story with a new twist-a boy who disappeared from home to go to school.

It was last Thursday morning that Gary Jones, sevenyear-old son of Reverend and Mrs. E. B. Jones, 292 Arthur, quietly got out of bed, dressed, and slipped out the front door into the darkness. His parents leter arose, found Gary missing and started a frantic search. They combed the neighborhood and telephoned parents of Gary's young friends. Police were summoned. They too searched the house and neighborhood.

But there was nothing to worry about. Gary had merely gone to school. A Bird school custodian arriving at 6:50 found Gary sitting on the school steps. School officials later called Gary's parents who were informed that their son was apparently suffering from nothing more than overambition.

It was predicted that the severe drought and late frosts would cause a serious food shortage. But our crops were good!

Beside all this we owe sincere thanks to God as christian people for our freedom of religion, our freedom of speech and our right of assembly; for the precious gift of peace and for our opportunity because of our unique, God-given strength and wealth in natural resources to provide world leadership at this critical point in world history without imperialistic ambitions.

Thus, we owe it to our God, to our People and to our Government to set aside a portion of every Day of National Thanksgiving to enter our house of worship as families to render due and appropriate thanks to God our Maker and Redeemer!

Without the happy concerted response of our people to our invitation, "Come, Ye Thankful People, Come!"; these services could not be conducted. But, how could we do otherwise than urge them to come to return thanks to God before they go back to their several homes for the Thanksgiving feast and family fun? After all, we are thankful Americans, and we are thankful American Christians!

#### **Tells Recreation** Men to Seek Out **Public Opinion**

The wants and desires of the public should be considered in the development of recreational facilities and programs was the advice given by a panel of Michigan recreation experts who met recently at Michigan State Col-

The meeting was a two-day affair bringing park and recreation men together. It was co-sponsored by eight state-wide educational recreational and conservation groups, seeking to offer advice in improving and expanding facilities and programs.

"Let's be sure to ask the people what they want," advised Charles Webber, one of the Michigan Civil Service Commis-

"Their requests will be varied, but-they will be simple. And by meeting these suggestions, our parks and programs will have a fresh look," Webber said.

The panel said that even though Michigan is far ahead of many states with its roadside tables, camping areas, parks, etc., many needs and problems are resulting from increased popula-

The use of survey research to determine the wants of people, by recreation and park people, was advocated at the meeting by Justin "Leonard, research administrator of the Michigan Conservation Department.

The conference was sponsored by the Michigan State College School of Education, the Department of Land and Water Conservation and the Michigan Inter-Agency for Recreation.



#### Match, Cigarette Started Majority Of 1953 Fires

Look at these figures. In 1953 fire claimed the lives of 11,000 people. In the same year fire destroyed 865 million dollars worth of property.

The misuse of matches and cigarettes accounts for the largest percentage of this loss, 27 percent. Defective electrical appliances and wiring is second in line contributing to this appalling

Other causes of fire include sparks on roofs, overheated or defective chimneys, overheated stoves, furnaces or boilers, ignition of hot greases and explosions of various flammable liquids and

THE FUNDAMENTAL cause of practically all the above fires is carelessness. With this thought in mind make it routine practice to observe the following sugges-

1. Be sure every cigarette, pipe or cigar is out before you throw it away or put it down, Don't smoke near inflammable materials or liquids. Obey "no

smoking" signs. 2. Break matches before throwing them away. Keep matches out of reach of children. Don't use matches as lights to search dark

3. KEEP MOTORS of all electrical appliances lubricated to avoid overheating. Keep combustibles a safe distance from all motors. Never hang extension cords from nails or hooks or run them under carpets. Replace worn or frayed cords on appliances.

4. Don't use inflammable liquids in closed rooms or anywhere near open flames or sparks. Liquids such as gasoline, benzine and naphtha give off heavy vapors that can flow along the floor 200 feet or more to open flame and flash back to the con-

Play It Safe! Remember an ounce of prevention is worth a ton of ashes.

#### **Smaller Trees** Called Safer For City Streets

The bigger they are the harder they fall is particularly true of street and highway trees in the path of hurricanes or other severe

So says a tree expert who would like to see smaller trees as the keystones in community tree planting programs. Many street and highway trees are poorly anchored in their locations. That's because their roots are confined to limited areas and further curtailed by sewers, drains, gas lines, telephone cables, curbs and other essential roadway improvements.

The many public trees uprooted during Hurricane Carol and Edna point up the need for reevaluation of city and town tree needs, according to the expert. Careful consideration must be given to smaller species now being recommended to meet modern ur-

Arboreal giants still have their place, and always will, where space permits. However, modern streets and highways place more and more limitations on living space for trees. The trend to ranch-type homes gives aesthetic impetus, as well, to smaller tree

New communities are favoring such shade and decorative species as flowering crabapple, certain types of hawthorns, globe locust, trident maples, evodia trees and many others. These new trends will require years for their ful-

In the meantime, municipal authorities should insist upon frequent checks of all street and highway trees to meet safety rerequirements.

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

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

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

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#### **Driving Tips** For Wintertime

Winter motorists may find these timely suggestions helpful. For instance, a bag of sand in the car trunk for sprinkling under the rear wheels for traction may mean the difference between a freezing night in a roadside ditch and one's own cozy fireside.

A couple of cardboards will come in handy for motorists who park their cars in the open. The cardboards, if tucked under the windshield wipers, will insure clear glass against freezing rain or snow when motorists are ready to drive.

An old windshield wiper blade kept in the glove compartment also is useful on the rare occasion when cold weather moisture is heavy and causes fogging on the inside of the car. The blade will keep the glass clear longer than if the driver uses the palm of his hand.

One precautionary word is offered about batteries on subfreezing days. Engineers warn against adding water unless the driver plans to go farther than just a few blocks afterwards. Until the water mixes thoroughly with the battery acid, it may freeze and damage the battery.

A good trick to use to thaw a frozen door lock is to hold a lighted match or the flame of a cigarette lighter to the car key and then insert the heated key into the lock.

If a motorist is caught in a sudden cold snap without sufficient anti-freeze, he can save his radiator-and all the troubles that go with frozen coolant-by slipping a large cardboard or a flattened paper shopping bag in front of the radiator until he reaches his auto dealer for ser-

If the sharp drop in the thermometer is due overnight, the car owner can guard against a frozen radiator by hanging a lighted electric bulb under the hood of the car in his garage and draping a blanket over the radia-

"He has contributed greatly to presenting more than 60,000 farm ment of conservation to manage the bettering of farmer-sportsman relations and has a sincere interest in the farmers' point of view," the resolution states.

The Bureau expressed appreciation for conservation department cooperation with farmers in the past, recommended no change on small game season opening dates, urged stronger protections against stream pollution and endorsed the statewide "Ask The Farmer First" campaign.

Planting one legal-sized brook trout may cost state sportsmen as little as 11 cents, a recent conservation department study

Personnel of the Watersmeet state hatchery kept accurate cost checks on a routine trout-rearing assignment and found that about 10.9 cents was expended for each legal brook trout planted.

It took 6.6 of the fish to weigh a pound and at that rate the trout cost about 72 cents per pound.

Included in the study were costs for labor, fish food, truck mileage in transporting the fish and other incidental expenses.

The study started with eyed eggs that hatched in the winter of 1952-53. From these, 18,392 legalsized fish were obtained this fall.

Similar cost studies are under way at Marquette, Thompson, Oden, Paris and Harrietta hatcheries.

The pint-sized deer that state game workers recently captured in northern Michigan is apparently nothing more than a midget or a pygmy.

"Nature plays tricks like this sometimes," says Dr. S. C. Whitlock, in charge of state game research. "It seems to be simply a stunted white-tailed deer."

The strange little animal. standing only two feet high, was captured in the wild near Houghton Lake wildlife experiment station late last week.
