


INSIDE VIEW of the new Post Office addition shows the great amount of space now available. The new addition offers two and a half times the floor space of the original build-

LANSING - Minor parties in the game.

Only one independent - that is, a man who was neither a Democrat nor a Republican has been elected to the Legislature since the two parties became dominant forces in politics, but the minor parties continue to nominate and vote for candidates.

This year, at least five of the minority groups are expected to have slates before the people.

Two of them have never been on the ballot before. Another, the Prohibition party, has been a relatively powerful minority group for many

Two Socialist factions, the Socialist Workers party and the Socialist Labor party, are continuing campaign efforts.

The new groups on the ballot are the Independent American party and the Tax Cut party.

In past years, at least 20 minority parties have appeared on the ballot at one time or another. The Prohibitionists have consistently polled the most votes, hitting a high of 14,249 votes for governor in 1948 when Democrat G. Mennen Williams first tpok office.

First minority party to get on the Michigan ballot was the Liberty party, which made the grade in 1841.

While it is easy — and not uncommon — to brand the minority parties as "crackpots," "radicals" or with groups are not necessarily anything but good Americans with particularly strong ideas on certain issues.

Your Guide To Harness Racing



WHAT IS THE STARTER'S CHIEF AIM?

The starter endeavors to have all horses get-eway from the starting line in position and on gait.

DO ALL TRACKS USE STARTING GATES?

All tracks at which pari-mutuel wagering is conducted use the mobile gate. A few county fairs still use the stationary starter in an elevated stand, but many recalls often result from this starting method. The invention of the mobile gate has revolutionized the sport.

WHAT DO YOU MEAN-REVOLUTIONIZED THE SPORT?

Before the introduction of the mobile gate after World War II, a set schedule of races was difficult since no one knew how long it would take to achieve an even start. Spectators were unhappy when their choices were handicapped many lengths by an uneven start.

HOW DOES THE MOBILE GATE WORK?

It's a set of wings or extensions at right angles to the chassis of the automobile on which they are mounted. This barrier acts to prevent any horse from getting ahead of the starting gate. The horses line up behind this gate and move with gradually increasing speed to the starting point. The wings then fold forward against the side of the car and the starter accelerates the gate ahead and to the side of the track leaving clear passage for the horses.

HOW DOES THE DRIVER OF THE GATE KNOW HOW FAST TO GO WHEN HE'S LOOKING FORWARD?

All he does is steer. The acceleration is under the control of the starter who is facing the contestants.



IS THERE A RE-START IF THE HORSES ARE NOT UP TO THE GATE?

When the field lines up behind the gate a quarter-mile from the starting point, it is the driver's responsibility to keep in position and up with the gate. The starter sounds a recall only if a horse scores (starts) ahead of the gate, or there is interference, broken equipment, a horse falls or a horse refuses to come up to the gate before the 7/8 pole is reached.

HOW FAST ARE THEY GOING AT THE START?

Starting a quarter of a mile away, the gate moves not less than 11 miles per hour for the first 1/8 mile, then not less than 18 miles per hour for the next 1/16 and from there to the starting point gradually accelerates to maximum speed of about 35 miles per hour.

CAN A DRIVER IMPROVE THE CHANCES OF A SLOWER HORSE?

Driving skill influences the outcome of many races. Ability to take advantage of openings, to feel the pace of his horse and to sense the distress or reserve of horses either trailing or ahead of him, can go a long way toward overcoming apparent differences in timed ability among the entrants in a given race.

WHY DOES A DRIVER CARRY A STOP WATCH?

Harness horses are rated. That is a driver knows just how fast his horse should go each quarter mile to enable him to turn in his best effort. 

WHAT IS THE STARTER'S CHIEF AIM?

The starter endeavors to have all horses get away from the starting line in position and on gait.

DO ALL TRACKS USE STARTING GATES?

All tracks at which pari-mutuel wagering is conducted use the mobile gate. A few county fairs still use the stationary starter in an elevated stand, but many recalls often result from this starting method. The invention of the mobile gate has revolutionized the sport.

WHAT DO YOU MEAN—REVOLUTIONIZED THE SPORT?

Before the introduction of the mobile gate after World War II, a set schedule of races was difficult since no one knew how long it would take to achieve an even start. Spectators were unhappy when their choices were handicapped many lengths by an uneven start.

HOW DOES THE MOBILE GATE WORK?

It's a set of wings or extensions at right angles to the chassis of the automobile on which they are mounted. This barrier acts to prevent any horse from getting ahead of the starting gate. The horses line up behind this gate and move with gradually increasing speed to the starting point. The wings then fold forward against the side of the car and the starter accelerates the gate ahead and to the side of the track leaving clear passage for the horses.

HOW DOES THE DRIVER OF THE GATE KNOW HOW FAST TO GO WHEN HE'S LOOKING FORWARD?

All he does is steer. The acceleration is under the control of the starter who is facing the contestants.



IS THERE A RE-START IF THE HORSES ARE NOT UP TO THE GATE?

When the field lines up behind the gate a quarter-mile from the starting point, it is the driver's responsibility to keep in position and up with the gate. U.S. Census

Last year, 3,699 residents of Michigan turned to the U.S. Bureau of the Census for help in proving they were born. Those persons were among an estimated 30 million United States residents who are without proof of age or birth. The historical records of the Census Bureau provide the only source of this information for most of these 30 million people. Proof of age or birth is

needed today to collect social security and other retirement benefits. It is needed to obtain a passport. It is carrying certain age or citizenship retain age or citizenship requirements. It is needed for

some forms of insurance. Since 1920, the Census Bureau has provided more than three and one-half million persons with copies of their Census records on age, place of birth, citizenship, or kinship. Persons seeking such records of facts about themselves should write to the Personal Census Service Branch, Bureau of the Census, Pittsburg, Kansas, for a Census Records Search Application Form.

A fee of \$3 is charged for a search of not more than two censuses for one person and for one copy of the information found. Additional copies cost \$1 each. An expedited search costs \$4.00. Expedited searches are usually completed within a few days while the routine \$3.00 search may take up to 30 days, depending upon the backlog of requests and the ease or difficulty in locating the information.

The personal information in the records of the 1900 and later Censuses is confidential by law and may be furnished only upon the written request of the person to whom it relates or, for a proper purpose, a legal representative such as guardian or administrator of an estate. Information regarding a child who has not reached legal age may be obtained upon the written request of either par-



In the past, candidates for the legislature usually were lonely hitchhikers left stand-ing in the road. The nominee for President always had a kind word for nominees for U. S. Senator and for Governor, and for the nominee for Congress in the district he happened to be visiting. The man chosen for the White House always posed for pic-tures with these local dignitaries, sometimes on the rear platform of his campaign

Once in a while, even the top level nominees were left holding their hats. As in 1936, when Alf Landon deserted a parade arranged by the late Gov. Frank Fitzgerald in Detroit and spent almost two hours closeted with a Detroit newspaper editor while GOP leaders sought the vanishing hero from Topeka.

But almost always, the nominees for the State Senate and the House of Representatives were sardines jammed in the milling throng, weakly shouting "Hurrah!"

Yet the day came in Michigan that the candidates for the legislature were the only winners on the GOP state

Vice President Nixon came up from the ranks of local politics. More clearly than Tom Dewey or Wendell Will-kie or Alf Landon, he understands that his strength as a candidate for the Presidency rests on the determined sup-por of the local politician out there in the crowd.

Apparently Nixon is con-vinced, too, that if the Repub-lican Party is to survive and its platform of modera-tion is to save the nation from the plunge toward so-cialism and destructive taxation — the legislative can-didates are of major impor-

NE SATURDAY NIGHT there'll be a hillbilly band, with young people "stompin" at a country dance. Next week it may be a superformal hunt ball, with music by an orchestra imported from Washington or New York. And between Saturdays, in the same hall, maybe a lecture, a concert, a flower show, or a school play. Certainly a church service, often a farm-study group. And elsewhere on the grounds, a Boy Scout encampment, a water carnival, or a bowling tournament. Plus fireworks on the Fourth of July.

All these and many other activities take place at the busy Middleburg Community Center, hub of community life in a far suburb of Washington, D. C. Middleburg is a Virginia town of fewer than a thousand people, yet its Community Center drew an attendance of 71,560 people last year—more than 7,000 at church activities, more than 6,000 at educational meetings, more than 2,000 at civic-club functions, more than 11,000 admissions to the bowling alley, nearly 15,000 to the swimming pool. And these are but a few of the uses to which the Center is put.

A dozen years ago a house, a stable, and the town dump occupied the site on Middleburg's principal street where the Center stands now. Enter Mrs. Howell E. Jackson, a new resident of the area, daughter of an Ohio industrialist who many years ago pioneered employee-recreation programs. Mrs. Jackson and her husband saw country people standing around street corners in Middleburg, with literally shopped for groceries—women with babies, stranded on sidewalks, waiting for husbands. 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
