'Green Space' Called Plymouth's Biggest Need

Adequate "green space" for the Plymouth area seems to be the community's greatest need for the future.

That's the view of City Manager Al Glassford who returned this week from a four-day convention of city managers where this problem-common to many suburban areas-was discussed.

Glassford attended the International City Managers Association's annual conference in Miami Beach and came back with this impression-

"What I look for as a major problem in this area and what concerns me is open space. Plymouth is in

the next wave of expansion from Detroit and we've got to start thinking about providing enough recreation area-enough 'green space'-as this area begins to expand."

Glassford quoted Ivan A. Nestingen, undersecretary of the U.S. Department of Health Education and Welfare, who spoke at the conference, as saying that, "We can't have one subdivision after another stretching out from metropolitan areas without any green spaces to separate them." Yet, Nestingen warned, this is becoming the case.

The federal government, Glassford stated, is now ready to contribute 20 per cent of the cost to local com-


munities on a matching basis to purchase "green space" recreation areas.

"We should start thinking about getting the County to perhaps provide open spaces," Glassford said. "Perhaps now it the time to get together with Livonia, Northville and other nearby communities to see what mutual efforts can be made to help solve this problem."

'The expansion wave is moving westward from Detroit," he continued, "and we can prevent this from becoming a serious problem if we begin to act in the near future."

The City Manager also attended conferences on Ethics and Local Government, Federal, State and Local Emergency Planning and Future Health and Welfare Problems during the Sunday-to-Wednesday convention. Commenting on the need for bomb shelters, he said it was pointed out at the conference that, "We in the suburbs-just as in the rest of the areas-must push toward more public shelter space rather than individual shelters.'

Several hundred City managers from throughout the nation attended the conference. They were also told by John J. Corson, chairman of the Municipal Manpower Commission that "low salaries" are preventing municipalities from "getting the highest caliber people coming out of college."


The holiday season's favorite guest-Santa Clauswill arrive in Plymouth Saturday morning to be greeted by kids and their parents from all over the city.

This particular glue contains toluene, as marked on the outside of the container. Toluene, as noted in the accompanyin article, produces the effects of narcosis or drunkenness. Excessive amount of the material, of course, can produce death, although the amount necessary to produce death is quite high and it is unlikely that youths taking it in this fashion would get a fatal concentration. I am not implying that this would not be possible, however.

This problem of glue sniffing has come to our attention from the various parts of the State, particularly in the lower peninsula, so that glue sniffing is quite widely known in Michigan. It is interesting to note from your your area are obtaining the letter that these youths in intoxication by placing the glue on a cloth and then sucking on the cloth to obtain the fumes. This would probably be a combination of oral ingestion coupled with the sniffing but the toxicity would be comparable to the toxicity obtained by sniffing alone.
