This is an alternative, at this time, to acquiring 40 acres of property on the outskirts of Plymouth at \$3,000 or \$4,000 an acre and raising a completely new high school there. The latter was the Board's first approach to the problem. It proposes to use the present high school for a Junior High.

We believe that the present location, in the heart of the Plymouth community, is the best place for our single high school, other things being equal.

Before any decision is made, school officials certainly should tell us the cost of building on the present site; the cost of acquiring adjacent lands and buildings at the present site; what it would cost to transplant existing facilities to an outlying site,

We promise the Board they will have an angry pack of citizens buzzing at their ears if both alternatives aren't explored and publicized in equal detail.

As outlined before, we are working on the theory that the Schools have responsibility beyond just providing classrooms, books and teachers for

As custodians and spenders of 70 cents of every single tax dollar, they also should share in general community planning and in providing recreational and cultural facilities which fall naturally into powers given a Board of Education.

Someday, of course, the giant Plymouth School District will have four or five high schools spotted upon it. But today, one will serve, and in our opinion it should be placed in the existing center of the community, rather than placed as the hub of some new neighborhood swirl which might arise on open land

We have a vision of a new, modern "campus" at the present high school site. We can see it sparking the whole internal re-development of Plymouth. Behind the building of the "campus" could come the urban re-development across the street in the Daisy area; the razing of the ancient City Hall and the erection of a new one. (Ideally a joint City-Township building, shared by good neighbor governments.)

Approved was a tentative budget of \$2,109,895. This is an increase over the current fiscal year's budget of \$220, 747.88. The largest share of the increased budget is in the "instruction" column. Set aside for increment salary increases, pay raises, in-ser-vice teacher training compensation and 11 new teachers is \$155,100.

The actual budget cannot be approved until after the Tax Allocation Board makes its decision and the State sets its equalization for Wayne County.

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
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
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Resident Joins Educational Television Staff

Broadcasting engineer How-ard W. Town, Plymouth, has joined the staff of the National Educational Television and Radio Center in Ann Arbor as technical director, Vice President Kenneth L. Yourd announced. Town will be stationed in Ann Arbor.

Formerly with the Radio Corporation of America, Town will be responsible for the engineering and technical services of NETRC. This will include work with the Center's affiliated stations on broadcasting problems, and technical work on TV films distributed by the national organization.

At age 23, the Plymouth man carried out an assign-ment which took him to Caracas, Venezuela, to assist in the installation of a TV sta-tion. He also helped establish a station in Uruguay as a field representative with RCA.

Town helped to install the closed-circuit color TV facilities at Walter Reed Army Medical Center, as well as similar facilities at Strategic Air Command Headquarters in Omaha. He conducted a 16-week course in operations at SAC.

Almost as color television became a reality, Town began specializing in that new field. He assisted in the installation of RCA's first color TV apparatus outside of New York City at WKY, Oklahoma City.

Town received his engineering training at the Detroit Electronics Institute, Cass Technical Institute and at the National Broadcasting Co., as well as special training with RCA. He received additional instruction while serving with the Navy.

Town is a graduate of Ply-mouth High School. He will continue to live in Plymouth.

Where's Our Independence?

In a Reader's Digest story of 15 years ago, entitled "Young Man, Be Your Own Boss!," author, advertising man, diplomat and statesman William Benton viewed with a larm the urge of youth, emerging from the cocoon of college, to seek the economic bomb shelter of employment in big business.

"This concentration on security." he wrote, "is perhaps the worst enemy our country faces." And the fact that this article is being reprinted by request in the May issue, would indicaté that many others fear the takeit-easy, play-it-safe, virus still gnaws at the vitals of our most promising young men.

"What did America's best young men do before they were bug-eyed about big business?" Mr. Benton asks. "They worked for other men until they had saved enough (or not quite enough) to go into business for themselves. And then, they went. They started humbly-but they started for themselves."

The article emphasizes that the wealth of America was not built by big business, but by "individual, hard-hitting, hard-working men" who established independent, competitive businesses. A to r n a d o warning is issued by the local weather station when conditions exist in which a tornado m i g h toccur. It does not mean that a tornado is in the area, but but most often they are experienced between 3 and 7 p.m. In nearly all c a s e s, tornadoes move from t he southwest toward the northeast at a speed of 25 to 40 miles an hour. However, the U.S. Weather Bureau records show that their speed m a y vary from 5 to 139 miles an hour.



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


