

Two-Family Home Zoning Up For Talks

A proposal to allow two family dwellings in land currently zoned R-1-A will be up for discussion Tuesday night when the Plymouth Planning Commission meets.

The proposal is in the form of an amendment to the zoning ordinance. It would also provide for revision of sideyard requirements in R-1-A zoned areas.

At the same time, the Commission will consider rezoning lots 39-51 on Goldsmith Ave. between 1471 Goldsmith and Lena St. from R-2 (residential two family) to C-2 (commercial). A proposal to rezone the west side of Dewey St. from Ross and Dewey to 1352-80 Dewey from R-1 to R-1-A is also under consideration.

The public has been invited to voice comments on the three proposals at Tuesday's meeting which will be held at 7:30 in City Hall.

Meanwhile, the City Commission will hold a public hearing next Monday at 7:30 p.m. to discuss special assessment rolls for improvements on Penniman from S. Harvey to S. Main. Resurfacing, new curbs and sidewalks have been proposed. All property abutting the improvement, except lots 212 and 213, are affected.

Snowstorm Plays Havoc With Autos

Slippery streets played havoc with Plymouth area noon, and Police Department motorists Saturday afternoon officers reported that eight accidents were reported within 40 minutes.

Urban Renewal Funds Expected

The first concrete step toward Plymouth's long-awaited urban renewal project may be taken within the next two months.

That's when the first grant of money to begin a study of the community's needs along these lines is expected from the federal government.

Announcement of the latest development came Monday night from City Manager Al Glassford who asked members of the City Commission to set date for a meeting at which Plymouth opinions on the urban renewal area residents could voice a project.

Commissioners designated Monday, January 15, as the date for the special public hearing.

At that time, they stated, any local resident — property owner or not — could present viewpoints to the Council on the urban renewal program.

Shortly after that, Glassford said, if the Commission adopts a resolution favoring the project, a grant can be expected from federal authorities. He has been in touch, he said, with Congresswoman Martha Griffiths (D-17th) who is keeping the city up-to-date on developments in Washington.

"It shouldn't be any longer than two months," Glassford told the Commission Monday, "before Plymouth obtains its federal funds to

Board Gives Four Major Purposes

Trustees of western Wayne County's new community college set down the guidelines and purposes of the new institution Monday in the first major action since voters approved the college.

Meeting at the Newburgh School college office, the seven-member Board of Trustees approved unanimously the statement, on which all future college decisions will be based.

The trustees pledged to "make education beyond the high school level available to all students interested in, and capable of, benefiting from such an educational program."

"They proposed to provide 'terminal programs' for students not going on to full four-year studies, transfer programs to permit four-year studies to be completed for others, a technical institute, evening classes, and 'any proper endeavor likely to result in educational advantage.'"

Since being organized two months ago — following the successful elections in Plymouth, Livonia, Clarenceville and Garden City, the college board has involved itself in organizational matters.

It elected Harold Fischer of Plymouth its chairman and made plans to form a citizen's advisory group from the four participating school districts to help the committee.

"This document — our statement of purpose — is the most important achievement so far," secretary Ward McCain said Monday. "We hope that all residents in these communities will read it carefully."

"The primary purpose of this Community College is to make education beyond the high school level available to all students interested in, and capable of, benefiting from such an educational program."

"The equally important goals of this institution or the provision of: (a) Terminal programs for students not planning four year college programs.

(b) Transfer programs for students who do wish to complete four year college programs.

(c) A technical institute for the community, serving local needs for vocational and semi-professional education.

(d) Opportunities for interested persons to achieve their vocational and cultural needs through evening classes.

It is a further decision of this college cooperate with other departments of the

A young Plymouth area man and wife were killed early Saturday in a three-car accident while on their way home from work.

Dead are Earl K. Wisterman, 32, of 42015 Cherry Hill, Plymouth Township, and his 24-year-old wife, Mrs. Edna Wisterman.

They were killed when their auto was struck from the rear at the intersection of Van Born and Wayne Roads in Romulus.

Wayne County Sheriff's Deputies stated that the Wisterman's car had stopped for a traffic light on Van Born when another auto, driven by Leo R. Johnson, 31, of 9592 Nathaline, Redford Township struck it from behind.

Johnson's auto, police said, skidded into the path of a car driven by Frederick Grady of Ypsilanti.

A passenger in Wisterman's car, Peter Isaacson, 38, of 326 Shelbourne was reported in critical condition in Wayne County General Hospital. Johnson, Grady and a passenger in Grady's auto also were injured.

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Storm Water Barred: Plymouth Stands Firm on Sewer Ruling

Drainage of storm water into Plymouth's sanitary sewers will be barred in future home construction here. This decision was reached after a special meeting of City Commission members Monday night with a group of local builders.

At the same time, the Commission ruled that attempts should be made to persuade present homeowners who drain surface water into sanitary sewers to halt the practice.

Action came after a heated exchange between the builders and the city's engineering consultant, Frank Lodge. Builders asked Commission members to suspend their recent ruling forbidding storm water from flowing into sanitary sewers in future home construction.

"There are only 75-100 lots on which homes can be built left in the city," a spokesman for the builders said. He argued that the alternative of providing sump pumps in each of these homes would increase the cost of the home.

But Commission members seemed to be impressed by Lodge's arguments that overloaded sanitary sewers would result in the city having to build a new sewer system — at a cost approaching \$4 million.

"Plymouth has two options," Lodge said. "It can build a bigger storm sewer or increase the size of its sanitary sewer, or it can, on an individual home basis, use a sumping system to pick up water to put it into existing storm sewers."

Present storm sewers are laid too high in some areas of the city for storm water to be pumped into them without it being raised to a higher level.

"It's the opinion of our firm," Lodge continued, "that we'd be doing a disservice if we didn't recommend that you stop putting more storm water into the sanitary sewers. We're going to have to move into the opposite direction. We're going to have to start taking water out of the sewers."

Mayor Robert Sincok and other commission members expressed their sympathy with the builders since nearby communities still allow storm water to drain into sanitary sewers.

"After seeing what those around us are doing," Carl Shear pointed out, "I think we might be penalizing our own builders."

"In my own mind," agreed Sincok, "I'd feel better if all the areas did the same as we are."

The engineers' spokesman warned that allowing storm water from even the 100 new homes to be built in Plymouth before all lots are used up might jeopardize the community to a great extent. He cited statistics from Wyoming, a city near Grand Rapids, to show that an average of 10,000 gallons of water flowed from each home into sanitary sewers annually, its source being storm drainage. "Our sanitary sewers cannot accommodate this," he said. "And the addition of too much storm drainage makes sewerage treatment more expensive."

The Commission took no action on the builders' request; thereby letting stand its previous ruling against storm water flowing into the sanitary sewers.

Commission members will hold their next regular meeting next Monday night at 7:30 p.m.

With the amount of words and ink being used blasting commercialism at Christmas you would honestly think buying presents was dishonest and something to be ashamed of.

There is nothing that makes my heart feel warmer than to be shopping in a store and hear the wonderful old Christmas Carol "Silent Night" being played.

Why should any minister, church goer, or Christian (and they aren't always the same) look down from some lofty position and claim this is "extremely bad"?

What is the matter with bringing the spirit of the hearts being filled up with joy over the season to the point of wanting to remember loved ones with a gift?

Have you ever been in the press of a Christmas shopping crowd just before Christmas? The spirit of the people, although hurried, always seems happy to me. I never could figure out why it isn't all right to be happy and Christian at the same time. The very nature of our Christmas songs are joyous. They set the pace. It is a wonderful time of year to be serene, joyous and generous with whatever time and materials at your disposal.

Mind you now, my uncle, cousin, or dearest friend does not own a dry goods store, but if they did, I would probably knock off work a little early and go and help them during their busy season. It is the one time of year when the aged, the poor, the indigent, old Aunt Minnie back on the farm, is remembered in your mind, and heart, and a few dollars out of your purse.

Even in business, if it is an expression of appreciation for past business and not to put pressure on for more, I think it is a fine thing. In this hot-potato subject each case must be judged individually, however.

If Dr. Edgar S. Brown, Jr., director of worship of the United Lutheran Church in America had been standing beside me in the outer vestibule (so crowded was the church) of the Lutheran Church of the Epiphany for the "Carols by Candlelight" last Sunday night and viewed people with tears in their eyes when the senior choir sang "Gesu Bambino", one of the tenderest of Christmas songs, he would retract his sarcastic statements printed last week.

He said "the church should forget about Christmas and leave it to commercialism"; "the church at Christmas is like a stood-up female ringing her hands"; he said there should be no decorating, no carols because they already blast out in every store, no special music, "the pious salute was now greedy and best the 'whole mess' forgotten."

Well call it blasphemous if you will, but I'm all for putting up the tree, the tinsel, the nativity scene, remembering everybody you love with a gift or card, and going to Church Christmas or Christmas Eve and praying to the Good Lord that your Christmas bills do not come out to be more than you earn. If the story of Christmas and the God in your heart is real, there is no need to pretend about anything.

Churches teach us to bring God into our everyday lives. By the same token we must bring our everyday lives to God.

And it isn't an insult to the poor - as the Lutheran minister said in his article - goodness the poor look forward to Christmas for it is the one time when folks do something about it - it is not charity - it is done in the Spirit of honoring the birth of Christ. To make folks feel guilty for buying gifts at Christmas, to me, is unchristian.

Dr. Brown really shouldn't be frustrated - he should get out more - the performance of what he is trying to teach is really everywhere.

It is in Mrs. Wilson's fourth grade at Jefferson School in Livonia when they voted unanimously to give the money they would spend on gifts for each other and give to the new library.

It is in the members of the Redford Township Rotary Club who take time from their busy lives to entertain the crippled children because it is Christmas.

When the Ladies of Faith Lutheran Church forgo a gift exchange in preference to donating as a group to World Relief fund, this is Christmas.

It's Christmas which inspires Mrs. Mildred Kushler and a committee from the Moms in Plymouth to go to the Veteran's Hospital in Ann Arbor to give them a party with refreshments, prizes and tinsel.

If you are truly concerned over Christmas becoming pagan without the religious intonation (which I can't imagine unless you are a member of Rev. Brown's parish) and think you have been giving useless gifts, celebrate His birthday by giving to a favorite charity and writing your friends you have given a donation in their names to those who need it. Most organizations of this nature even supply letters to that effect. Cancer Foundation does. So does Michigan Heart Association, at 3919 John R., Detroit 1, Mich. Cancer Foundation is at 9901 Newburg in Livonia and 849 Penniman in Plymouth.

But I still think it a good idea to remember Aunt Annie with a lace handkerchief and Uncle John with some cigars, and for the life of me it doesn't seem in poor taste gaudy, or unchristian.

SPORTS OBSERVER

From what I've seen of the new high school basketball substitution rule it smells.

In case you aren't familiar with the change in the code, a team now can shoot in a new face every time there's a violation (such as steps or travelling), every time the ball goes out of bounds and when a foul or jump is called or when there's a timeout period.

A year ago the regulations specified a sub could enter the action only when a foul, a jump or timeout was called. It was felt by the rules makers that the former rule didn't permit a coach ample opportunities to get personal changes into the game. Hence the additions . . . and the sad state of affairs which now exists.

Of course, some coaches won't cry about the change. It might help them. But if you're a fast-breaking team and one which checks closely on defense, brother, the rule will hurt.

The fans also are apt to scream as time goes on. For example, suppose Bentley is pressing a rival into a flock of mistakes. Every time the ball scoots out of bounds or a steps-violation is whistled, the alert Bentley charges grab the ball and rush it down court and make a basket.

Well, that's the way it used to be. But an alert, opposing coach can now check such matters by having a sub standing at the scorer's table ready to bounce into the game when the violation is committed.

As the code now stands, when the Bentley rival loses the ball on there's a whistle, the timer must sound his horn and the referee must tout his whistle again so that the sub can step on to the court. All of this naturally slows down the action and kills the fast break.

Observed one area coach the other evening: "I'm going to have a sixth man set to go if we run into a situation where we're being fast-broke. I'm sure we won't stop all the fast-breaks, but we'll hold back a lot of them."

"We'll be able to get our kids back on defense while the play is stopped for our sub to go in. I know the other coach won't like it, but I couldn't care less."

Such perennial powers as Highland Park and River Rouge are bound to suffer the most. These are close-checking teams which cause their foes to fumble the ball all over the gym.

In turn, the Parkers and Rouge always have capitalized on fast-breaking after getting the ball. Now the smart, opposing coach can do something.

The second major change in the prep rule, which deal with no free throws after offensive fouls, has met with general approval.

We note that the referees have taken matters into their own hands to avoid some difficulties which might arise because of the way the rule is written.

According to the wordage, there's to be no shot awarded if an offensive foul is committed when one member of the team has the ball. On the other hand, if the ball, being passed from one man to another, and a foul is made by the offensive club, a free throw is to be awarded at the end of the court.

The referees realizing that the matter of player on team control sometimes is a split-second business, have gone into a closed-session and decided that on 99 percent of offensive-foul situations, no free throw will be awarded. In this regarded they are following the professional rule.

All of which makes a great deal of sense the way we see it.

On the subject of basketball, it's a shame that Wil Chamberlain can't perfect his free-throw shooting. The other evening he missed 16 from the charity line when he finished up with 78 points against the Los Angeles Lakers.

On of these days the Stilt will get to 100 in a game. It's a certainty to happen.

But great as the Stilt is in pumping 'em in, I'd still like to have Elgin Baylor as MY player. Baylor has to be the greatest in the game today. He'll hurt you more than any other player . . . Chamberlain and Boston's Bill Russell included.

They're still saying that Baylor must enter the arm on January 2. I wonder!

Con Con Comment

(Editor's Note: Delegate to the Constitutional Convention from this Senatorial District is Weldon O. Yeager. He is writing periodic reports of what's happening in Lansing.)

By WELDON YEAGER

Now the Convention is passing into a new phase since the date for delegates to enter proposals. From this point on, proposals or ideas will be before committees directly because the committees will very soon be reporting out sections of the Constitution for debate among all 144 delegates.

When I started to publish this sheet on Con Con views, I stated that the purpose was to give my views and what I am doing as a delegate. To this end I want to review the proposals that I have sponsored. Some have been mentioned in previous letters.

1007-Reaffirms the right of property owners to rent, buy or sell their real property to any person they choose and to be able to instruct an agent in this regard without interference from the government. Several hearings have been held on this proposal. It would nullify Rule 9. The question is: Does Rule 9 take away a basic civil right to own and dispose of property as the owner chooses? I think yes. The moral question of the right or wrong of discrimination is not the issue. A realtor is not an agent of the government because the state issues a license permit to operate under the law; he is the agent of his principal and as such must act for that principal and be so instructed. If it is the moral question, then Rule 9 should apply to homeowners themselves, not realtors.

1045-Proposal to limit the term (4 years) of Governor to 2 consecutive terms. There are many who oppose this, but I feel strongly for it. First, I believe 8 years is ample time for any Governor to enact a program. This is the better part of a decade. Second, if talk among the delegates is any indication, the Governor under a new Constitution will have more power. This is as it should be, but with greater power and longer terms, there must be some practical limits on duration since there will be increased intensity. Third, if each 8 years the parties must put up candidates to discuss issues, the power of incumbency and personality are minimized and government decided on issues is better off in the long run. Personality over-shadows issues and this is particularly true in the incumbent party. Fourth, I believe a new administration (even of the same party) brings with it a new enthusiasm and a fresh viewpoint which keeps democracy vital in spite of a learning period. We believe in legislative re-apportionment each 10 years; therefore, a new executive approach each 8 years is not unreasonable.
