Much too often, motives are discovered to be almost entirely personal, once the surface layers are laid aside.

He was controversial, because he was firm and decisive, and he stuck to his ground without ever having the use of one of the senses with which to analyze his critics.

Plymouth long has enjoyed the reputation of being a place where law and order prevail to a greater extent than in other communities. No one person could accomplish this - it also takes a dutiful, dedicated police department and an understanding public opinion, among other things - but in his own place and in his own way, Judge Perlongo was a

All others, including those who loafed or didn't develop fully during high school, must go elsewhere. Big universities are for research and graduate work.

3. Many, many homes can't afford higher educa-tion when it also must include room and board, plus tuition. Yet it is imperative that youngsters receive more than 12 grades of schooling if they are to swim upward in our present society.

4. Local control of the funds and local election of those spending the funds is a safer and more economical way to provide education than to send the money to Lansing and hope the dollars all return.

5. Adults today are demanding education and cultural activities in their local communities to fill a void created by increased "leisure time."

6. Our high school production of graduates has been increasing 10 percent per year and will continue to do so for many years.

7. A campus in this area would increase the value of all homes it serves, lift the community spirit, provide a cultural and social center. It would be
