Public To Hear Tax Program

Two authorities on Gov. John B. Swainson's tax revision program will appear at a public forum next Tuesday night sponsored by the Industrial Division of the Plymouth Community Chamber of Commerce.

Held at the Junior High School starting at 8 p.m., the Town Hall type of meeting will feature Roy Stevens, president of Jentzen-Miller Co. and member of the De-troit Board of Education, and Dr. Harvey Brazer, professor of economics at the Univer-

sity of Michigan. According to A. D. Johan-son, manager of the Western Electric Distribution House and chairman of the Industrial Division, the meeting will give citizens every opportunity to become better informed about the proposed ax revision program.

"We feel that an informed citizenry can be instrumental in forming the final tax revision program by making ylews known to their representatives in the Legislature," Johanson declared.

After the two speakers pre-sent the highlights of the governor's program, the audience will be invited to ask questions. There is no admission charge and everyone is



3,200 Diseased Elms 2-24 MI

LANSING - The Michigan State Highway Department's emergency Dutch Elm tree removal program has exceeded preliminary estimates. State Highway Commission-er John C. Mackie said that

a special work crew has removed 50 percent more diseased trees than originally thought possible. "This accelerated program should result in almost com plete elimination of diseased

elm trees along state roadsides in southern Michigan,

he said. The removal program began five months ago, but was given added emphasis Feb. 1 when a 67-man temporary work force was assigned to the project. The emergency program will continue for an other three weeks.

Mackie said the program was concentrated on highways in 40 counties below a line from Muskegon to Bay City. Highway Department foresters say no diseased elm trees have been found north of this line.

More than 5,700 trees have been removed so far, Mackie said. Of this number, about 3,200 were diseased elms.
