
Nine Wayne area young men were rounded up last week in connection with a series of six deliberately-set fires in Canton Township and all have pleaded guilty to setting one of the fires.

Appearing in the court of Justice of the Peace John L. Mokersky Monday afternoon, all nine admitted taking part in starting a fire early on the morning of April 13 that burned an abandoned garage near Warren and Sheldon Roads.

They were caught when an alert neighbor spied some of the boys sitting on a Thunderbird convertible watching firemen fight the blaze.

It was at 1:08 a.m. on April 18 that Canton Township firemen got a call to the garage fire at 7250 Sheldon. Since the garage and shed were on property that had been abandoned, it was evident that the fire was the work of an arsonist.

Paint Tips for Bedrooms NEW YORK UPI) - When bedroom needs to double as a study, guest-or-activity room, make it appear as spa cious as possible.

Ceilings should be painted white to reflect up to 85 per cent of the light that strikes the surface. Use a "flat" p a i n t to diffuse light correctly. Glossy paint, when used on large surfaces, can create glare. However, use a glossy enamel on woodwork and furniture which needs to be scrubbed often.

Resale value is another big factor in deciding which optional equipment to have in the new car. Up to 100 per cent of the cost of certain extras could be returned when the car is resold. A car without any extra equipment is hard to sell and brings little on the used car lot.

The resale value actually might

And another item all the members of the family might do well to remember is that caring for the auto is really a family project.

The woman's role, then, would be to care for the car's interior.

It's a lot simpler to keep the inside of the car clean than it used to be. The use of new fabrics-nylon, rayon or vinyl-saves both time and energy. Many of the new cars are upholstered throughout with vinyl alone or combination of vinyl and nylon cloth or vinyl and woven plastic.

Before any cleaning of the upholstery is done, the car should be thoroughly swept out with a whisk broom or cleaned with a vacuum cleaner. Then all glass parts are washed with water to which a little ammonia has been added. Don't forget the rear view mirror and any glass covering dials on the dashboard.

Any chromium parts such as door or window handles can be polished with a good metal polish. All other metal inside the car usually needs only wiping off with a soft cloth. If paint has been scraped, touch-up enamel will cover any small worn places.

holstery, their removal depends on the upholstery and the nature of the stain. For vinyl, wiping with a damp cloth or washing with warm water and mild soap should be sufficient. Ordinary cleaning fluid is never used on vinyl plastics.

Nylons, rayon carpeting or plastic seat covers are best cleaned with a special interior trim cleaner, if a damp cloth doesn't erase the stain. Rubber floor covering is easily washed with a cleaning concentrate. If this is allowed to dry thoroughly, there is less chance of a white stain being left on the rubber.

Stains on cloth upholstery are usually removed with cleaning fluid or one of the spot removers. Chewing gum, candy, tar, pieces of sticky food should be scraped gently with a dull knife to take off any solid particles before a cleaner is applied.

Milk or similar stains should be treated first with cold water. Warm water and mild soap should take care of any marks remaining after the cold application.

Genuine leather upholstery is treated much like vinyl-a damp cloth will take care of most of the spots. For stubborn stains, a good leather cleaner may be used.



Tools with moving parts-like grass shears, hedge clippers and pruning shears-should not be stored in the sand box, but hung on hooks on the wall. Spades, forks, rakes, and other long-handled tools should be supported in the same way

Your power mower deserves a corner of its own, close to the door where it can conveniently be wheeled in and out. Provide a shelf above it for wrenches, extra spark plugs and other small parts.

The gasoline to power your mower should be stored in a standard, two-or five-gal¹on safety can with a flexible spout.

Soak hand tools in water and detergent, and scrub them well. Clean the metal parts with a wire brush and rub them with sand-paper or emery paper.

Coarse emery powder and oil used on a piece of old carpet will also quickly brighten them. Or use one of the manufactured rust removers or penetrating oils; these cost little and save a lot of labor.

Scrape the wooden handles with a wood scraper or a piece of glass to remove the old paint and rough splinters. Then carefully sand them and paint them.



New Consumers' Chief Foresees State Prosperity

Continued growth and pros-perity for Michigan are foreseen by A. H. Aymond, Jr., executive vice president of Consumers Power Company, who will become chairman of the board and chief executive officer May 1.

"It has a location that any state might envy. The Great Lakes give it not only the greatest fresh water supply in the world but also access to world trade by way of the St. Lawrence Seaway."

He conceded that Michigan has problems, asking, "What state or what person has not?" He listed some:

We have the problem of providing 100,000 additional jobs a year for the next ten years in order to meet the anticipated growth of our population. "We have the problem of

adjusting our tax structure to keep it fair to everyone. That certainly includes the industrial taxpayer who provides employment and creates "We have the problem of

keeping the cost of industrial production in Michigan on a competitive level with other states, which means that if wages are high, industrial productivity must be correspondingly high.

"Taxes must be commensurate with the governmental services that government provides."
