

'Green Space' Called Plymouth's Biggest Need

Adequate "green space" for the Plymouth area seems to be the community's greatest need for the future.

That's the view of City Manager Al Glassford who returned this week from a four-day convention of city managers where this problem—common to many suburban areas—was discussed.

Glassford attended the International City Managers Association's annual conference in Miami Beach and came back with this impression—

"What I look for as a major problem in this area and what concerns me is open space. Plymouth is in the next wave of expansion from Detroit and we've got to start thinking about providing enough recreation area—enough 'green space'—as this area begins to expand."

Glassford quoted Ivan A. Nestingen, undersecretary of the U.S. Department of Health Education and Welfare, who spoke at the conference, as saying that, "We can't have one subdivision after another stretching out from metropolitan areas without any green spaces to separate them." Yet, Nestingen warned, this is becoming the case.

The federal government, Glassford stated, is now ready to contribute 20 per cent of the cost to local communities on a matching basis to purchase "green space" recreation areas.

"We should start thinking about getting the County to perhaps provide open spaces," Glassford said. "Perhaps now it is the time to get together with Livonia, Northville and other nearby communities to see what mutual efforts can be made to help solve this problem."

"The expansion wave is moving westward from Detroit," he continued, "and we can prevent this from becoming a serious problem if we begin to act in the near future."

The City Manager also attended conferences on Ethics and Local Government, Federal, State and Local Emergency Planning and Future Health and Welfare Problems during the Sunday-to-Wednesday convention. Commenting on the need for bomb shelters, he said it was pointed out at the conference that, "We in the suburbs—just as in the rest of the areas—must push toward more public shelter space rather than individual shelters."

Several hundred City managers from throughout the nation attended the conference. They were also told by John J. Corson, chairman of the Municipal Manpower Commission that "low salaries" are preventing municipalities from "getting the highest caliber people coming out of college."

Arrests Break Up Youth Gang

Several Plymouth area youths rounded up this week by Wayne County Sheriff's officers in the aftermath of a breaking-and-entering investigation at a local service station.

City Police Chief Ken Fisher reported that some of the youths had allegedly been involved in a series of break-ins throughout the general Plymouth area. The arrests stemmed specifically from the recent holdup of a Texaco service station at Ann Arbor Road and Main Street.

'Toluene' Is Culprit

(Editor's Note: Recently the rise of "glue sniffing" this newspaper reported on among youths of the area. In the course of the investigation, Redford Township police submitted samples and a report to Lansing. The following is a reply from the Michigan Department of Health.)

Det. Edwin J. Gleza, Redford Twp. Police Dept. Re: Sniffing of model glue by teen age youths.

Dear Detective Gleza:

On November 9, 1961, we received your letter and accompanying article from the Los Angeles Police Dept., along with the specimen of Revell type S cement.

This particular glue contains toluene, as marked on the outside of the container. Toluene, as noted in the accompanying article, produces the effects of narcosis or drunkenness. Excessive amount of the material, of course, can produce death, although the amount necessary to produce death is quite high and it is unlikely that youths taking it in this fashion would get a fatal concentration. I am not implying that this would not be possible, however.

This problem of glue sniffing has come to our attention from the various parts of the State, particularly in the lower peninsula, so that glue sniffing is quite widely known in Michigan. It is interesting to note from your letter that these youths in intoxication by placing the glue on a cloth and then sucking on the cloth to obtain the fumes. This would probably be a combination of oral ingestion coupled with the sniffing but the toxicity would be comparable to the toxicity obtained by sniffing alone.

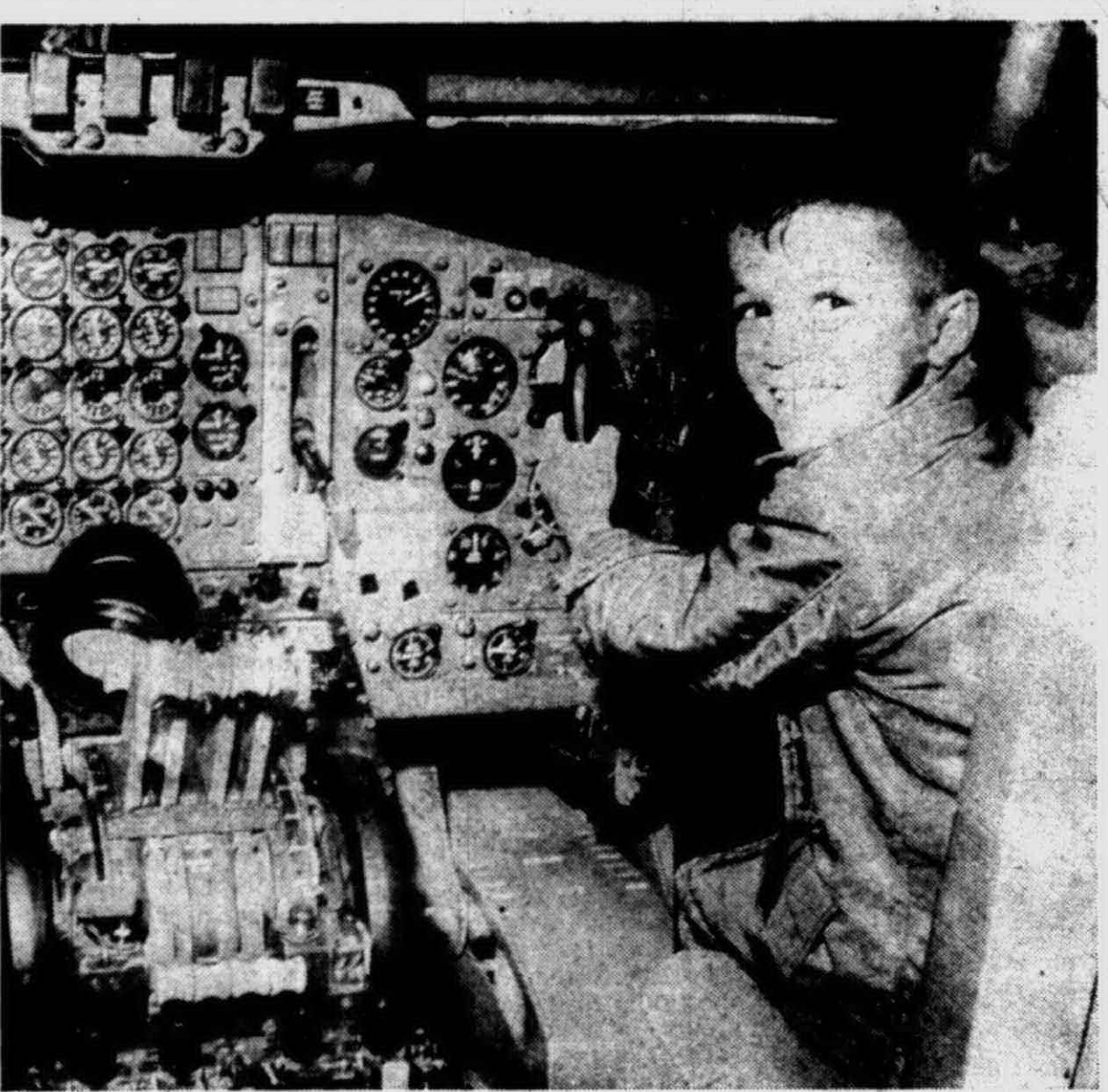

FACTS and OPINIONS by Paul Chandler

Among those who are watching the Constitutional Convention in Lansing with great anticipation are the leaders of our big Townships. Plymouth, Redford, Canton, Nankin Townships all are particular cases in point.

They need, and want, some law changes to make their government more adaptable to the problems at hand. "Townships" as such, are an old and honorable form of government, but legally they actually are children of the State government itself. They possess no local self-rule; they only can do the things which State law permits.

It is thus because "Townships" originally were conceived as a low - cost, minimum form of government for rural and lightly populated areas. Today, there are giant metropolitan Townships such as Redford and Nankin; and other poised to grow big and swiftly, as Plymouth and Canton. They are a different kind of "Township" and as yet State law hasn't entirely recognized the fact.

Anyhow, the Townships have a special "day" scheduled before the Convention on Dec. 12. Among those appearing will be Supervisor Jack McDonald of Redford. He has some points to make, many of them the product of thinking by the whole Redford Board, and his case will be good reading in other Townships, because they all are seeking about the same thing.

Here are some sample changes which will be proposed and which Facts and Opinions hopes are heard with sympathy and written one way or another into law quickly.

1. Basic law should provide for two kinds of Townships: (a) the rural kind; (b) the urban kind. The voters could decide which form they wanted, possibly with population being a yardstick. For instance, all Townships of more than 20,000 population might be "urban."
2. Townships should have a greater voice in the County Board of Supervisors. Today they are limited to one delegate, regardless of population. Cities—such as Livonia—have two, three or four delegates, even with lesser population than neighboring Townships.
3. Fines and costs levied in Justice Court should be returned to the Township where they are collected, where the police protection is paid for locally. Today these funds go into the general County pot, doled out over a wide area, with about 60 percent going into the City of Detroit.
4. Gas and weight taxes should be returned to urban Townships, a figure that can be as much as \$500,000 a year. Today they stay with the State and County on the faulty theory that those bodies provide adequate street and road maintenance. Cities today receive all the gas and weight tax to spend themselves.
5. Justices of the Peace could be put on a municipal basis, paid a good salary, rather than operate on the sticky "fee system."
6. Make it easier, and legal, for Townships to write their own laws into their own Charter.

Livonia's Chamber Urges Sunday Ban

Livonia Chamber of Commerce went on record this week in support of Sunday closings "with some exceptions."

Guy A. Spencer, Chamber president, wired the views to the members of a House Committee of the State legislature meeting in Battle Creek Tuesday to begin consideration of the issue.

The action was ordered by the Board of Directors.

In his wire, Spencer advised the committee that the Chamber supported, in principle, the concept of Sunday closings which would ban most business on Sunday but permit exceptions which would allow "necessary services."

Further study by the Chamber will result in a detailed analysis.

Swim Pool Ordinance Is Studied

Recommendations that the setback requirements for swimming pools constructed in Plymouth be modified were proposed to the City Commission this week by the Appeal Board.

David W. Mather, chairman of the Board, told Commissioners that there are "a large number of lots in the City which are unable to comply with the present ordinance on swimming pools" because of lot sizes and setback requirements.

"Some members of our Board," Mather said, "felt that the swimming pool ordinance was discriminatory."

The present ordinance prevents persons with 60-foot wide lots from having underground pools. The ordinance also required a ten foot setback from all property lines. Members of the Commission indicated they would favor modification to fall into line with County requirements of only five or six foot setbacks.

Commission members also heard the first reading of a proposed ordinance that would prevent short-term "fire sales" from being held by transient merchants in the city.

The ordinance - designed to "discourage" itinerant merchants from setting up shop in Plymouth - would require a license fee to be paid by merchants who are not permanent occupants of the city. Commissioners could not decide Monday on the size of the fee.

"Frankly," Commissioner Robert O. Beyer told the meeting, "Someone could come in and rent a building and sell \$100,000 worth of merchandise and not pay a cent in taxes."

City Attorney Ed Drauglis told the Commission the purpose of the ordinance was "to prevent someone from coming into Plymouth, operating a fire sale for four months and leaving without paying a tax." Commissioner Carl Shear suggested that the license fee be based on the inventory value of the itinerant merchant.

Legal advisors were asked to rework the ordinance when it became evident that small merchants trying to establish a permanent business in the city might come under the ruling, thus providing "discouragement" for new business.

In other business, Commission members heard City Manager Al Glassford report on progress of Parking of Parking Lot improvements

New \$3 Million Sewer Seen Needed In Plymouth's Future

Plymouth was warned Monday that it would be faced with construction of a new \$3 million sewer system within five years if storm water continues to flow through sanitary sewers at an increasing rate.

The warning came from engineering consultant Frank Lodge after a delegation of local builders appeared at the City Commission meetings to argue for overturning a resolution banning storm drainage from flowing into sanitary sewers in new homes.

The builders claimed that the Commission's ruling - made in a resolution last month - would wreak a "hardship."

"With less than 100 building lots left in Plymouth," a spokesman for the builders said, "We'd like to continue as in the past. We've had trouble digging basements and putting in drainage ditches." Under the Commission's resolution, only future home construction is prevented from hooking storm water drainage to sanitary sewers. Present homes which have such connections are unaffected.

Lodge countered with the statement that "in the city during the next five years you're going to have to put in a new sanitary sewer system if you can't get storm water out of the sewer."

"And," he continued, "a sanitary sewer system will cost \$3 millions. It's not economically feasible. The sanitary sewer system is just not going to take the load. I suggest even taking some of the present storm water load out of present hookups."

"Either," he concluded, "you stop where you are and start going back to get some storm water out, or you start looking for a major, costly revision of the system."

Discussion between Lodge, the Commission and the builders on the controversial issue continued for some time before the Commission adjourned until next Monday night to discuss the whole situation.

Planning consultants Johnson and Anderson, Inc., and representatives of local builders groups will attend the 7:30 p.m. meeting to discuss the issue further. Most Commissioners, however, indicated they favored the viewpoint of consultant Lodge over the builders' protests.

'To Women It May Concern'

...by MYRA COX

Without much fanfare or bow-taking there are a group of women in our area who have quietly and efficiently been providing an appreciated community service. It has been growing and it is consistent. And it must be good because it is now in its second (just barely) generation of babies.

These volunteers run the Well-Baby Clinic, which to me has a very happy sound.

They started the clinic in Livonia in 1945 after they completed a Red Cross Home Nursing Course and saw the need. They wanted to help.

And this they do. There are approximately 35 "well" babies examined, given pre-school inoculations each week from the six-week old to the five years old. Before they started their second clinic there used to be a waiting list of six months.

The clinics are held the first and second Wednesday of every month from one till three in St. Paul's Presbyterian Church on Five Mile Road.

Wayne County provides the doctor and pays for one clinic and the Well-Baby Clinic pays for the doctor for the other. Mrs. W. H. Rolan, an R.N. from Livonia, volunteers her services as a nurse.

The idea is to see every child from six weeks to school-age, who's parents have no regular physician. They are examined and their shots given, including Polio shots. There is a one dollar registration fee as required by the County Board of Health.

The ladies have four business-luncheon meetings a year. They have no fund solicitation, no card parties, raffles, or drives of any kind.

They don't go around with their hand out. On the money over for supplies, improving their facilities and other hand they happily accept all donations and turn the equipment as well as paying for the second clinic each month.

Recently the Livonia City Women's Club donated a check to the Clinic for \$50 which will go toward their doctor's fees.

South Redford Health Guild are considering assisting the Well-Baby Clinic in a combined effort. Well-Baby Clinic members hope they do. This not only would supplement their own present 75 membership, but would bring a new area participating. They do not want to consider the clinic belonging exclusively to Livonia. They want it to be a community project to include besides Plymouth and Redford, also Garden City and Wayne.

Although they have never asked for funds, they feel, with the clinic growing as it has, and the need seemingly increasing, in order to maintain the schedule they have, as well as improve their equipment, they must have support of some of the other local groups.

They invite any service organization to come by and look over the work they are doing and perhaps take an interest to the point of giving them an occasional financial hand. It would be a good service project.

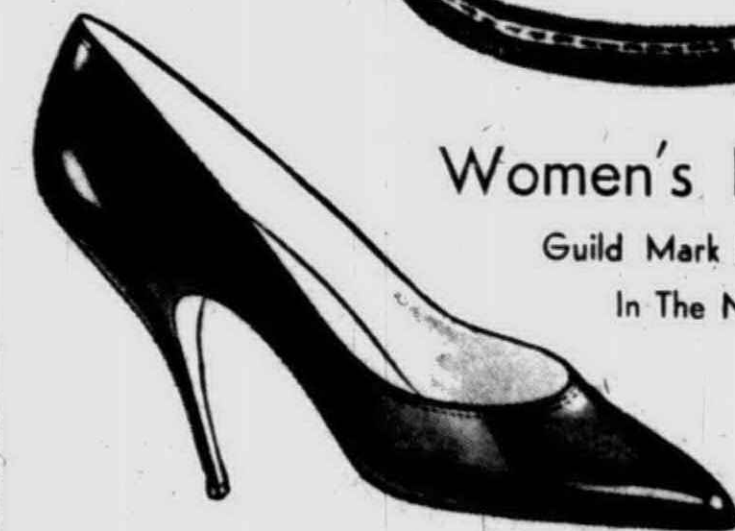

St. Mary Hospital Celebrates Second Anniversary

St. Mary Hospital of Livonia is preparing for a quiet celebration of its second anniversary. It is just two years ago, on December 8, 1959, that the hospital threw open its doors and with it brought a sense of comfort and security to thousands of people comprising the northwest section of the Metropolitan Detroit area, which includes the communities of Livonia, Plymouth, Northville, Farmington, and Redford Township.

For the first time residents of the five communities knew that in illness or emergency there were, close at hand, hospital facilities, doctors, nurses and other health specialists whose immediate availability could in many instances mean the difference between life and death. Up and above the importance of emergency treatment, the residents of the area view

with great personal satisfaction the convenience of easy access to a modern, fully-equipped hospital which is quickly developing into a center of health education and progress.

Within the first year of its opening, the hospital made its facilities available to "Civil Defense Classes." From a modest beginning the classes have grown beyond its director's expectations. Dr. Gordon Eadie, the director, has informed Sister Mary Columbine, administrator of the hospital, that the September class for registered nurses has reached an all time high enrollment of 127 nurses.

At the present time, high on St. Mary Hospital priority list of activities is the development of a "Community Disaster Plan." The administration of St. Mary Hospital takes full cognizance of the fact that natural disasters are

not restricted to any particular area. Floods, fires, wrecks, factory explosions and other disasters have occurred in almost every part of the country. Furthermore, the administration realizes that casualty care from this range of natural disasters falls upon large and small hospitals alike and that St. Mary Hospital must be prepared at all times to accept its proper role in community disasters.

Plans have been initiated which include mutual cooperation between the five communities and the hospital. The Disaster Committee under the direction of Dr. Gordon Eadie and Sister Mary Columbine has prepared a detailed course of action for the hospital to follow as a natural part of its day-by-day obligation to the residents of the five communities the hospital serves, so that any disaster occurring

in the area can be rationally coped with.

Members of the Disaster Committee will be meeting in the near future with government officials of Livonia, Plymouth, Northville, Farmington and Redford Township, and community disaster agencies, such as, civil defense and Red Cross to help coordinate the hospital's master plan with the communities' disaster plans.

To provide the Medical Staff with equipment which ever increases its proficiency in the health care of patients, St. Mary Hospital has been consistently expanding its facilities. The radio-isotope laboratory was opened in August, 1960. Added to the laboratory department were a scintillation counter which measure the amount of radioiodine in the thyroid gland; and an analyzer - computer which is designed to analyze

and count pulses received from the scintillation detector.

The anesthesia department now includes among its new facilities the following equipment:

1. Hypo - hyper - thermia unit used for generalized refrigeration in thoracic, cardiac, cardiovascular and neurologic surgery.

2. An Emerson Chest Respirator for endoscopic procedures and post-operative ventilation.

3. Bird Respirator used for ventilation of the patient in respiratory acidosis due to post-operative complications or to diseases of the bronchi, lungs, and heart.

4. An infant heating blanket for complete blood exchange transfusions.

The St. Mary Hospital Guild has completely covered the cost of the Emerson Chest Respirator and the Bird Res-

pirator. The Guild is now zealously working to help finance a cardiac monitor which will complete the hospital's cardiac arrest equipment.
