Original plans had been made to assemble the parade at Hillside Inn parking lot. This has now been changed to the new Kroger Parking clared.



How Long To Store Food?

food storage. How should fresh means be wrapped for refrigerator storage? Fresh meats should be loosely wrapped in waxed paper or kitchen foil. If you purchase meats which have been tightly wrapped at the grocery, be sure to loosen the

How should cooked meats be wrapped for refrigerator storage? Cooked and leftover meats should be tightly wrapped or stored in a cov-

ered container.

What is the average temperature of a refrigerator, and where is the coldest part of the refrigerator? When the refrigerator temperature control is set at normal, the center of the refrigerztor will run between 38 degrees and 42 degrees F. The area just below the freezing unit is colder, for storage of meats, poultry and fish. The bottom of the refrigerator is warmer than the center, for less per-

ishable foods. How long will fresh meats keep? Use ground meat within one day; use variety meats such as heart, liver and tongue within two days; use fresh meat cuts within three to six days. Storage time for pork cuts is some-what shorter than for other

keep? Use ground meat withwithin seven days for best quality. Probably storage life in the refrigerator is three to four weeks.

How long will cured meats

How long will poultry keep? Use poultry within two to three days.

How long will fresh fish keep? Use fish and seafood within one day for best qual-How long will sliced cold cuts keep? Use within six

days for best quality.

How long will milk, eggs
and cheese keep? Use milk
within three days for best quality. Use eggs within seven days for best quality. Pro-bably storage life for eggs is two to six weeks. Hard cheese, tightly wrapped, will keep for months. Soft cheese

will keep one to two weeks.

How should fresh vegetables be stored? Store vegetables in plastic bags in the hydrator section of the refrigerator. Hydrators help vegetab-les retain moisture. Vegetables should be used when as fresh as possible, for they lose vitamins rapidly in stor-

How can you tell when meat is beginning to spoil? An off odor and sliminess are signs of meat spoilage. Beef usually spoils first on the surface. Pork spoils first near the bone in the inside of the meat. To test for spoiled pork, use a pointed knife to reach the interior of the meat. An off odor on he knife

Time is Here to Put Mail Boxes Into Shape

The annual mail box improvement program to assist the postal service in providing more efficient deliveries and to stimulate efforts to improve the appearance of the countryside is now on.

Postmaster George Timpona said that all patrons are being urged to provide suitable mail receptacles. They should be erected and maintained for easy and safe accessibility, present a neat appearance and afford protection to the mail, the postmaster pointed out.

The following is a list of suggestion for mailbox

improvement: 1. Boxes that are not properly erected or not maintained in good serviceable condition retard the delivery of mail and expose it to the weather.

Warm Weather Tips From

Warm weather will bring increased activity among domestic and wild animals, thereby increasing the chances for the spread of rabies, Dr. Joseph G. Molher, City-County Health Commissioner states.

If you have not already done so, now is the time to have your family pet protected against rabies.

No animal has been infect-

ed with rabies while in Detroit since 1955. Twice during that time dogs owned by Detroit residents got rabies while they were out of the

Dr. Molner warns against permitting your dog to chase skunks, squirrels or other animals when out in the coun-

The number of persons bitten by animals in Detroit since Jan, 1 is 1,840. A total of 8,051 persons were bitten in Detroit during 1960. Many of these could have been prevented if dogs were confined to their owners' premises or were held securely by a leash, as required by city ordinance.

A Detroit ordinance requires that all dogs be vaccinated and licensed. Dr. Molner points out that when a dog is not on the property of his owner, it is required that he be on a leash which is held in the hands of a competent person.

Dr. Molner suggests that everyone help to continue this good record by following these precautions to protect both people and pets.

1. Have your dog or cat vaccinated against rabies as advised by a veterinarian. 2. Do not touch a stray or

3. Have any dog bite treated immediately by a physician and notify the police de-

4. Report any stray dog to the dog pound. 5. Help enforce dog control laws and regulations in your

community.
6. Never kill a dog suspected of rabies if it can be avoided, because the disease can be diagnosed more quickly by observing the animal than it can by laboratory tests.
