

New Unit Started At State Home

Start of construction on a third major building at the Plymouth State Home and Training School was announced this week by Dr. Robert Jaslow, clinical director. Work is beginning on a 220bed infirmary building. The building, scheduled for completion in December of this year, will cost in excess of \$1,000,000.

Last October, a 220-bed custodial building was started that will be completed in August. When both buildings are completed, they will require a requested additional 337 employes.

"The new buildings," Dr. Jaslow stated, "are scheduled for completion much sooner than we originally anticipated. Our staff is very pleased with this development because of the concern we all have with the steadily growing waiting list."

Some Facts and Fallacies in First

bread and eating it. On a burn, butter may turn rancid and increase the possibility of infection. Many physicians recommend the use of a nonirritating antibiotic ointment. Mycitracin, an excellent oint-ment developed in the lab-oratories of The Upjohn Company, contains three antibiotics: neomycin, bacitracin and polymixin B. Together, these antibiotics form a "Sunday punch" which is highly effective in destroying nearly all the bacteria likely to be present on the skin. The cream does not sting or burn and does not stain clothing. 5. Mistake: If someone who has just been injured becomes unconscious, he has

probably "passed out" from Fact: The odds are that he is actually in a state of shock. To treat shock, a very serious condition in which the patient's skin becomes cool and pale (the patient may retain consciousness) have him lie down with his feet higher than his head. Loosen tight clothing. Place a blanket or coat under him, and another on top if weather conditions suggest it. If he is unconscious, place him face down with his head turned to one

6. Mistake: Bandage a wound as soon as possible. Fact: Bandaging is actually the third step in first aid. First you should stop the bleeding, and second cleanse the wound with soap and

running water. 7. Mistake: If an antiseptic stings when applied to a burn, cut or bruise, it means that the disinfectant is doing its work.

Fact: The sting actually has nothing to do with germkilling. An antibiotic such as Mycitracin, for example, doesn't sting or irritate the skin, nor does it stain clothing — yet it contains three antibiotics, each of which is a highly efficient germ-killer. 8. Mistake: An emetic must always be given in cases of

Fact: If the patient has swallowed a corrosive poison (it's probably corrosive if you see burns around his mouth) an emetic may kill him. If he swallowed an acid poison such as cleaning fluid, give him milk of magnesia. If he swallowed an alkali such as ammonia, give him orange or lemon juice. Call the doc-

tor as soon as possible. 9. Mistake: When a victim has stopped breathing, ex-amine him for injuries before starting artificial respir-

Fact: Artificial respiraation must be started at the earliest possible moment. Today many medical authorities agree that mouth to mouth resuscitation is the preferred method of artificial respira-tion. Hold the victim's nose and blow into his mouth at regular breathing intervals. Blow gently for a child, with more pressure for an adult. When you see the chest begin to rise, permit the patient to

10. Mistake: When first aid is necessary, ask yourself what a doctor would do, then

Fact: This is one of the most dangerous of all mistakes, for excessive first aid may be far worse than none at all. The important thing, when someone is injured seriously, is to get the help of a doctor as soon as possible. Sensible first aid consists of doing what you can — within the limits of your knowledge - until the doctor arrives.

You can improve the reception of your car radio—even under viaduots, tunnels and on country roads—with a few minor adjustments you can do yourself.

Ralph Kerrigan, supervisor of the Radio Laboratory in Chrysler Corporation's Engineering Division, says these can improve car radio recep-tion by up to 50 percent, can be made by any car owner. The best reception for car

radios in rural as well as metropolitan driving often is not attained because owners have been unaware of the needed minor adjustments, he "You can get the best re-

ception from your radio by adjusting the antenna compensator in the rear of the set. This can increase the quality of the reception by up to 50 percent. "By raising the antenna to

a height of from 50 to 60 inches, you can be assured of obtaining the greatest sensitivity of the set which will result in the best possible re-ception," Kerrigan said.

The antenna compensator should be adjusted in the fol-

lowing way, he said: Increase the volume to near maximum. Then turn the tuning dial of your set to around 1600 KC for the weakest pospanel is the antenna compensator - located in the rear of the set next to the an-tenna cable outlet. Turn the compensator until the signal becomes loudest. The best possible reception is thus assured for your car radio.

After the compensator and antenna adjustment, the customer should re-set the push buttons for his favorite radio

The height of the antenna is important and the higher it is raised the better the reception, Kerrigan noted. Al-though a 50 to 60 inch height is most desirable, certai overhead restrictions such as garage height, low viaducts or trees — might impede the raising of the antenna to this height.

When you're expecting another child, it's wise to prepare junior for the event. Child guidance experts agree that the arrival of a new baby without careful preparation can cause serious emotional upset.

Mothers facing this situation for the first time can benefit by the experience of those who have dealt with it effectively. Baby care counselors employed by the Diaper Service Industry come in daily contact with numerous mothers of young babies. The following are some quotations from mothers who have successfully dealt with the problem of sibling rivalry.

"After I'd told three-yearold Joan she was going to have a baby brother or sis-ter," one mother says, "I saw to it that she spent a lot of time with a neighbor's baby. She watched the mother bathe the baby, feed him and dress him. She was even allowed to hold the baby.

"It was a great experience for her and when our baby came, she seemed to take it in stride. She enjoyed playing 'house' with me and the baby and by being in on the act, showed no resentment whatever of her little brother."

"Although Mary was look-ing forward to the new baby's arrival," another mother relates, "we were very careful not to make too much fuss about it. My husband carried the baby, so that I was free to concentrate on Mary, to show her how much I had missed her while I was away.

Winter Giving Break to Deer Herd in Michigan

Michigan's wintering deer herd continued to get a break from the weather as 1960 prepared to give way to the New Year, Conservation De-partment district game su-

pervisors reported.

As of Dec. 26, deer were generally active throughout most of their range. So me were yarded in the Lake Superior region where snow depths reached one and one-half feet. Deer had taken to heavy cover for protection from plunging temperatures in some parts of the northern lower peninsula, but the re was practically no real yard-

remperatures ranged between 12 degrees below zero to 28 above in the upper peninsula last week. In the northern lower peninsula, they ran from 23 below to a high of 35 above. There were only traces of snow in some of the suthern areas above the Straits while most of the northern lower peninsula renorthern lower peninsula re-corded less than a foot. Normally, deer are forced to start yarding early in De-cember above the Straits and

later in the month in the northern I ower peninsula. They had been yarding for five weeks in the upper peninsula by this time last win-
