The Russian premier gave us a chance to explain the spy plane. He sucked us in. We lunged with a falsehood for an explanation, and he was ready to pull the rug out the moment the State Department uttered it.

Since then he has wrung every last drop of propaganda out of the incident and we have had to cringe and suffer global humiliation.

It's no longer a little lie. It's a big one.

It was uttered, of course, because this whole darn country has become washed in the belief that the end justifies the means; that it's no lie if you get away with it.

And that brings us right back to home, to our own suburban communities, our personal lives, to our local politics, to the classroom and the church auditorium. That's where it starts.

And then comes the day when the consequences are to be faced; at the summit in this particular week of history. Not to mention Cuba.

Two editorial orchids should be delivered today:

First to the Plymouth Township board for voluntarily taking action which takes the Treasurer off the "fee" basis of pay and on a straight, fair salary. The earnings under the old "fee" system were far out of line when compared with other Township employees. The subject was a campaign issue at the last election but the Democratic opponents who did all the talking and promised "action" after the election instead disappeared from sight. The voluntary Board action is a sparkling show of good faith with the taxpayers.

And a second orchid to Al Glassford of Plymouth who this week quarterbacked a "Michigan Week' program here which was one of the spriteliest in the whole state. 

However, the Niagara Frontier State Park Commission has been aware of this crack and others for years. "We don't believe there's any danger of a rockfall at this time," said Keith R. Hopkins, superintendent of maintenance. "It's highly possible those cracks go back thousands of years,"

## **Texans Beware:** Eskimos Now

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (UPI)—Texans watch out! Alaska is not only the largest state in the union, but part of its Eskimo population is urning cowpoke and branching out into the bronc bust-ing game.

In the remote village of Nikolski, 1,000 miles southwest of here in the Aleutian Islands, the Eskimos are "tickled pink" with their new found sport—rodeo.
The Eskimos recently

watched and then participated in one of the wildest wild west shows since Buffalo Bill Cody barnstormed across the country to Madison Square Garden.

There are only 60 people in the village, the majority of them Eskimos, but there are Air Force men stationed at a Dew Line radar site nearby.

Between the U.S. Air Force men and the Eskimos anything went when the hastily constructed chutes flew open and the horses and bulls charged out trying to shake loose their riders.

The first rodeo met with such enthusiastic response it probably will become a regular event. One thing's for sure. It's the only rodeo in all of Alaska.

The first contest was spon-sored by the Harris Aleutian village as entertainment for the airmen and Eskimos, But before it was over everyone was in the act.

After Nick Pans, foreman of the Harris Ranch, demon-strated that it was possible to stay on the back of a bucking and twisting bull, the Eskimos and airmen gave it a

try. Nikoloski Island, which has sub-Arctic climate and an annual temperature range in the upper 30's, is an interesting place even without the Eskimos practicing their new found game.

The vegetation consists of grass which grows a foot high, but there are no trees or shrubs. In the summer months the hills are a mass of miniature flowers. There is very little snow in the win-ter but Nikoloski gets more than its share of fog and

The Eskimos on the island are highly skilled seal hunt-ers and for several months each summer they migrate to the Pribilof Islands to kill the famous hair seal.

The only other employ-ment there is found at the Harris Ranch which produces wool. So, Texas, watch out, before Alaska steals all your thunder.

Stone said one large commercial organization esti-mated after a detailed survey that termites each year nvade about two million houses in which their dining produces enough damage to send the owner in quest of professional aid.

How many marauders escape detection, or haven't yet reached the stage where their depredations produce a call for help, is anybody's guess, Stone said.

In any event, the winged insects now are found in all continental states except Alaska. Alaska is believed to be free of them, but Stone said that might be only because there has been no intensive study there.

Termites, which love warm, moist places, now are found even in such semiarid regions as Arizona and New Mexico, Stone said.

Modern building practices tend to help support the invaders. Stone said homes built on concrete slabs not only provide a cozy winter residence for termites but permit them to eat the year round, instead of just durng the summer months. Protected and insulated craw spaces provide just the right environment, he said.

The trend to suburbia also is suspect, since man is moving to the natural domain of the termite, who got to this earth ahead of him by several million years. Unlike man, the termite has come down through the eons little changed from his ancestors. While there are many species of termites, Stone has one rule of thumb to distinguish them from the flying ant, which looks pretty sim-



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



Most first-time buyers of high fidelity music systems start with a turntable or record changer as a music source but eventually buy

A tuner, attached to a high fidelity rig, allows the owner to get frequency modulated (FM) or amplitude modulated (AM) radio programs or

Because of the quality of the speakers and amplifiers in a real high fidelity system, broadcast music - even AM - sounds better than on the best standard radio.

There are tuners that will receive only FM broadcasts and only AM broadcasts. Tuners that will receive both kinds of broadcasts nowadays have independent circuits, so that AM and FM broadcasts can be received simultaneously.

The reason for this is that some broadcasters owning both an AM and an FM station use their AM fransmitter to broadcast one channel of a sterio program and their FM transmitter to broadcast the other channel.

A person buying an AM-FM tuner should be sure that the FM and AM operate independently.

If there are no AM-FM stereo broadcasts in your city, but there is an FM station, you may save money by buying an FM only tuner. The quality of AM broadcasting is not of full high fidelity

AM's shortcomings as a high - quality music source are not obvious when it is being used as one channel of a stereo broadcast. But it does not come out well in contrast with music from records, or FM.

FM can only be expected to grow and some authorities are wondering whether it may not threaten AM broadcasting. The interest in high fidelity sound and the better quality of music on FM are the main reason it has been growing in recent years.

Tuners range from reasonably priced jobs to de luxe ones. One of the most important specifications to watch for in buying an FM tuner is its sensitivity.

The sensitivity is expressed in microvoits and the lowe the number of microvolts, the more sensitive the tuner

But a good outside antenna can greatly increase the sensitivity of a tener, so that a moderately priced job can be made to do the work of a more expensive tuner without an outside antenna.

FM tuners tend to drift as their tubes heat up and in the case of moderately priced tuners it is essential that they have an automatic frequency control (AFC) to hold them on stations.

The three or four most expensive tuners are engineered so finely that they do not require AFC.

Another helpful gimmickthough not an essential oneon FM tuners is some sort of muting device to knock out the "white" noise between stations. This device automatically goes off when you tune into a station.

And there should be something — a meter or what used to be called a "magic eye" tube — to tell when you are in the center of an FM signal. FM is not as easy to tune by ear as AM and you may discover that the station is distorted where it comes in the loudest.

As FM broadcasting grows, so will multiplexing, which is a means of transmitting another signal on top of an FM

Eventually, this probably will be the way most stereo broadcasting is done, since the multiplexed signal will have much higher quality than an AM signal.

Most FM tuners have a special socket to which a multiplex adapter can be hooked when multiplexing starts in your city.

So there is no point in putting off the buying of a tuner because it has no built - in circuit so you can receive regular FM and multiplexed FM. No tuners on the market now have a built - in multiplex circuit anyway.

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

## Commuter May Spend Three Years in Forty Just Commuting

Object of fascination to sociologists, ulcer specialists, railroad executives and traffic cops-that's the American legion known as the Com-

He travels to work via automobile, railroad, bus, subway, ferry, bicycle. plane or helicopter—or combinations thereof. In most cases; he does this to give his children the benefit of a grass-roots, fresh-air childhood away from the grimy bustle of midtown.

The facts of his complicated life are one of the most amazing aspects of the American scene today.

For instance: a commuter who lives 25 miles from his job journeys 50 miles a day, 250 miles a week, 13,-000 miles a year and perhaps half a million miles in a lifetime of commuting! A fellow who com mutes three hours a day for 40 years de- ings of the railroad, the overwhelm-

votes mor than three of those years to the mere process of getting to and from work.

For some commuters, the journey is not the smoothest. Though the rigors of New York subway travel are famous, the statistics are not: between eight and nine a.m. more than 80,000 people pass through the Grand Central Station of New York's IRT Lexington line-more than pass through any other spot in the 50

If the commuter travels by railand 50 percent of all rail passengers are commuters-he's not only wedded to a timetable but perpetually tuned in to the plaints of railroads who in a recent year were \$700,000,000 in the red.

Despite these well-regulated work-

ing majority of commuters prefer multi-story parking buildings rising to be used exclusively by members auto travel. In 17 of America's 25 biggest cities, the car is the most common means of getting to work, and oddly enough, rush-hour traffic travels at roughly the same rate in nearly all big cities-about 20 m.p.h.

The nation's slowest rides are on a San Antonio bus and a streetcar in Pittsburgh—each at a nerve-fraying eight m.p.h. Fastest is the muchmaligned Long Island Railroad, at a 36-m.p.h. clip.

The commuter preference for cars may help swell the car population to 100 million vehicles for 220 million Americans by 1975, say statisticians.

No matter how efficiently manufacturers build new cars, the commuter still finds himself running out of places to park them. Hence the

What commuter has not ridden with the yakker, the speedster, the aspirant for the Good Housekeeping Seal who is atwitter lest you dirty or burn his upholstery?

Then there's the social climber who switches pools constantly in his. chase for status ... the errand-runner who must stop off at the bakery ... the fellow who starts rounding up riders for the evening trip at 4 p.m.

A car pool can be a matchless forum for socializing and salesmanship. To preserve the camaraderie, some car-pool members have even been chipping in to buy a "club" car for the commute.

It works-if one fellow is conscientious enough to keep all the records, attend to all necessary repairs and collect the expense money.

Last October, Nikita Khrushchev told a Siberian audience that "We will use automobiles more rationally than the Americans do. We are going to establish taxi pools where people can use cars when they need them. Why should a man worty about parking space? Why should he take the trouble to bother with it?"

Saying "Amen" to the Premier's last comment, some Americans are hopping aboard "air taxis." Chicago recently inaugurated helicopter hops for commuters from Gary, Ind., and a similar service puts Baltimore and

Washington within commuting distance of each other.

Is this the way for the commuter to rise above his problems? Not completely. In most cases, he still must pay taxes to two communities. While he's away, his wife vegetates in a largely manless town. His daughters, reared in the good clean air of Suburbia, are healthy, all right, but when these red-blooded specimens reach courting age, they may confront a shortage of men.

In some suburban communities, women between 25 and 45 outnumber the menfolk of equivalent ages almost three to two!

But is the commuter discouraged or do you find him hotfooting it back to town? In the majority of cases, no. Like Old Man River, he just keeps rolling ... uh, commuting ... along.







2) "Learning is an active process. You need to set up a study schedule society. and stick to it.'

4) "Education is a lonely business. Bull sessions, for example, are nice, but they are no substitute for the isolated one-to-one relationship between you and your book."

5) "We're all basically lazy; we do only enough to get by. But in order to be a good student you have to be dissatisfied even if you get all A's with little effort. You must demand more of yourself."

6) "The intelligent, educated person needs to develop the ability to lis-



## If Cars Get Any Lower, Eyeballs Will Drag Road

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI)-If America's automobiles continue along the trend of low, underslung design, it wouldn't be long before the driver's eyeballs would be dragging the ground, a civil engineer says.

Clyde E. Lee of the University of Texas surveyed the design of some 2,000 automobiles and found that the driver's scope of view has dropped more than six inches in the past decade.

But Lee believes engineering changes will be made to ensure good driving visibility and that highway designs will change to meet the changing body styles of automobiles.

The trend toward lower cars has accelerated in recent years, Lee pointed out. "You can't make the eye height any lower than 3.5 feet without having the driver practically lying on his back-3.5 feet is the practi-

cal timit," he said.
"If we should continue at the present rate, we'd have the driver's eyeballs drag-ging the ground by the year 2,000," he added.
The reduced scope of vis-

ion should be taken into consideration when constructing new highways, Lee said. He added that it is no longer realistic to build roads for the 4.5-foot eye level of a decade ago.

"I-don't propose that exist-ing hill crests be lowered, but in future designs, hills, no-passing zones and guard rails should be adjusted to the current eye levels of au-tomobiles,!' Lee said. Lee does not believe that

the lower auto designs are all bad, because lower cars make for better stability on

Eye level isn't the only thing to consider when attemp)s are made to improve highways, he said. When we set a minimum for foad design standards,

we need representative values for eye height, reaction time, performance characteristics covering a large percentage of autos."
