Forbid Storm Water In Plymouth Sewers

No more storm water will be allowed to drain into sanitary sewers in Plymouth after March 27.

The City Commission Monday passed the second and third readings of a new ordinance designed to eliminate the practice. "No storm water from all rooms, courts, paved or hard surfaced areas," it reads, "shall be drained into the sanitary sewer."

The Commission's action came after several weeks of talking with DPW officials and builders about the proposed action. Local builders had protested the city's plans as a hardship, but DPW representatives had called the proposal a "must" to prevent flooding of basements.

In the same ordinance, the Commission ruled Monday that "all soil, waste and vent and water distribution pipe in the plumbing and drainage system shall be subjected to a water test or air test when deemed necessary and requested by the Plumbing Department."

The ordinance also requires roof increases by stating that each waste or vent stack shall be increased to at least three inch size at its roof terminal. In related action, the Commission asked City Manager Al Glassford to prepare plans for installation of a new sewer that

would serve the chrome-plating division of Burrough's Corporation.

The Commission acted after receiving a letter from Burrough's stating that their new division would be in operation July 1 and that the sewer would have to be available at that time.

DPW Superintendent Joseph Bida told the Commission that installation of the sewer would take 30 days.

Eyeglasses Wanted for Indian Drive

Plymouth area residents will again have the opportunity to help handicapped youngsters in India this year.

Eyeglasses—of all shapes and sizes—are being sought from local residents to ship to the Asian nation.

The annual project is being sponsored by the Plymouth Lions Club, which will send all glasses which are collected to Indian doctors, who, in turn, will fit them to the needs of Indians.

"Last year," Lester Coutts, chairman of the drive, re-

ports, "more than 800 pair of glasses which Plymouth residents no longer needed were donated to our drive."

He said containers would be placed in churches, barber shops, bowling alleys and other places of business throughout the city by the Lions Club to receive donations. Even sunglasses are wanted, he said.

Approve Street Projects

With virtually no opposition from local residents, the Plymouth City Commission Monday night held hearings on special assessment rolls for curb and gutter improvements for seven projects.

Only two residents appeared to question Commissioners about the special projects, cost of which will be shared by the city and property owners.

Streets on which hearings were held included Dewey from Hartsough to Ross; Harding from Hartsough to Birch Estates; S. Harvey from Wing to Ann Arbor Rd.; Maple from S. Harvey to McKinley; Roosevelt from Hartsough to Birch Estates; Ross from Evergreen to McKinley; and Evergreen to S. Main to S. Harvey.

Monday's session was in marked contrast to an earlier hearing last month in which more than 30 residents jammed the Commission chambers, many of them to protest cost of the projects.

City officials have stated the projects are necessary to keep drainage service at a high level. They say road surfaces will be improved by the project as well.

In other action Monday, the Commission took a firm stand against what it termed attempts to establish a county-wide income tax in Wayne County.

After hearing a report from Arch Vallier, the city's representative on the Wayne Co. Board of Supervisors, the Commission voted with only one dissent to oppose a county income tax. Commissioner Richard Wernette, who voted "no," said he would support a county income tax—in which Plymouth received a rebate—in preference to a city of Detroit income tax on workers who lived in the suburbs.

Vallier said "no indication has come forth that there's been any attempt to streamline county offices" and blamed this as part of the reason for the county's financial woes.

"I don't see any need for such a tax," he said.

Commissioner James Houk supported Vallier's position and the Commission approved his motion.

In a related manner, the Commission received and noted a report from the city of Farmington on the proposed Detroit income tax.

Three new ordinances passed their second and third readings by the Commission. All will become operative on March 27.

Approved was an ordinance to amend ordinance number 252, to clear up the city's building code; a plumbing code ordinance to require roof increases and an end to storm water drainage into sewers (see story elsewhere on this page); and a zoning ordinance requiring 12-foot side-yards in two-family dwellings.

City Manager Al Glassford was asked by Commissioner Hartmann to check into ways to eliminate what he termed the "pigeon problem" at downtown business locations.

DOOMED TO DISUSE? One of the few remaining one-room school houses in Michigan, Canton Center School, may be empty of students when next fall rolls around. Looking for ways to slash its 1962 budget, members of the Board of Education have discussed the possibility of closing down four outlying schools, Canton Center, Cherry Hill, Hough and Truesdell. No final decision has been made, although principals have suggested one of the schools be closed. The effect would be to place more students in the new Junior High School — West. All of the schools are one or two rooms, and the new number of pupils averages about 40 at each.

In answer to a number of queries—No site yet has been selected, tentatively or otherwise, for the proposed Community College.

When it is selected, it will be with an eye to eventually cover 150 acres. The Board of Trustees sees it as including a cultural area, as well as instructional facilities.

And that's about where things stand, pending an election June 11 when the voters will be asked to approve a single mill for the college.

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Millage Amount Still Is Question

Plymouth's Board of Education met until after midnight Monday but failed to come up with a solution to the community's school tax crisis.

It'll make another attempt tonight. Crux of the Board's problem and the one which has faced it at several marathon meetings this week — is how much money to ask for on the April 16 ballot. This is what is slated for "final decision" at tonight's session.

Facing local voters on the ballot will be a request for at least 6.5 mills—3.5 of which are renewal of present taxes and three of which are new, for operating the new Junior High School-West and for raises in teachers' salaries.

Slated for possible consideration on the ballot will be another mill—which may be included in a one-package "shot" with the 6.5 mill issue, or which may be a separate proposal.

The overshadowing issue on this question is teachers' salaries. Included in the 6.5 mill package is provision for some improvements. Board members have asked salaries from \$4,700 to \$4,900 starting pay, although they've increased the number of workdays for teachers which, the teachers claim, only means an \$88 raise.

A Citizens' Committee, appointed by the Board, has proposed a new "earned increment" plan which would hike the salary scale even higher, giving teachers credit for University courses, school workshops or beneficial travel—which would be required for teachers to benefit.

It's this which might mean the extra tax request. The Citizens' Committee and the Plymouth Education Assn., a teacher's group, have plugged for two separate ballot proposals: one for operating millage and one for teachers' salaries.

At last report, following Monday's executive session, the Board was still undecided whether to ask for two proposals or put a one-shot proposal on the ballot.

During several sessions in the past week—including one which ran all day Saturday—Board members, Citizens' Committee members and the P.E.A. have been reviewing their positions.

A final decision will "probably" be made tonight, according to a Board of Education spokesman. The public meeting begins at 8 p.m.

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Her Mail Heaviest on Medical Aid, Says Local Congresswoman

How does a Congressman in Washington keep in touch with the folks back home?

Walk into 17th District Congresswoman Martha Griffiths' office in the nation's capital and glance at the stack of letters on her desk.

The postmarks from Livonia, Redford and Plymouth on the mail point out that the constituents here are keeping a close watch.

"We receive from 50 to 60 letters a day from constituents," Mrs. Griffiths told this newspaper in a Washington interview last week. "And we have a tremendous amount of telephone calls and visitors also."

Most popular issue on the minds of constituents now, she says, is the proposed medical aid to the aged. Senior citizens and others from the 17th District are making

their views known on this more than any other bill. Another topic is international peace. The Congresswoman met with a delegation of five 17th District residents who went to Washington last week with 5,000 others to press for "an end to the arms race."

For Mrs. Griffiths—a 12-year veteran of Capitol Hill—the daily routine begins at 6:30 or 7 each morning. She breakfasts in her apartment at 215 "C" street—occasionally has breakfast out—and is in her office to read mail and visit constituents from 9 to 10 each morning.

Recently appointed to the House Ways and Means Committee, meetings of that body hold Mrs. Griffiths' attention from 10 until noon, when the House of Representatives meets in full session. By 1:30, she's back in Committee session until 4 p.m. From then until 5:30,

she signs mail and sees constituents.

"There are some social affairs held evenings here in Washington, many by Detroiters, which I attend," she comments, "but in this job, there's a lot of homework to do, struggling over how laws affect our people."

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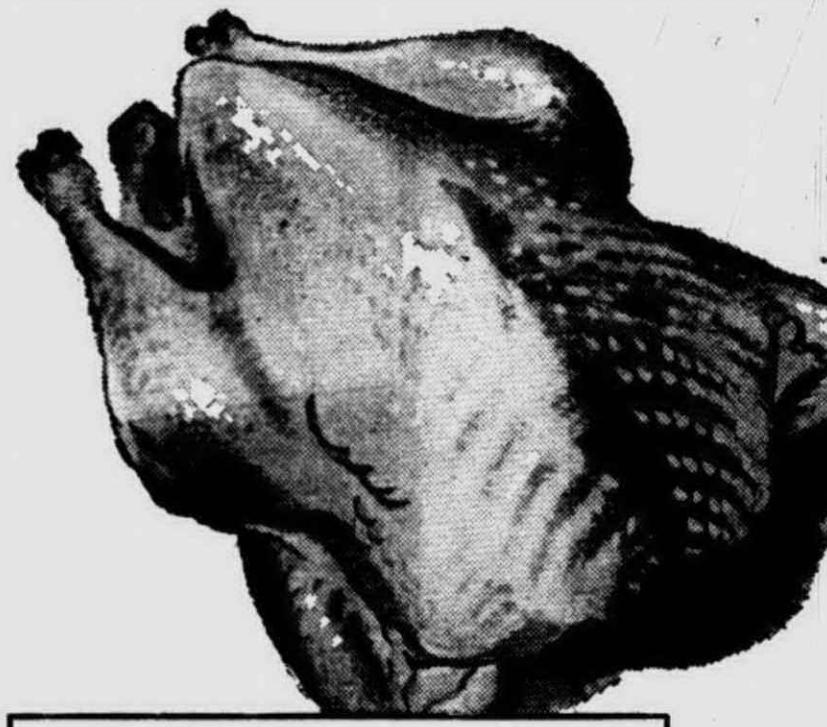

VFW Opposes Homestead Bill

The VFW has testified before the Senate Taxation committee against controversial Beadle Bill (S-1001) which would place rigid income restrictions on qualifying for veterans homestead tax exemptions.

Legislative Officer Boniface Maile and Department Commander Zigmund Cybulski, represented the VFW at the recent Senate committee hearing, presided over by Senator Clyde Gerlings (R-Holland), the chairman of the taxation committee. Maile said the VFW opposed the bill as "it was constituted" with income restrictions of \$5,000 for a married veteran and only \$4,000 for a single veteran. The VFW testified it would favor income limitations of \$7,500 for married veterans and \$6,000 for single veterans, with retirements, social security and VA gratuities not to be considered income. Another VFW principle would be to increase the evaluation from the present \$7,500 to \$10,000 based on state equalization.

Maile said the VFW did not feel that the income limitations provided for in the Beadle bill were high enough.

In the new budget out recently, more than \$9 million was set aside for veterans homestead tax exemptions. Addition of widows a couple of years back hiked the appropriation considerably.

Tom Robison scored another first for Thurston when he beat the field home in the 100-yard breast stroke in 1:09 to tie the league record.

Thurston's other win came in the free style relay with Bruce Kordenbroch, Bruce Vorce, Neil Curran and Oscar

Amberg teaming up to beat the rest of the field in 1:39.7.

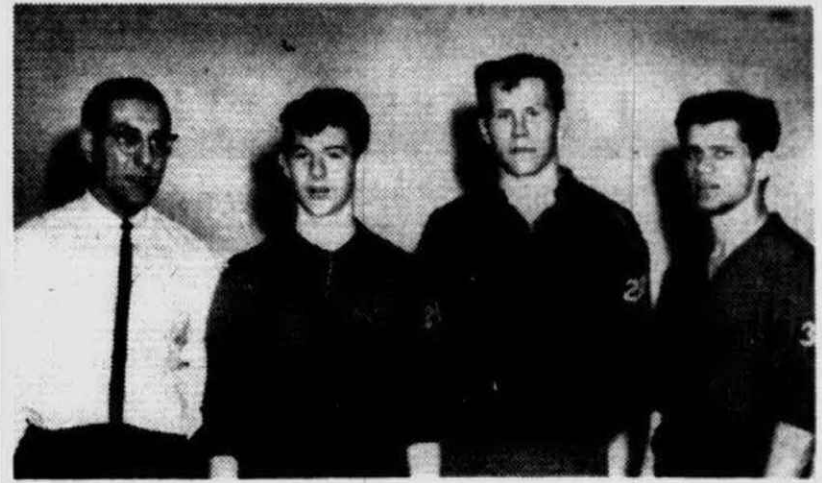

The state meet will open at Ann Arbor with preliminaries and the 400-yard free style finals Friday evening. Other preliminaries will be held Saturday and evening with the finals at night.
