company has broken ground for the erection of the addi-tion to their factory. The new part will be 26x66 feet and will add much to their capacity.



Their recreation is confined to getting out-doors in good weather for a breath of fresh air, watching T.V., reading and doing lovely hand-work. Primarily they are content to "visit" with each other. They have many private jokes and do quite a bit of reminiscing.

All are well-groomed and cared for and often go off with their loved ones. However, they are content to return to their "home" for the routine that they are used to, and is restful for them. The youngest resident is in her 60's and the oldest is brighteyed Molly Bronson, who will be 103 this June. She is cared for ever so carefully by Miss Hanlon

and her staff.

Started 11 years ago when a Plymouth resident, Mrs. Lombard asked Miss Hanlon to care for her husband, the home has grown from a cornfield to a beautiful 10 acres that form a lovely changing scene from the picture windows for the residents to view. Each wing has its own bath, sitting room, and bedrooms with four beds. There are two private bedrooms, however, Miss Hanlon says the residents are much happier "sharing."





Remove from heat; add lemon rind; cool. Sieve cottage cheese into large mixing bowl, or beat with electric mixer until smooth. Stir in cooled gelatine mixture, salt and lemon juice. Chill, stirring occasionally, until mixture mounds slightly when dropped from a spoon. Fold in whipped cream. Turn into prepared shell. Chill until firm. Garnish with additional whipped cream and fresh, or frozen strawberries, or serve with strawberry sauce.






