

Shelled nuts do keep well in tight containers for a year in a freezer. If you package your own for freezer storage, be sure to package them in usable amounts. If your recipe calls for blanched brazil nuts or almonds, cover the shelled nuts with cold water. Bring to a boil and simmer two or three minutes. Drain: add cold water; drain again. Pinch each nut to slip the skins. Filberts should be placed in a shallow pan in an oven set at 250 degrees or 275 degrees for about 20 minutes or until skins loosen. Rub them with a coarse towel or with your fingers. Toasting improves their flavor as well as making them more easily sliced.

Local Draft **Board Split**

Two new draft boards have been established in southwestern Wayne county as the result of splitting Local Board No. 102 located in Plymouth.

The Plymouth local board, with more than 23,000 registrants, was one of the largest draft boards in the nation, according to the Michigan State Selective Service headquarters. It is lo-cated at 328 North Main street.

New local boards will be established at Trenton and Wayne as a result of the split. All registrants transferred to the new local boards at Trenton and Wayne have been advised by mail.

Wayne board 219 will have jurisdiction over the townships of Nankin and Dearborn, exclusive of the City of Dearborn. Trenton board 222 will include Brownstown, Grosse Ile, Huron, Monguagon, Romulus, Sumpter and Van Buren townships.



Older Builder Was Better

Don't believe the old complaint that houses today aren't as good as they used to be. In most important respects

they're much better. One example of the superiority of the modern house is the widespread use of preservative-treated millwork—windows, panel doors, and cabinets. Chemically treated millwork, generally made of ponderosa pine, will last at least four or five times as long as the wood used in the so-called "golden age" of home building.

Basically, preservatives do two things. They poison the fungus that causes decay. They also re-duce the absorption of moisture in wood.

The ability to keep out moist-ure means that ponderosa pine windows and panel doors are free from sticking in any kind of weather. Sticking is caused when wood swells after absorbing moisture. Later, during dry weather, the wood shrinks. Preservativetreated wood, for all practical purposes, does not swell or


Preservatives improve wood's natural affinity for paint. They prevent paint failures such as bubbling, cracking, and peeling, which are caused by the presence of moisture beneath the painted





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
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December Heavens

As Christmas-time grows near, the minds of many mortals are turned toward the sky, and we are indebted to the University of Michigan astronomy department this week for a scientific description of the December heavens.

Hazel M. Losh, an associate professor, contends that "any exact astronomical explanation or timing of the Star of Bethlehem's appearance are out of the question." She says we don't have enough accurate description of the event, nor can we count on the early calendars' accuracy.

"But the bright planets are always promising and alluring," the professor adds.

"Mercury, reaching its greatest angular distance from the Sun on Christmas Day, Venus, Saturn, Mars, Jupiter-all bright planets during December-each could easily have been the Christmas star."

The constellations of December are perhaps the most striking of the whole year. "Fittingly the Northern Cross is steadily moving toward the west and may be seen to splendid advantage on Christmas Eve," the professor says. "After dark, it will stand upright against the western sky, a beautiful symbol of the Christmas season."

Sirius, in the constellation of Canis Major and brightest of all stars, will also be prominent this month. "From time immemorial," Professor Losh explains, "Sirius has been watched, admired, and revered, rising as it does in the early evening around Christmas time. It was the 'star of the east', pointed to by 'Three Wise Men' of Orion."

Appearing the brightest of all the stars, it ranks sixth in order of distance from the Earth, the light taking more than eight years to reach us. "It is about 27 times more luminous than our Sun,' the professor declares.

With Christmas comes winter, which will officially open this year on Friday, Dec. 21, at 4:00 p.m. On this date, the Sun will reach the winter solstice, the most southerly point of its apparent yearly journey around the Earth.



The new public hunting lands would include 390 acres in the southern part of Garden Island, Charlevoix county, and 160 acres adjoining Hardwood state forest, Cheboygan county. Approximate-ly 75 acres of the Hardwood tract would be affected by the Conser-vation Department's proposed flooding of the Dingman Marsh area. Both of these purchases would be made with money from the Game and Fish Protection

Another 333 acres of hunting and will be considered for purchase under the Pittman-Robertson program, the state-federal cooperative game management program. The proposed P-R pur-chases include 215 acres at Rose Lake wildlife experiment station, Clinton county; 78 acres at Maple River state game area, Gratiot county; and 40 acres at Lapeer state game area, Lapeer county.

The proposed fishing sites are on the Grand River, east of Grand Haven in Ottawa county; and on Portage Lake, Houghton county.

With the close of deer season, many hunters are turning their attention to other game-cottontail rabbits, snowshoe hares and bobcats.

Cottontails, primarily a southern Michigan game animal, are legal targets in the southern lower peninsula through January 31, while rabbits and hares may be hunted in the northern lower peninsula and the U.P. through March 1.

The northern lower peninsula's bobcat season will be in effect December 15-March 15. Last year, hunters took about 140 'cats in the state's first bobcat season. In the upper peninsula, bobcats still have a predator status and may be taken at any time of year; 754 were bountied in the U.P. in 1955.

Violations of hunting laws accounted for the majority of the 1162 arrests made by state conservation officers during the month

Convictions resulted in 1136 cases; 24 cases were incomplete and two were dismissed. Total fines paid by violators amounted to \$20,600, in addition to \$8,900 in court costs in justice courts throughout the state. These totals represent an average financial penalty of more than \$25 for each

Violators also received jail sen-tences totaling 197 days and 18 persons were placed on proba-

Illegal hunting activities were the most numerous violations, including 170 persons arrested for failure to observe waterfowl shooting hours. Other frequent violations included: possession of loaded firearm in automobile. 166; possession of loaded firearm in motorboat, 113; hunting ager with artificial light. 93; hunting without a license, 73; and hunting game birds or animals during closed season, 52.

The December 1-2 special deer hunting season was really "speci-al" for F. W. Terwilliger, Conservation Department geologist. Ter-williger, an enthusiast of muzzleloading guns, bagged his deer with a 90-year-old firearm.

He was hunting in Area 4, near Gladwin, Saturday when he sight-

ed a doe and a fawn about 40 yards away. Terwilliger dropped the doe with a neck shot. It was the first deer he has bag-ged with the muzzle-loader, which was manufactured in the

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




