Theatre Owner Harry R. Lush **Dies in West**

Harry R. Lush, owner of the Penn Theatre and associated with the theatre business in Plymouth since 1921, died at LaJolla, Calif. Monday morning at the age of 69. Coming to Plymouth in 1919, Mr. Lush leased the threeyear-old Penniman-Allen Theatre in July 1921 from Kate Allen. In 1941 he built and opened the Penn Theater and five years ago sold the Penniman-Allen. When the Penn was opened,

Mr. Lush decided to offer only first-run movies and as single features. The policy has persisted, and the Penn is among the few theaters that consistently runs single

A native of Iowa, Mr. Lush was a member of the Variety Club, the Allied Theaters of Michigan, Detroit Power Squad, the Northville Com-mandry of Knights Templar and Plymouth Rock Lodge,

Mr. Lush moved from Plymouth to Aguana, Calif. in San Diego County 10 years He is survived by his wife, Charlotte.


