### FACTS and OPINIONS by Paul Chandler



It took the Livonia City Council 15 minutes to get around to rejecting the proposal of Mayor Cavanagh of Detroit for a new income tax bill. Even shorter time will be required when the matter comes up in Plymouth and Redford.

Mayor Cavanagh seeks new state legislation which would permit local communities to levy income taxes upon payrolls therein. This would permit Detroit to tax all who work there, including a few hapless thousands from Redford, Plymouth and Livonia.

Cavanagh sought approval of his plan before the Ways and Means Committee of the County Board of Supervisors Monday afternoon. Since the membership of this committee is heavily populated by officials from communities outside of Detroit, the proposal ran into substantial opposition and was tabled.

Mayor Brashear immediately notified the Livonia City Council and asked them to act formally, stating their views for the record. In a few moments the Council had a brief resolution saying, "We request the Mayor to not concur with Mayor Cavanagh's proposed bill to give cities and counties power to levy income tax."

At the time the Ways and Means Committee tabled the tax plan, a new idea was suggested. It was that only Wayne County itself be authorized to levy an income tax, and that the County then dole out the revenues to the various communities, including Detroit.

The figure being used is two percent of gross income. Cavanagh would have Detroit levy one percent and the County one percent. The alternative plan would have the County levying the full two percent.

Facts and Opinions has said before that it sees no better solution (and this isn't painless, by a long shot) to local tax problems than for individual communities to be empowered to collect income tax. Property taxes have "gone about as far as they kin go," to paraphrase the show song.

But the new State law should restrict the ability to collect to residents of the community. There is no relief or gain or justice if suburban residents are forced to build their own communities and at the same time, send money into Detroit to help that city with its problems.

The plan where a County would collect and then rebate back to the communities is not sound for still another reason: the County form of government is inefficient, duplicating and out-moded in a metropolitan area. The County as such will be abolished one of these days. It should have less control of our purse strings, not more.

News item in the Tuesday papers which you may be sure was read intently by all of our local school administrators—

"For the first time in their school tax history, voters in the Wayne Community School district turned down two requests for additional funds Monday. One was a 9 million dollar bond issue, the other a request for 5 mills for operation."

Considerable controversy continues to exist in Plymouth over teachers' salary level and a tax increase. This week, the Livonian's man-in-the-street reported asked Plymouth area residents—

"Would you vote for a tax increase to raise teacher's salaries?"

"Yes, I believe I would," replied Mrs. D. Brockwell, 11218 Gold Arbor. "I think we need good teachers, and that's the only way we're going to get them."

Charles Catlett, 404 Irvin, told The Livonian: "Yes, I would vote for higher teachers' salaries. I have never known a teacher that I thought was overpaid. I think teachers are entitled to more money and the only way to get it is from more taxes."

"No, I wouldn't," said William C. Fannin, 682 Jener. "I think we're taxed heavy enough. Although I'd like to see teachers get more money, I don't know how they're going to get it. I pay too high taxes already."

Mrs. James Robertson, 659 N. Holbrook, replied, "Yes, I would. I do believe that most teachers are underpaid, with all the work involved and the time they put into their job."

Violinists Miss Emily Mutter Adams (concertmaster) and Mrs. Nathalie Dale (ass't. concertmaster) will play "Concerto for Two Violins, in D Minor" by Bach. Mr. Louis Stout, French hornist, has selected "Concerto for Horn and Orchestra in F Major" by Strauss for his solo appearance.

Under the direction of conductor Wayne Dunlap the orchestra will also present "Symphony No. 5 in B Flat" by Shubert and the especially delightful "Symphonic Metamorphosis on Themes of Von Weber" by Hindemith.

Mrs. Dale, a resident of Ann Arbor, is a native of Athens, Greece, born of Russian parents. She started taking violin lessons at the age of 5, later entering the conservatory. Further study was continued in Austria as a teen-ager. Marriage to John Dale, an Englishman, interrupted her musical education which was resumed when they joined close relatives in Ann Arbor, Michigan, after a brief stay in England. Mrs. Dale was awarded her Bachelor of Music in 1952 and her Masters in 1953. She is a mother of three children, teaches violin privately, plays in chamber music groups and is a member of the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra.

Concertmaster Miss Emily

Mutter Adams is well known in the Detroit area for her many musical achievements and activities. She is currently with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra as well as the Plymouth Symphony and has been associated with the Lansing Symphony, Detroit Women's Symphony, the Jewish Center Symphony, the Eastern Michigan College Symphony, the Staff Orchestra at WXYZ.

Louis J. Stout, a native of Wellsville, New York, has been with the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra for two years and is currently the French Horn instructor at the University of Michigan.

## School Tax Increase? Board to Meet Tonight

Members of the Plymouth Board of Education will meet tonight for the third time in a week to try to reach agreement on a tax vote for the school district in April.

Board members appeared to be close to agreement before going into tonight's session that a 7½-mill tax issue will appear on the ballot April 16—either as one package or as two separate proposals.

Three-and-one-half of the mills would be a renewal of expiring taxes and the rest would include funds for salary improvements for teachers and building improvements. It's the question of teachers' salaries that remains a stumbling block for the Board.

Recommendations for separate ballot propositions for the regular millage and for teachers' salary increases came from both a Citizens' Committee, which presented its report Saturday to the Board, and from the Plymouth Education Association, which represents teachers.

Monday, most Board members appeared to accept the principle of a separate ballot proposition for each, but asked that a "professional growth" or "earned increment" principle be involved.

This last proposal, recommended by the Citizens' Committee, requires teachers to take two hours of college work, participate in workshop sessions or engage in beneficial travel to qualify for the "earned increment" program. The PEA is studying the proposal.

Education spokesmen, led by PEA president John Donegan, asked the Board to consider putting the two together as one package. PEA members criticized the Board for referring to the salary adjustment of \$200 offered teachers as a "raise." The Board had proposed hiking starting pay from \$4700 to \$4900 and added a week-

longer to the school year. "This ranged from a 'raise' of virtually nothing for teachers at their maximum to only \$88 to beginning teachers," PEA members said. In addition, the Board offered to pay half the cost of Blue Cross hospitalization insurance.

Chaired by Harvey L. Ziel, the Committee—in addition to its earned increment principle—proposed the following steps:

That proposals presented to the electorate be placed on three separate propositions.

1. For renewal of the expired 3½ mills.

2. For increased millage required to open the Junior High School-West and other funds required for salary schedule increments, increased enrollment and Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum.

3. For any adjustments to salary schedules.

That the Board of Education institute a policy of strict budgetary controls pro-

viding assigned responsibilities, adequate contingencies and minimum adjustments.

That any increase in State Aid allowances and/or State equalized valuation over those used in preliminary calculations be used to reduce any millage increases authorized.

That the board adopt a policy regarding fringe benefits keeping in mind that partial involvement now will eventually result in total involvement.

That the cost of an Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum be included in 1962-1963 budget.

## Schools Close; Roads Blocked

The Farmer's Almanac predicted a Washington's Birthday blizzard and right on schedule seven inches of snow blanketed the Plymouth area between Thursday and Saturday.

The snowstorm—which continued with icy rains through the weekend—forced the closing of parochial schools in the Plymouth area Monday and hampered the driving of scores of motorists.

A near-emergency developed when the Department of Public Works ran out of salt Thursday just before the snow hit. "We were able," DPW Superintendent Joe Bida said, however, "to get another 30 tons late Thursday night."

One of the city's suppliers—International Salt Co.—has exhausted its supply to Detroit and Dear-

born, and another had to be hunted up.

## Four Schools May Shut Permanently

Four one and two-room schoolhouses in rural areas of the Plymouth Community School Districts may be closed down before next September.

Members of the Board of

Education met Monday to discuss a proposed budget for next year and found themselves \$31,000 in the red, if a proposed 6.5 millage issue is passed by voters.

"There are a number of possible ways of saving funds," Superintendent Russell Ishister told the Board. "One might affect the outlying schools," Assistant Superintendent Melvin Blunk reported that elementary principals had suggested closing only one of the schools.

In question are Canton Center school, a one-room building with 46 kindergarten students, and Hough, Cherry Hill and Truesdell schools, each two-room buildings with from 38 to 46 pupils each.

Present plans call for four rooms of sixth grade pupils at the new Junior High School-West, but it is "possible," Blunk said, "that five rooms could be put there."

The transfer, if it is put into effect, would boost the average of class sizes in the district. There is now an average of 27.4 pupils in Plymouth classrooms.

## Buildings to Topple on Main St.

One of the oldest blocks of business buildings in downtown Plymouth will come tumbling down soon.

Owners of the property on the northwest corner of Main St. and Penniman expect to apply for a permit this week to tear down a number of businesses in the block.

Among those to be removed are a now-closed service station, a taxi-cab stand, a restaurant, and later, a cleaners establishment which now occupies the property.

First Federal Savings and Loan Assn. owns the property in question and city officials have commented that plans have been discussed for erection of a branch of the savings concern with a block of new business houses.

It cost the city \$1,000 in labor, equipment and material to combat icy streets and blocked roads. "We cleared all the main streets in the downtown area and even plowed the residential streets open," Bida said. "This is something that Detroit and Dearborn don't even do—open the residential streets."

So far, the city has used 1,500 tons of salt this year, to clear icy roads caused by winter weather.

"In February alone," Bida said, "we used half of our year's budget—about \$4,230—and during this month we've used 250 tons of salt so far."

The DPW Superintendent said some complaints were received during the week from residents who said their autos or driveways had been plowed in. "But those complaints were over-ridden by many compliments," he said. He posted a notice on the DPW garage bulletin board which read: "At this time I'd like to thank all of you for the fine job you have done during the recent snowfalls. We have received many compliments and you are the ones that deserve the credit."

## Plymouth Road Shopping Plaza Zoning OK'd

Rezoning which would permit a shopping center on Plymouth Rd. at Newburg Rd. and a convalescent home at Ann Arbor Rd. and Ann Arbor Trail was approved by the Livonia City Council Monday night.

Donald Newman asked to have four acres on Plymouth Rd. changed from residential to commercial zoning. On this property stands the old "Lang Auction House" and Newman said it would be torn down "in the very near future."

Newman said he owned the southwest corner of Newburg and Plymouth, which is zoned commercial now, and needed the extra four acres for an adequate size parcel for the "shopping center." Newman has built a center in West Dearborn anchored by a colonial-type A&P supermarket.

"The demolition of the existing auction building will add to the aesthetics of the area," the Livonia Planning Commission noted.

Petitioners for the convalescent home were Ben and Miriam Baskin. They successfully had the NW corner of Ann Arbor Rd. and Ann Arbor Trail rezoned from C-2 to PS.

## To Women It May Concern

To begin with I admit to being an easy sell, quickly enthused, and very much in accord with assisting the big economy picture by keeping money in circulation. In my opinion it would take a lot of sales resistance, to not be absolutely sold on the new gas dishwasher, not even available in the stores as yet.

Last Thursday morning Consumers Power Company of Livonia invited members of the press and other representatives to a preview showing of this miracle Preway gas dishwasher. 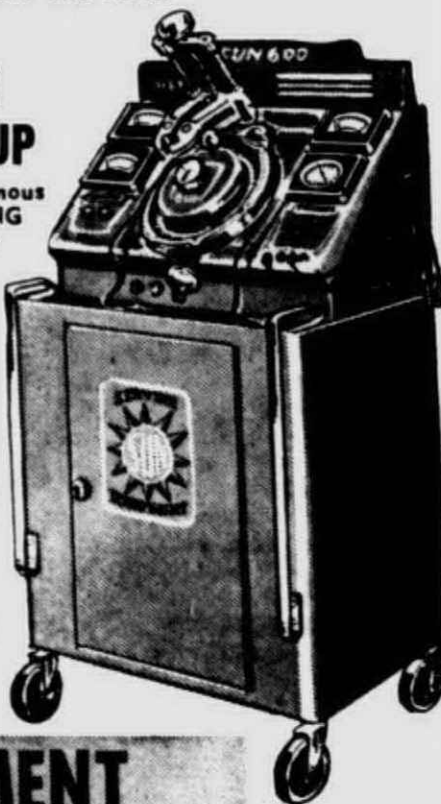

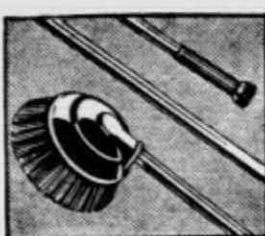

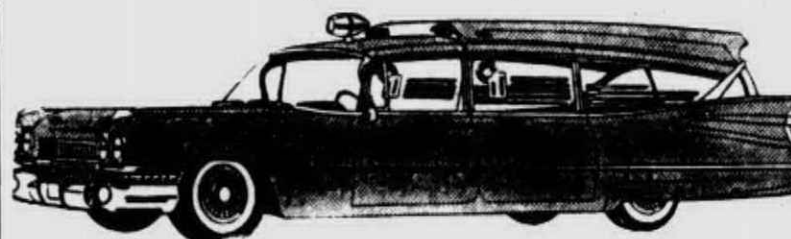

# Free Health Unit in Area

Dr. Joseph G. Molner, County Health Commissioner, in ceremonies held Friday at Wonderland Shopping Center, Livonia, officially launched a combination health screening program aimed at the detection of tuberculosis, diabetes and syphilis in out-Wayne County. The unit is a pilot one launched to see if residents will respond to the opportunity.

Before the program ends on April 20, mobile units will have visited locations in or near most of the communities in out-Wayne County, Dr. Molner said.

Dr. Molner suggests that everyone 21 years of age and over take advantage of the unit's services as a convenient way of having a check-up which can be of value in the prevention of early detection of possible disease. Chest x-rays, for example, in addition to detecting signs of other chest abnormalities. Early detection of these abnormalities which may include lung cancer or heart disease, gives the patient the best possible chance for recovery, Dr. Molner said.

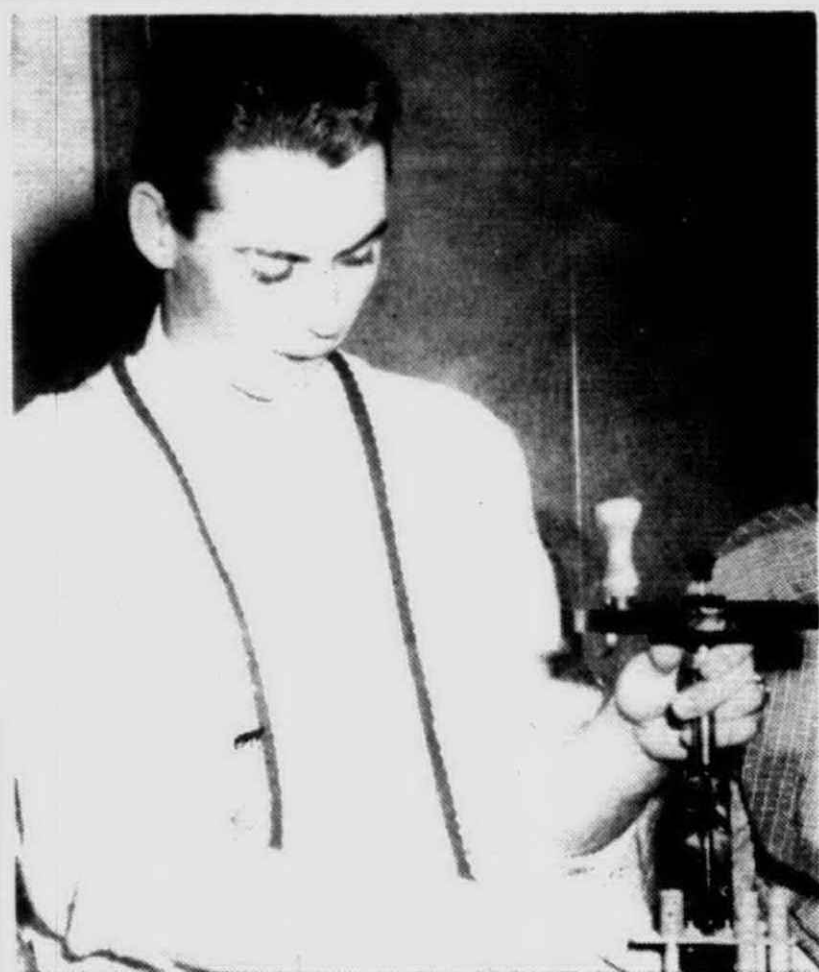
Certain persons have a tendency to diabetes, according to medical authorities. This tendency can be found on a screening test long before symptoms appear. Then, under a doctor's direction, with proper attention to diet, weight control, exercise and personal hygiene, the onset of diabetes can be postponed or even prevented.

biology student who operated on their thyroid glands.
