Burglary is a big business and vacation time is its peak season. If more householders were aware of this and took steps to "burglar-proof" their homes, the burglary rate could be sharply reduced.

The annual crime reports issued by Mr. J. Edgar Hoover's Federal Bureau of Investigation show that the annual property loss due to burglary, which has been on the increase for a number of years, passed the \$100,000,000 mark back in 1957. The figure climbed to another new record in 1958 and remained at that record breaking level

Will there be another new record in 1960? That depends on whether you, the householder, take steps to prevent it. These steps are particularly important if you are planning to be away on an extended vacation or a long

A research study indicates that the burglar's principal ally, surprisingly enough, is the person he victimizes. If it were not for errors of omission and commission and mistakes in judgment made by property owners, the burglary rate would be much

lower. The suggestions make it possible for property owners to "burglar glar-proof" their homes and cut down on the fantastic hauf made by burglars in recent years.
Mistakes That Help Burglars

These are the principal errors people make which allow ourglars to break records each year:

1. Leaving a home with exterior doors or windows unlocked or inadequately locked.

2. Failure to equip ALL exterior doors with secure pin tumbler cylinder

3. Failute to stop delivery of mail, milk, and news-papers by letter or telephone call when you are going on vacation, Accumulated milk bottles, piled up newspapers, and a stuffed mail box show the burglar that a house is unoccupied. Leaving a note for the milk man or newspaper boy will stop delivery, but it can also inform a burglar that you will be away from home. The circulation department of your newspaper will be happy to arrange to have the paper follow

you on vacation. 4. Leaving a note for pros pective guests in the mailbox saying, "key is under doormat yourself at home." Burglars will also appreciate such thoughtfulness.

5. Notifying the local newspaper editor about your vacation before you leave rather than after you return. Thieves are quick to take advantage of such accommodating news items.
