proportion to real estate. According to the City Commission's theory, personal property should be assessed the same as real estate. Right now, the City is assessing personal property at 45 per cent of its true value and real property at 43 per cent. As a result, the Wayne County Board of Taxation added 10 per cent to the City's assessed valuation in order to make up the difference. The County feels that personal property should be assessed on a sliding scale


While we are on the subject of plants, Vera. Newkirk, a registered nurse, prepared an article for SAVE! SAVE! SAVE! the Nurses Digest entitled 'Safety With Flowers and Plants', which we would like to pass along in part. Did you know that there is enough poison in a ten

cent packet of Castor Bean seeds to kill five children? That one tulip bulb contains enough poison to kill a man? That sweet peas contain a poison that causes a form of paralysis? While it is seldom fatal, it can keep its victim bedridden for months. There is a poison in "Elephant Ears" that causes a painful swelling of the mucous membranes of the mouth, tongue and throat? "Dumb Cane" has earned its name because chewing the leaf causes your mouth to swell so that speech is impossible.

Even honey made by bees in an area grown with Rhododendron and Mountain Laurel has been found to be poisonous? A noted pharmacologist has listed more than 100 plants containing poison which are grown in the average American garden. In an issue of a standard seed catalouge, he listed 54 plants as harmful.

There is no reason, of course, to stop growing beautiful flowers just because some contain poison. But avoid the common habit of chewing on a piece of leaf or stalk. Remember to tell your children that it is dangerous to put leaves or stems of plants into their mouths. Above all, don't store plant bulbs where children can get at them.

We conclude the column with a list of poison We conclude the column with a list of poison cultivated plants that can be fatal if taken in quan-tities which a child might eat. They are: Elephant Ear, Narcissus, Four O'Clock, Cyclamen, Ivy, Potato (seed or sprouts), Pimpernel, Oleander, Lily of the Valley, Burning Bush, Jimson Weed, Rhododendron, Iris, Pinks, Mock Orange, Spanish Bayonet, Bitter-sweet, Castor Bean, Foxglove, Scotch Broom, Tulip, Mountain Laurel and Monkshood.







It would tend to shift the emphasis from one of batting juggling late in the game to defensive juggl-ing. The fact that this hasn't been tried already seems to be typical of the conservative thinking that dominates that national game.

With a little free time, it just seemed the neighborly thing to offer this advice to the Tigers.



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



## EDITORIAL What Not To Expect of College

By O. B. Jones, President Detroit College of Applied Science

Don't expect that it will be as easy to "get by" as it was in high school. Private colleges depend upon donations from their alumni for financial support. The alumni are constantly striving to add to the prestige of their alma mater and insist upon rigid disciplines regarding admissions and constant testing throughout the courses to screen out misfits and laggards. Financial and advisory support from industry, resulting in employment opportunities for graduating students, is based upon quite rigid adherence to suggestions by industry concerning content of each course and insistence upon high scholastic attainment as a prerequisite for graduation. Tax-supported colleges compete with one another for recognition and prestige. Prestige comes only from the superior records of performance of graduated students.

Don't expect that a college education will make a "bed of roses" of your life. A look around you at college graduates should convince anyone that they are the busiest and most ambitious dwellers in your community. Perhaps the greatest thing college did for them was to give them faith in the future and in themselves. They have a vision and a goal.

Don't expect that a college can fit a diploma.

ployment. Don't imagine that colleges are ahead of industry in many techniques. Industry has been employing the most highly skilled and highly intelligent personnel over a period of many years, some college graduates and some not. The processes they have developed are much beyond the understanding of even the best trained and most highly intelligent without many months or, in many cases, years of study and intimate experience with the operation.

Don't expect that your college training won't quickly become obsolete. A recent survey pertaining to employment in one of the four leading and oldest types of engineering indicates that it is better economy for an employer to dispense with the services of the average engineer who has been in its employ for the past ten years after graduation and hire someone just graduated to fill his job. This indicates that a practicing engineer, or scientist, should do a two-year stint in college after the first ten years of practice and continue on this schedule throughout his worklife.

Don't expect your college training to make you happy concerning the extent or the profundity of your knowledge. If you do not learn enough to be humbled by the extent of your ignorance you will not receive
