City Commissioners were told that the remodeling job now being done on the Municipal Parking Lot-which includes the razing of four buildings to expand the lot-will boost the number of auto spaces from 140 to 240.

New Sewers

First steps toward construction of new sewers in Plymouth Colony and Arbor Hills subdivisions were taken Tuesday night by the Plymouth Township Board.

Board members acted after hearing a number of Arbor Hills residents express opinions on the sewers. The Board had originally proposed sewer construction for most of the subdivision, but a survey of 48 families in the area brought only 16 in favor, with 20 opposed. The rest didn't reply.

Stating that preliminary moves had already been made to get Arbor Hills sewers on the basis of a petition from residents two years ago, Supervisor Roy Lindsay said. "It takes years to get sewers. You people should think about that . . . septic tanks aren't going to last forever."

"With the limited amount of money we have," Lindsay continued, "this is your opportunity to have them . other people want them."

Cost of putting the sewer system into Arbor Village was estimated at \$43,000. Action on the petition two years ago was blocked because of lack of funds, but money is available now.

(Continued from Page 1) off the whole business of publishing a newspaper and taking up easier tasks, the reasons could hardly be more similar than those which Paar put down in Look:

"I myself have tried to be scrupulously honest in stating my beliefs and impressions. But you've got to fight so hard for this right to speak freely. You've got to take so much abuse if you practice this privilege.

"If you don't believe me, let any union member who is reading this article—any little guy in a union—get up and say a few unpleasant truths about the big shots who run it. He'll see how far freedom of speech gets him; or try sometime at the next PTA meeting. "May I be the first to tell you that we are not as free as we think we are. We cannot just sit back and feel we have inherited freedom of speech; we have only inherited the tradition of it. Each generation must fight for it anew. for there are boobs who wish to take it from you.

"There should be more controversy in our land, more questions asked, more debate, more who are curious. There should also be more compassion for others with different views. But most of all, we need more honesty with ourselves. When I read or hear the insincere mouthings of some of our politicians, it makes me ill. They all talk as if they think they are going to become statues. Too many of them are not statemen, but merely winners of local beauty contests."
