

Jerry Manlove, Camp Executive, and Bob Rich Associate, advise the following checkpoints to parents in selecting a reputable camp for their children "Is there a nurse or doctor in residence?" "Does the camp comply with State health laws?" "Is there fire fighting equipment handy?" "Are living areas tight ly screened and waterproofed?" "Are the grounds free from debris and litter?" "Is there are some system of assuming control in the event of an emergency?" gency?"

A good camp will spell out in pre-camp staft training the essential skills by which a counselor will be most effective and sensitive to individual differences and will welcome inquiry from parents. Further, says Manlove and Rick, "A clear statement of the camp's aims should be included in their literature and brochures as well as statements of procedure in accomplishing specific objectives such a riding, swimming, hiking and boating."

The YMCA has three camps for various age levels. Camp Ohiyesa, for lads 9-16, is located 45 miles northwest of Detroit and the first 12 day period begins June 26. Camp Nissokone, outside Oscoda, on Lake Van Ettan is for boys 8-16 and the initial four week session begins June 29. A variety of activities is offered at both camps.

Oklahoma football coach Bud Wilkinson already has been named to serve as the President's aide in an attempt to curb what the chief executive deplores as "a terrible situation" - the deterioration of the physical condition of the country's younger folks.

Throughout our area - in Plymouth, Livonia and Redford Township - various gents connected with physical education in the school systems and through recreation activities are standing as one to cheer the president.

And, it's not because they might happen to be of the same political affiliation.

"Sometimes we feel like crying when we see what's happening to the youngsters in the community when it comes to physical stamina," declared Gordon Young, the athletic director at Thurston High. "At least half, yes even more than 50 per cent, of the boys and girls can't pass the physical tests we conduct in

our gyms. On top of that, boys who should be out for varsity sports teams, are staying away not only at the high school level, but down in the junior highs as well." Young, and other prep athletic directors like Les Anders over at Bentley, or John Sandman at Plymouth, or Howard

Kraft at Redford Union, know why the kids are flunking physical aptitude tests. They also know what's behind the smaller athletic turnouts It simply boils down to our modern way of life. Too much

driving around ... not enough walking. Then, too, there's the matter of "keeping up with the

You're a 17-year-old in high school. Pal Bill has his own car in which he pulls up at school to attract the attention of the female beauties. So, you also have to have an auto. Operating a car costs money, which means you must find some kind of a job. Hence, you no longer have time to play football or basketball or run on the track team.

Your school is a loser because they lack your services on the athletic field, but more important, your body is a bigger loser. But you are too young to realize what danger you're creating for yourself. You must keep pace with the

"Schoolmen are doing everything in their powers," says Redford Union's Kraft, to get more students interested in some phase of athletics or physical activity.

"There's never been a time when our schools had betfor all-around gym facilities. Just a few years ago, most of the schools in the area had small gyms. The school with a swimming pool was a rare one. "Now all of our area schools have fine gyms. This is

true in the senior highs, the junior highs and the elementaries. We have fine pools and constantly are improving and expanding on our outdoor facilities.

"Yet, after participating in the compulsory-class programs, a great percentage of the students want no part of the extra curricular interscholastic and intramural athletic program we stage."

Recreation leaders throughout the Redford Township-Livonia-Plymouth sector agree with Kraft and his school col-

"We keep hearing complaints from some people about what we are doing with the tax dollars our department receives," declared Bob Girardin, the Livonia "Rec" chief. "When we expound what we are doing, a lot of folks confess surprise. They never realized we're doing so much in so many different ways for virtually every age level.

These people are strange to our efforts even though we keep advertising what we have on the agenda through the use of the newspapers and other media at our disposal." In Livonia, Redford Township and Plymouth, the physical end of the recreation program lures its greatest turn-

outs from youngsters 14 and under. The teenagers seemingly are too busy. Ditto for adults.

## Prize Books for Children

During the past couple of weeks a number of prizes have been given to authors and artists of children's books. We'd like to sort some of them out for you today.

Scott O'Dell was named winner of the 39th annual Newberry Medal. The Newberry Award is given each year to the author of "the most distinguished contribution to literature for children." Mr. O'Dell's prizewinning book is called Island of the Blue Dolphins, a fictional recreation of a true story of an Indian girl who was marooned on an island off the coast of California for 18 years. (For ages 10-15.)

Runners-up in the Newberry race were: America Moves Forward by Gerald W. Johnson. Mr. Johnson's book is the last of a series of three American histories written for the 10 to 15 year old group. It is a spirited account of the great events from 1917 to Eisenhower.

Old Ramon by Jack Schaefer. The author of Shane and other adult novels came close to the Newberry Medal with this simple but meaningful story of an old sheepherder and a boy in the Southwest. Old Ramon can be read with pleasure from junior

The Caldecott Medal, the annual award to the artist creating the outstanding picture book for children, has gone to Nicolas Sidjakov for his striking illustrations for Baboushka and the Three Kings.

Other awards for books for youngsters: An Edge of the Forest by Agnes Smith took the American Library Association's prize for the best children's book of the year dealing with animal life.

Janine by Robin McKown has been named "the best book dealing with problems confronting young people today" by the Child Study Association. Janine is an unusual teenage novel depicting realistically what a French family in a coal mining village came up against immediately after the Second World War.

## The Best Ever Written

A while ago 18 literary critics delivered themselves of a list of what they call "the best books ever written for adolescents." The pundits don't say precisely what they mean by "adolescents" but if you have one around the house you probably know, anyway. As a guess we would say these books are meant for youngsters from around the sixth grade to the tenth (give or take a grade - or child.)

The book receiving the greatest number of votes from the critics is Johnny Tremain by Esther Forbes, a vivid novel of the American Revolution. Right behind were: The Yearling by Marjorie Rawlings, Seventeenth Summer by Maureen Daly, My Friend Flicka by Mary O'Hara and Goodbye, My Lady by

James Street. An interesting fact is that these and all the books on the honored list were written the last twenty years or so. Maybe this will help scotch the prevalent parental superstition that all "classics" for the young were written during the Grant administration or be-
