Encyclopedia Britannica (24) volumes, \$298) is the oldest. Originating in Scotland with a three-volume edition in 1768 Britannica has been in continuous publication since. American-owned for 60 years, its publisher since 1943 has been William Benton, former U.S. Senator from Connecti-

An idea of Britannica's size can be gained from a few figures: it contains 41,016 articles, 40 million words; it is the work of 7,708 contributors among whom are 43 Nobel Prize winners.

Like all major sets Britannica undergoes a process of 'continuous revision." The 1961 edition, for instance, involves 81/2 million words of change. In spite of this, several "Britannica classics" are retained: Freud on psychoanalysis, Shaw on socialism, Chesterton on Dicens,

Einstein on spacetime. The Encyclopedia Americana (30 volumes, \$319.50) and Collier's Encyclopedia (20 volumes, \$229) are the two other sets similar to Britannica in scope, purpose, arrangement and authority.

Since its basic edition in 1918 Americana has rivaled its older competitor in accuracy and scholarship. Its "continuous revision" policy enables the editors to announce that 22,000 of its 25,-000 pages have been rewrit-

collier's is the youngest entry in the field, having been first issued in 1949. Like the others, its aim is to be "a comprehensive summary of human knowledge" written for adults, both the scholar and the general reader. and the general reader. Collier's has more consciously tailored its articles to be readable for high school and college students than have the older encyclopedias. Britannica, Americana and Collier's all have excellent maps, indexes and bibliographies. In the illustrations particularly have tremendous improvements been made in the past few years. And without sacrificing scholarship or accuracy they have all be-come more readable of late. The policy of continuous revision has made these sets amazingly up-to-date in a world where events and knowledge pile up at an incredible rate. (Of course, sometimes the world moves too fast even for the best of them. A reader might search, for instance, in the 1960 editions of all three of these works for information about one Kennedy, John Fitzgerald, and come up with no in-

formation at all.) To sum up, these are the best of the adult encyclopedias. Any judgment on which is the "best" will have to be highly subjective; one set may have features that appeal particularly to you, another set will appeal to your

neighbor. But any one of the three is an excellent buy and would be an extremely useful addition to the family's reference shelf.
