The Saga of Santa

In his 1600 years on earth Santa Claus has grown a long, white beard, moved from a small village in Asia Minor to a toy factory at the North Pole, and changed from flowing robes into a red and white furry suit. He's gotten shorter, rounder, and much, much merrier.

The original Santa Claus was born in Patras, Asia Minor, Young Nicholas - instead of being interested in games and play — devoted himself to the study of the Scriptures. Because of his remarkable boyhood, he was later accepted as the patron saints of children.

Being of very rich parents, Nicholas was able to share his wealth with others. He found particular joy in pro-viding gifts for children, or the dowry necessary to start a needy young woman on the road to a happy marriage. His travels brought him to the large city of Myra where he was consecrated Archbish-

St. Nicholas died on December 6, about 341 ... but not before he had saved a ship from a threatening storm with his prayer, found a way to feed all the people of Myra during a famine, and deposited three bags of gold upon the doorstep of a poor merchant.

Today, there is hardly a seacoast-city in any Catholic country that does not have a chapel dedicated to him. He is the patron saint of bankers, pawnbrokers, maidens, children, mariners, scholars .. and even thieves!

Europe has always cele-brated St. Nicholas D a y on December 6 and this is the traditional day of gift giving. But in the New World, St. Nicholas gave up his own day and became a well-loved part of the Christmas cele-

Dutch settlers brought Santa Nikalaus to New Amsterdam. At first he appeared to look like Father Knicker-

American history researchers at the John Hancock Mutual Life Insurance Company tells us that Thomas Nast famous cartoonist, periodically dressed his Santas in suits of red, white and blue for patriotism's sake.

Washington Irving described the merry gift giver as a tubby little fellow with a jolly manner who sped through the air on a reindeer

From this interpretation came the basis for Clement Clark Moore's beloved "A Visit From St. Nicholas." Doctor Moore, Professor at a New York Theological Seminary, composed the poem for his children who first heard it on Christmas Eve, 1822. "He was dressed all in furs

from his head to his foot and his clothes were all tarnished with ashes and soot ... he was chubby and plump, a right jolly old elf, and I laughed when I saw him in spite of myself.'

This was how Doctor Moore saw Santa Claus, and thanks to his vivid characterization, this is how children all over America have pictured him ever since.

The laughing man with the big heart adds to the joy of Christmas for children everywhere ... but what happens to the child who huddles on the stairway watching for Santa till his eyelids drop? Or the child who doesn't see footprints in the snow a Christmas morning? Or the child who has been told, there is no Santa Claus.

For him, Christmas lo-comes a sad time. A little girl named Virginia o nce wrote to a newspaper editor, asking him to help solve the puzzling problem of Santa's existence. Virginia received an answer that has become a classic in American journal-

All About BABIES

By William F. Burdick, M.D. Georgetown University Medical School

There's encouraging news and helpful advice mothers of babies of diaper age in a new booklet introduced at the recent annual meeting of the American Academy of Pediatrics. The booklet is entitled "A Mother's Guide to Diaper Hygiene.

The booklet was prepared by the Section on Medicine of the National Baby Care Council (the writer is chairman of this Section.) It is being distributed through pediatricians and physicians to the mothers of the nation's 8 million diaper wearing ba-

The theme of this valuable little booklet is that diaper rash can be prevented. It points out that there is no single cause for diaper rash but that there are five different causes that singly or in combination are responsi-ble for the ailment.

These five causes are: 1. Ammonia, the most common a powerful skin irritant formed by the decomposition of urine in the diaper. 2. Live bacteria, present in a washed, dried and clean

diaper that has not been sterilized. 3. Chafing of the skin due to a diaper left harsh after

washing.
4. Alkaline condition of the diaper resulting from most

conventional laundering. 5. Skin scalding due to the chemical action of traces of detergents or other washing materials which have not been completely rinsed out

of the diaper. "Good diaper hygiene to prevent diaper rash," states the booklet, "can be practiced simply and surely by diapering baby with correctly processed diapers, and following a fastidious diapering routine as long as baby

wears diapers."
The booklet points out that while it is possible to correctly process diapers at home, professional diaper processing is done under strict laboratory control, us-ing specialized washing and

rinsing equipment. The booklet details the proper procedure for the scientific processing of diapers in the home for those parents who do not use a professional diaper service. It also lists a series of hints for good diaper hygiene the mother can follow.

"It is a mistake," states the booklet, "to think that diaper rash occurs only during the early months. Babies can get diaper rash as long as they wear diapers. Indeed, the most distressing and dangerous cases tend to

be among older babies."

The booklet goes on to say there are several reasons for this. During the first few months, mothers are usually more fastidious and prompt in changing their baby's diapers. Any slight skin blemish is apt to be given prompt at tention. Proper diaper hygiene becomes increasingly important as the baby gets older when the diet contains substantial amounts of food that helps the urine to produce increased amounts of rash - causing ammonia.

LANSING - Led by Senator Frank D. Beadle, of St. Clair, Repubican State Senators have wrapped a Christmas present for Governor-elect John Swainson which embraces everything nice in the way of good will and friendship.

The Senators agreed to give their Democratic colleagues more power on the committees which control the bills that are to be killed or passed

They agreed that the Democratic naming these committees.

They told Swainson that he could pick the department heads, appointed by Gov. Williams, who will be conirmed by the Senate after January 11.

And Beadle set new harmony beween the Senate and the Governor's office when he praised Swainson as a me-time Senator and Lieutenant-Governor with whom Republicans have worked fairly well in the past, considering the sharp division of political philosophies.

Senator Beadle, who has been reelected as chairman of the GOP caucus, had trouble persuading all Republican leaders to join in the Christnas message of trust and goodwill.

Many questioned Beadle's confidence that there will be political peace during the 1961 session. Having been scarred by the toughest election battles of their careers, in which the UAW sent men and money into their districts to defeat them, the skeptidism of some is understandable.

But they went along with their chief in a spirit of hope.

So it will be up to the new Governor after January 1 to preserve the peace or break the faith.

While the Republican Senators were making their gallant gestures toward Swainson during the one-day pecial session, there were ominous levelopments within the Governor's office. August Scholle, president of the Michigan AFL-CIO Council, arrived with the man he picked to serve as Swainson's press secretary and at the same time presented the Governorelect with another key aide.

The office was taken over by Swainson following the election, when Williams left for South America, and remains his headquarters.

"Golden Almond Fruit Cake" slices beautifully when first made, yet is an excellent "keeper." The buttery pound cake is chock-full of elegant almonds and fruits. For gift mailing, bake it in 3 1-pound coffee tins, and send them in their containers.

coffee tins, and send them in their containers.

Thoroughly cream 1 cup (½ pound) butter or margarine; gradually beat in 1 cup sugar, creaming until light and fluffy. Add 5 eggs, one at a time, beating thoroughly after each addition. Sift 2½ cups all-purpose flour, measure and reserve ½ cup to toss with fruits. Sift 2 cups of the flour with 1 teaspoon baking powder and 1 teaspoon salt; blend into creamed mixture. Add ¼ teaspoon almond extract and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Toss together 1½ cups slivered blanched almonds, 1 cup golden raisins, 1½ cups (8 ounces) whole candied cherries and 1 cup (6 ounces) candied pineapple, cut in strips, with the ½ cup reserved flour; mix into cake batter. Line 1 (9-inch) tube pan or three greased 7 x 3½ inch loaf pans with heavy brown paper; grease paper. If fluted pan is used, grease well and flour, but do not line with paper. Pour in batter. Bake in slow oven (300 degrees F.) for 2 hours or until a toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool on wire rack. Wrap in brandy-soaked cloth and store in covered tin. Makes about 3¾ pounds fruit cake.



Fruit cake recipes are coming from treasured files these days in preparation for holiday baking. Here, a white fruit cake . . . reminiscent of pound cake and enhanced with Brazil nuts and preserved fruits . . . is both festive and delicious.

Have the Brazil nuts shelled ahead of baking time to speed up the cake assembly job. For speedy shelling, put in-shell Brazil nuts in the freezer section of the refrigerator or in a food freezer for a couple of hours or overnight. When the nuts are frozen, they can be easily cracked.

White Brazil Nut Fruit Cake

1 cup shortening 1 teaspoon baking powder 1 cup sugar 1/4 teaspoon salt 2 cups coarsely chopped 5 eggs 1½ teaspoons grated lemon rind

1½ cups mixed candied fruit 1½ cups candied cherries 1 tablespoon lemon juice 2½ cups sifted all-purpose flour, divided 1 cup white raisins

Cream shortening; gradually add sugar, creaming thoroughly. Beat in eggs one at a time; blend until smooth. Stir in lemon rind Sift together 2 cups of the flour, baking pow Gradually stir into creamed mixture. Toss Brazil nuts and fruit in remaining ½ cup flour; fold into batter. Turn into 2 greased and wax paper-lined 9 x 5 x 3-inch loaf pans or one 10-inch tube pan. Bake in slow oven (300°F.) 11/2 hours. Yield: 2 loaf cakes.
