





When the Federal Government called for volunteer regiments in the far west to guard the outer reaches of the Union against Confederate invasion, Plymouth man, Chauncey E. Baker, (the ather of Mrs. Roderick Cassady and Henry E. Baker), enlisted in LaPorte, Calif., on August 16, 1861.

Cpl. Baker served in the Union army, Co. F. First California Infantry until Aug-ust of 1864. During the early days of the struggle between the North and South, the Rebels entertained hopes of securing Arizona and New Mexico to gain a stronghold in California for purposes of obtaining supplies of men, horses, material and money.

However, through the vigilance of these Western divisions, one of which Chauncey E. Baker was a part, the South's attempts were successfully foiled.

Charles H. Houk was 21 when he enlisted in August of 1862. He served his hitch of three years in Co. I of the 24th Infantry and was mustered June 26, 1865 from the 243rd Co., First Battalion, Veteran Reserve Corp.

Nobody Laughs Much Anymore

We have been brooding for some time - 20 minutes, at least - over the decline and fall of American humor. It occurs to us that all American humorists are dead, sick, blind or 85 years old.

Look at the stage. When George S. Kaufman died last week, the eulogizers said sadly (and truthfully, for once) that there is no one to replace him. But if Tennessee Williams goes to his reward, assuming he has one coming, any one of a dozen novice neurotics can step in without an audience noticing a change.

Literary humor is frailer still. Can you name five American humorists sound of body, mind, taste and perception not old enough to be drawing Social Security? Thurber? Yes, but he is sixty-six and blind. Jean Kerr? Yes, bless her, she is the only one to begin practice since the war. (She says she is only 35 but then all women are 35.) S. J. Perelman? Yes. Who else? Benchley died the year price controls were lifted. Ring Lardner died the year Schoolboy Rowe was a rookie. (For the record, Schoolboy Rowe died last year; all good ball players are dead, too, or in Cleveland.) Don Marquis, Frank Sullivan, Will Rogers, Finley Peter Dunne, Dorothy Parker, F.P.A. how many more? - have never been replaced.

These melancholy musings came on while reading James Thurber's new collection, Lanterns and Lances, a funny, penetrating and occasionally tedious book. Thurber is seriously (but not solemnly) conterned with the frightful things men in our time are doing to each other and also with what they are doing to the English language. He has reasonable hope that both men and language will survive but only if we behave more intelligently than we have. In one of the sketches, a fable, an adviser tells a man not to worry about a giant who is bothering him. "Don't pay any attention to it and it will go away," he says. And the man paid no attention to it, and it went away, taking him with it.

A happier, earlier Thurber is available in paperbacks with the classic, My Life and Hard Times (Bantam, 50 cents).

It looks, in fact, as though we must pick up reissues if we want any first rate humor. Here are a few we have returned to lately:

The Complete Humorous Sketches of Mark Twain, just published, contains over 700 pages by America's greatest humorist.

The Most of S. J. Perelman, a fat volume by a master of parody.

A Subtreasury of American Humor, edited by E. B. White (Pocket, 35 cents), a top-notch anthology. The Decline and Fall of Practically Everybody, by Will Cuppy (Dell, 35 cents), history made hilari-

The Beast in Me and Other Animals, by James Thurber (Avon, 35 cents), some of the Master's New Yorker pieces of the forties.

In Lanterns and Lances, Thurber observes, "The trend of the modern temper is toward gloom, resignation, and even surrender ... Well, we are still going on, and have four decades left in this battered and bloody century ... It is high time that we came of age and realized that, like Emily Dickinson's hope, humor is a feathered thing that perches in the soul. Let's hope the feathered thing is still perched somewhere in the American soul even though its song is faint these days.

Take Care In Use of Air Mail Envelopes

"Air mail envelopes should never be used unless the sender desires air mail service. While the use of air mail envelopes for first-class surface mail is fortunately not widespread, usage is frequent enough to merit special attention." So says Postmaster George Timpona.

George Timpona.
The colorful red and blue bordered envelopes are re-stricted to mail intended for transportation by air. If this restriction is not observed, there is potential trouble and embarrassment for everyone concerned. Air mail envel-opes which do not bear sufficient postage (7 cents per ounce up to 8 ounces) a re handled as air mail, and post-age due is collected from the addressee. In the process, the post offices involved are compelled to give the ite min question special and expen-sive attention. The person to whom the envelope is deliv-ered is certainly not pleased when he is requested to pay for special service that neither he nor the sender had in

The position of the Postal Service can better be understood when it is pointed out that air mail envelopes were purposely created with their distinctive markings to identify air mail immediately and to make certain that it receives priority handling on the way from deposit to destination. It would therefore be illogical to permit use of such envelopes for ordinary pur-poses, as post office personnel would then never be sure about what the mailer had in

When time is a significant factor, air mail should be used. But the mail so sent should always be properly identified. Then the Postal Service will know at a glance what the mailer wants and the recipient will not be arted to share the cost of the transaction.

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
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
