



Residents of most communities realize that the resence of industry within the limits helps keep down the home-owner's tax bill. But always the question: where should plants be located?

The easiest answer always is, "over near somebody else's neighborhood." Easy, of course, except for the residents there.

place and is what will preserve it. We haven't heard of any suburban high school alumni association as large or as active as Bentlev's. The group deserves Livonia's admiration. It's one more little thing which makes the City a nice place to live.

### LEGAL NOTICE

Rules and Regulations - Pointe Mouillee State Game Area

The Conservation Commission, by authority of Act 17, P.A. 1921, hereby orders that for a period of five years from September 15, 1959, it shall be unlawful to use the lands and waters within the Pointe Mouillee State Game Area in Sec. 21, 24, 25, 26, 35, and 36, T 5 S, R 10 E; Sec. 1, 2, and 11, T 6 S, R 10 E; Sec. 30 and 31, T 5 S, R 11 E; as posted, except under the follow ing rules and regulations: HUNTING, TRAPPING, AND FISHING RULES AND REGULA-

The Pointe Mouillee State Game Area shall be divided into three units described as follows: CONTROLLED HUNTING

This unit shall include the area bounded by a line starting at northwest corner of Sec. 25, T 5 S, R 10 E, and running easterly along south bank of Huron River to Pointe Moulilee Canal in the SE 14 of said section; thence southerly along said canal to the west line of Sec. 31, T 5 S, R 11 E: thence south along said section line to the shores of Lake Erie; thence southwesterly along shore line to the most westerly part of Cripple Point in SW 14 1, T 6 S, R 10 E; thence west to north and south quarter line of Sec. 2, T 6 S, R 10 E; thence north to the center of Sec. 35, T 5 S, R 10 E; thence east 14 mile; thence north 1 mile; thence eact 14 mile more or less; thence north to point of beginning, as posted; except the portion set aside as the Waterfowl Refuge

Within this unit it shall be unlawful for any person: 1. To hunt during the period beginning with the opening of the waterfowl hunting season and

extending through October 19 or to trap at any time without first securing a written permit from the authorized representative of the Conservation Department in charge of the area. Such permit shall be issued only upon presentation by applicant of his valid hunting or trapping license and, if the permit is to be for waterfowl hunting, his valid migratory bird hunting stamp.

2. To fish during the waterfowl hunting season.

3. To bunt after 4:00 p.m., E.S.T. B. WATERFOWL REFUGE UNIT This unit shall include the area bounded by a line beginning (near the mouth of the Huron River) at the intersection of the canal and Vermet Channel with the Huron River as posted and running S 32 degrees W 13 chains along east side of Vermet Channel; thence S 22 degrees E 12 chains to northeast corner of Sec. 36, T 5 S, R 10 E; thence S 18 degrees W 13 chains; thence S 36 degrees W 34 chains; thence S 5 degrees W 20 chains; thence S 62 degrees 'V 18 chains; thence S 28 degrees W 24 chains; thence S 65 degrees E 40 chains; thence N 37 degrees E 90 chains; thence due north 30 chams; hence N 18 degrees W 40 chains; hence northwesterly to point of beginning, as posted.

Within this unit it shall be unlawful, during the waterfowl hunting season, for any person: To hunt, fish, trap, or disturb waterfowl or to enter for any other purpose without written permission duly authorized representative of the Conservation Department.
C. UNRESTRICTED HUNTING

This unit shall include all remaining lands within the Pointe Mouillee State Game Area not ineluded in the Controlled Hunting Unit and Waterfowl Refuge Unit, as posted and as described above.
POINTE MOUILLEE STATE GAME AREA - ALL UNITS: Within the entire Pointe Mouillee State Game Area it shall be unlawful for any person:

1. To conduct commercial fishing operations of any kind. 2. To take fur-bearing animals except under special permit.

3. To possess or use firearms during closed seasons on wa terfowl and upland game without written permission. PENALTY

Violation of any rule or failure to perform any act set forth in the rules is punishable by a fine of ot more than \$100 and costs of ecution, or by imprisonment in the county jail for not more thanprisonment in the discretion of the

# ORDINANCE NO. 257

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 33 AND SEC-TION 36 OF ORDINANCE NO. 183, AS AMENDED, SAME BEING KNOWN AS THE "TRAFFIC ORDI-

THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

Section 1. Section 33 and Section 36 of Ordinance No. 183, as amended, entitled "AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE THE USE AND OPERATION OF VEHICLES ON THE PUBLIC HIGHWAYS WITHIN THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH, MICHIGAN, TO PROVIDE A PENALTY FOR VIOLATION THEREOF AND TO RE-PEAL THE TRAFFIC ORDINANCE, NO. 99, AS AMENDED AND ALL ORDINANCES AND PARTS OF ORDINANCES CONTRAVENING THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE" are hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 33. (a) Any person who drives any vehicle upon a highway carelessly and heedlessly in willful or wanton disregard of the rights or safety of others, or without due caution and circumspection and at a speed or in a manner so as to endanger or be likely to endanger any person or property, shall be guilty of reckless driving and upon conviction shall be punished as provided in section three of this ordinance.

b. Every person convicted of reckless driving under paragraph (a) of this section shall, on a second or subsequent offense, be punished by imprisonment for not more than ninety (90) days or by a fine of not more than Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 36. (a) It shall be unlawful and punishable for any person whether licensed or not, who is an habitual user of narcotic drugs, barbital or any derivative of barbital, or any person who is under the influence of intoxicating liquor, narcotic drugs, barbital or any derivative of barbital to drive or be in actual physical control of any vehicle upon any highway. It shall be the duty of the Magistrate before accepting a plea of guilty under this section to advise the accused of the statutory consequences possible as a result of a plea of guilty in regard to revocation of his operator's or chauffeur's license, financial responsibility, the pen-alty imposed for violation of this section and the limitation of his right to appeal.

(b) It shall also be unlawful and punishable for the owner of any motor vehicle, or any person having such in charge or in control thereof to authorize or knowingly permit the same to be driven or operated upon any highway by any person who is an habitual user of narcotic drugs, barbital or any derivative of barbital, or by any person who is under the influence of intoxicating liquor, narcotic drugs, barbital, or any derivative of barbital.

(c) Any person who is convicted of a violation of paragraph (a) or (b) of this section shall be punished as provided in section three of this ordinance.

On a second or subsequent conviction under this section such person shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and punished by imprisonment for not more than ninety (90) days, and, in the discretion of the court, a fine of not more than Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars.

(d) The operator's or chaffeur's license of any person found guilty of violating the provisions of this section shall thereupon be surrendered to the court in which such conviction shall be had and the judge of such court shall dispose of such license and take the action required by Section 625 of Act No. 300, Public Acts of 1949, as amended, (being Section 9.2325 M.S.A., as amended).

Section 2. This ordinance shall become operative and effective on the 30th day of September A.D. 1959.
