

New Phone Numbers Here Soon

Technicians of the Michigan Bell Telphone Company are on schedule this week in their program to bring direct distance dial telephone service to Plymouth.

Central office dial experts of the Western Electric Company are tving together the thousands of intricate switches, relays, and a myriad of other electrical units to form the electronic "heart" of the new system in the new building at 1360 Ann Arbor Road.

While these "inside" work. men moved toward "dial" day April 20, outside construction crews of Michigan Bell were high on poles and settled in manholes under the city's streets splicing the millions of feet of copper wires together to connect the telephones in homes and businesses with the dial switching equipment.

Robert D. Maurer, Michigan Bell manager, said new telephone number cards would be mailed to users for applying on the number por-tion of the instrument dial unit.

"Complete instructions for applying the new numbers will accompany each number card," Maurer said. He pointed out the mailing

ORDINANCE NO. 240

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AND ADD TO ORDINANCE NO. 182, KNOWN AS THE "ZON-ING ORDINANCE."

THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

Section 1. Section 11.05 of the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Plymouth is hereby amended to read as

Section 11.05. FIRE AND SAFETY HAZARDS. The storage and handling of flammable liquids, liquified petroleum gases and explosives, shall comply with the State Rules and Regulations, as established by Public Act No. 207, P.A. of 1941, as amended, or by the Fire Prevention Ordinance of the City of Plymouth, whichever is the most stringent. Bulk storage of flammable liquids, liquid petroleum, gases and explosives may be stored above ground, when tanks are located not less than one hundred (100) feet from all property lines; provided, however, the Board of Appeals may vary this requirement under conditions as specified in Section 13.08.

All tanks shall be adequately and properly diked to provide a storage capacity not less than the volume of the tank or tanks surrounded. Dike construction shall meet the approval of the State Fire Marshal. Bulk storage of flammable liquids, below ground, shall

be permitted and the tanks shall be located not closer to the property line than the greatest dimension (diameter, length or height) of the tank.

Section 2. There is hereby added to said Ordinance a new section to be known as Section 13.08 to read as

Section 13.08. ADDITIONAL POWERS OF THE BOARD OF APPEALS. The Board of Appeals, subject to the procedure, provisions and limitations of Section 13.07, may permit a variation in the location of bulk storage tanks above ground, but not less than sixty (60) feet from any property

ine under the following conditions and safeguards.

(a) When tanks are located adjacent to railroad rightsof-way more than sixty-six (66) feet in width, tanks may
be permitted within ten (10) feet of the railroad right-

(b) When all buildings adjacent to the property lines on abutting property are of fireproof construction or a light non-combustible construction.

(c) Where abutting property is vacant or is used for a use of a combustible nature, such as a lumber yard, tanks shall not be less than one hundred (100) feet from such abutting property line.

(d) When Group A Tanks are used and equipped either with (1) an approved permanently attached ex-

tinguishing system or (2) an approved floating roof. Section 3. This Ordinance shall become operative and

ffective on the 8th day of April, A.D., 1958.







Newer Types Come Pre-Fab

Beautification, property line identification, privacy and protection were the roles of wood fencing about the homes of our country's early settlers. Except for protection, wood fencing serves the same purpose for today's home owners.

The availability of many varied designs of fencing materials have kept this home improvement product in fashion. This is particularly true in suburban areas where huge developments of small homes have been, and are still, going on.

Because of the architectural similarity of small homes in large developments, owners of these homes have created original distinction of their property by installing wood fencing of attractive design.

There are at least a half a dozen different types of fences available, anyone of which can add a distinctive touch to a home. What's most important about these fences is that they come pre-fabricated, and a home owner who can dig a hole can install these fences.



March Blooming Camellia Will Grow Here

Camellias reach their last great peak of bloom each year in March, when the Reticulata varieties flower. Some of these varieties start to open in February, all of them open in March and many continue through April.


This late-flowering group of camellias is most popular on the West Coast, but there is no reason why they won't grow successfully outdoors in the Southeast and it has been proven they make excellent indoor flowering plants. Less than a hundred varieties of C. reticulata are known in comparison to the more than 2,000 varieties of C, japonica which have their height of bloom in January and February.

The Reticulatas are worth waiting until March to see, for the flowers are large, none of them less than 4 inches in diameter and many of them 6 or 8 inches. It is the arrangement of the petals and the coloring that make Reticulata camellias so magnificent. The flowers always are double but semi-double varieties open to show golden stamens. Instead of flat rows like the C. japonica, the petals of the Reticulatas are irregularly and loosely arranged. In addition, the petals may be waved or have a crepe-like texture, be notched or heartshaped. Colors are rich and flowing. Until ten years ago only one

Re-Upholster That Relic; It's Not Such a Tough Job

Fixing up an old chair can be a pleasurable pastime, but it takes patience. If it's a chair that has been stored away for some time there's a better than even chance that it has a mildew or musty smell.

Many a fine chair, which may appear ragged and weak, can be reinforced and re-upholstered to add a great deal of charm to a room.

What must be done is to bring it outdoors and strip off all old upholstery and padding right down to the frame for a stretched taut before tacking thorough airing. It's a messy job, but clean-up afterwards can be simplified by placing the chair on an old blanket or sheet. The frame should be inspected carefully for weak joints. It may be necessary to stretched taut before tacking in place. By leaving the outside of the back and sides uncovered, it's easier to apply upholstery material.

Teens Appreciate **Babysitting Job**

Young adolescents like to take care of small children but feel they need guidance from parents and teachers in doing a good job.

These young "betweeners" feel that baby sitting offers a real opportunity to learn how to understand and get along with children. They also appreciate the money they earn. Seventh and eighth grade girls and boys in three Michian communities were asked, Do you have the responsibility of caring for younger brothers and sisters?" and "Do you baby sit?"

The majority answered "yes" but listed their problems. They said they needed help in selecting suitable stories to read or tell to smaller children, advice on how to get children to play together, ideas for selecting toys and games which would help children learn as they play and how to assume the responsi-bilities expected of a baby

Parents and teachers may help these young people understand why small child-ren behave as they do and how to learn to enjoy them, The librarian might be help

ful in selecting stories for telling and reading, and the baby sitters might visit a toy store to look at toys which would be safe, educational and entertaining for younger children. Homemade toys are fun to make, and a toy-making project for seventh and eighth graders might be a good idea. They might like to collect and mend broken toys.

Suggestions from successful mothers would help in getting children to eat and to go to bed, and if the baby sitter is to be in charge at meal time she might be interested if get-ting ideas for simple foods to prepare.
