Neighbors Rally to Cheer Stricken 10-Year-Old Girl

Plymouth Township prospects of another six months in the hospital have been depressing—and a radio will make the time more cheerful.

"Bonnie never complains," said Mrs. Delores Vanderhoef, 40375 Gilbert, Plymouth Township, a mother of five who collected donations from neighbors to buy the radio. "She didn't even ask for the radio."

"She's very likeable. The family has had so much bad luck that I felt somebody should

show that they have compassion for a young girl like this."

Mrs. Vanderhoef trudged through rain and mud last week to gather money for the radio—and she had \$10 left when the collecting was through, which was given to Bonnie's parents. Hospitalization insurance has run out for the youngster and with her father out-of-work, paying for the next six months of confinement is going to be a hard struggle, she said.

For Bonnie's parents, Tom and Audrey Thomsen, who live on Newburgh Road near Ann Arbor Trail, bad luck has seemed to be a byword. Since December, most of their family has been ill and just last week the Thomsens' second daughter, five years old, was hospitalized with a tonsil infection.

"There isn't much hope for Bonnie's recovery," Mrs. Vanderhoef said. "Doctors hope at the very most that six more months of treatment in the hospital may mean she can go home—but if she does get home, she'll be bedfast."

"What Bonnie needs most is cheer—in the form of visits or cards. She enjoys opening and reading cards, which can be sent to her at the hospital."

DPW to Start Tree Spraying, Plus Sweeping

If good weather continues, the Department of Public Works will begin sweeping all paved streets in Plymouth—and spraying of Elm trees owned by the city will get underway in two weeks. Already, residents have been asked to keep their autos in driveways so spray doesn't fall on them.

"Streets in Plymouth are holding up very well, considering this has been the worst winter since 1928," City DPW Superintendent Joseph Bida told The Livonian this week.

"The frost has gotten deeper than three feet," he said, "and the streets that were not sealed the past few years are worse than the streets which were sealed."

"The roads that were salted are 98 percent perfect except for the edges, where the water stands. Some of the other communities have asked why we have no breakups when they have breakups after block which are impassable."

Bida said the DPW has been busy with some of the older paved streets, such as E. Ann Arbor Trail and Penniman and Farmer, keeping them in shape. "We feel keeping our roads open is a must," he said, "and alleys can be blocked off if necessary. We have used over 100 tons of patch in February and so far in March, the cost of which is about \$12 per ton plus labor."

Target Is September For Home Demolition

By September 15, the buildings standing on the site of Plymouth's Urban Renewal project will be only a memory.

That's the hope of City Clerk Joseph H. Neale, who assumed his duties as the city's Urban Renewal director this week. Near outlined steps to be taken to complete the project this week for The Livonian.

The Sept. 15 date is only tentative, Neale emphasized, but steps are being taken this week to start land acquisition, first move in the project.

"I have placed a call to Chicago, to the district Urban Renewal office, to get information on our fund allocation," Neale said. "We want to get on this as fast as we can."

\$300,000 Hike in Proposed Budget

With Plymouth's school millage election only three weeks away, members of the Board of Education met with teachers and administrators Monday night to finalize their campaign and state their financial goals.

Putting forth what appears to be a solid "united front", teachers, principals and Board members said they were united behind the millage effort which will

• An \$80,000 increase in teacher salaries; \$52,000 to improve base salary scales; \$18,000 for 5 more days of service by all teachers; \$10,000 for encouragement of professional growth.

• A \$54,000 allotment to operate and staff the new Junior High School.

• A \$32,000 allotment to pay one-half health insurance for employees, \$23,000 for replacement of buses and driver education cars, \$42,000 to handle increased enrollment, \$42,000 for teacher salary schedule increments, and \$30,000 for salary increases for other personnel. Earmarked for payment of loans is \$21,000 and for improved maintenance is \$12,000.

Board members said the millage increase was necessary "to keep quality education in Plymouth." They said the Board's offer of teacher salary increases to \$5,000 starting pay — the biggest item in the issue—would be returned in value by teachers through the five additional days of service, evaluation of their performance and encouragement of professional growth.

Facing voters on the ballot will be a 7.5 mill package—including 3.5 mills renewal of expiring millage and four mills which are new. The board has promised to levy only 3 1/2 of the new mills this year.

Commenting on Plymouth's cost-per-pupil operation, which is estimated at \$458.82, Superintendent Russell Isbister said the figure seems to outrank other nearby communities only because of two problems unique to Plymouth — transportation costs and recreation costs.

Annual Twp. Meeting Is Saturday

The Annual Meeting for residents of Plymouth Township will take place this Saturday, March 31, Township Clerk Fred Miller announced this week.

A yearly event at which all Township citizens can take part in community business, the Annual Meeting will begin at 1 p.m. in the Township Hall, Ann Arbor Rd. at Lilley Rd.

At the meeting, the budget for the community for the coming year will be presented and appointment of staff officers will be made. "We will also accept dates for regular Township Board meetings," Miller said.

Referring to other communities where the Annual Meeting has been abolished, Miller said, "Our group has been very congenial and co-operative. We have never found the need to abolish the meeting."

"We have to serve 46 square miles of area with transportation," Isbister said, "which means our transportation costs are \$16.07 per pupil per year. In addition we pay for a recreation and adult education program which amounts to \$25,000 or about \$5 per pupil per year."

Estimated receipts for the coming year in Plymouth if the vote passes include \$1,774,000 from local taxes, \$802,000 from state aid, and \$47,000 from other sources, an increase of \$341,000 over 1961-62 receipts. Expenditures are estimated at \$2,608,000 for 1962-63, as proposed, an increase of \$316,000 over the current year.

Board members said that if the school millage request passes, it will mean an increase from 14.40 operation tax mills this year to 17.90 operation mills. Debt retirement and building and site sinking fund levies will remain unchanged.

"For a person paying a \$200 school tax now, the increase would be \$30," they said.

In pure theory, among those in this community who should be most intensely interested in the local tax and business "climate" are members and leaders of the Chamber of Commerce.

By its very articles of incorporation—it's sole reason for being in existence—the C. of C. is meant to be a "pressure group" representing the point of view of business, commerce, industry, and the professions in town.

This reporter well realizes the difficulties under which Chamber leaders operate—among them starvation budgets and king-sized apathy—but nonetheless...

When major, deep-rooted issues arise which will affect the economic climate of the home town, all of us are entitled to, and would benefit from, an analysis of the facts from the C. of C. point of view. The Chamber as a pressure group should and must use its influence in trying to achieve its aims.

Specifically, controversial school requests for more millage and increased borrowing authority are swirling all around our ears at the moment. Has the Chamber analyzed this, reached a conclusion, and is it ready to advise "Yes" or "No?"

Again specifically, there is tremendous effort being spent today to invoke some kind of an income tax which would directly affect local residents. Detroit proposes to tax all who work there, wherever they live. Wayne County proposes an income tax on all within its boundaries, which includes every single reader to this newspaper. The state of Michigan is deadly serious in studying its own income tax, to augment the revenues flowing to Lansing.

Another matter on the table today is that of the Sunday closing of retailers. A bill has passed the House of Representatives in Lansing already. But is it the correct bill? How will it affect jobs and taxes and other matters right here in our home town? Are small "mom and pa" stores adequately protected?

When a member pays his dues to a Chamber of Commerce, he expects to get some action for his money. Above all else, he expects his organization to get in there and scrap to put across the views of the membership in the public arena.

The voice of the Chamber of Commerce on vital issues always has been too quiet in this community. Meanwhile the economic issues have become increasingly important and dangerous.

As a start—just what is the Chamber's views on the forthcoming school millage requests?

There's an interesting political rumor swirling through the Democratic party which hasn't been much exposed yet to the public.

There's no way to confirm it or even to get anybody to discuss it openly, but it goes like this—

Some time in the near future, U. S. Senator Pat McNamara would resign from office for health or fatigue reasons.

The vacancy he would leave would be left open for (a) former Gov. Williams, or (b) George Edwards, former supreme court justice, and now Detroit police boss, or (c) Gov. Swainson.

If it should come up Swainson, that of course would mean some other tiger to go into the ring against George Romney in the gubernatorial combat this fall, perhaps Edwards.

SPORTS OBSERVER

Between writing and officiating sports, I've found myself the victim of more than one verbal attack during the last 25 years or more.

I'll never forget an incident which happened up at Michigan State College (it wasn't a university in those days) when as a freshman reporter for the college newspaper I was taken to baseball practice one afternoon.

Before I knew it, members of the squad—among them Sam Ketchman and Steve Sebo—had hoisted me on their shoulders. When they let me down . . . it was into the dirty Red Cedar River. I was a soaking mess in a brand new ROTC uniform the college had provided me.

It appeared that Ketchman, now the football coach at Ferris Institute and also the athletic director there, and Sebo, who has been football coach at Pennsylvania U. and more recently connected with the New York team in the American Football League, had taken offense to some of my remarks.

Then there was the incident that transpired while I was a book private stationed at Enid, Okla., during the midst of World War II.

The air field and the town had combined to form a strong semi-pro baseball team. My first sergeant was a fellow by the name of Ralph Pinelli whom I had known earlier when he played for Notre Dame University.

Ralph was quite a ball player. I was trying to emulate his dad, Babe Pinelli, one of the greatest umpires in the history of the National League and before that an infielder for the Detroit Tigers.

To get out and umpire the Enid games, I had to get a pass from Ralph. Well, one afternoon, Ralph clubbed a base hit and streaked for second. The play was close. The umpire (that was I) went up with the thumb.

Pinelli didn't exactly relish the call. As he cleaned the dust from his uniform, he looked up at me and said: "George! Another call like that and you can forget about asking for any more passes to umpire."

Picking all-star teams from "all-league" to "all-state" brought more than one complaint to me when I handled high school stories for the Detroit Times.

And I have found myself needing police protection a couple of times because of some sandlot, umpiring decisions.

There was even the call at Detroit Northwestern field which prompted a league official to poll the fans to get their opinions on whether I was right or wrong.

The fans couldn't agree. Some claimed I was correct in calling a fly ball down the right field line "fair." Others insisted I was all wet . . . the ball had hit five feet foul.

My verdict of "fair" naturally stood.

It seems the grads . . . I'm sure they're a wonderful bunch . . . took offense to the fact that every time I started a story dealing with athletic teams at their alma mater . . . I just didn't say Bentley High, I said Livonia Bentley High.

The Alumni, in a long letter to our Editor contended that it wasn't necessary to use Livonia along with Bentley. They added: "Everybody knows that Bentley is in Livonia."

Well, I'm not going to argue the point. But sports writers and those who edit sports pages believe in exact reporting.

Hence when you pick up a Free Press or a News or in the old days at the Times, the gentlemen assigned to writing about the Tigers, 99 percent of the time, always have called them the "Detroit Tigers" in the first reference to the team in their stories.

And, it's the Detroit Lions, the Detroit Red Wings and the Detroit Pistons, though everybody knows that these aggregations represent the Motor City. After the initial reference, of course, it's just the Tigers, the Wings, the Lions or the Pistons.

So it always has been with yours truly in accounts dealing with Livonia Bentley High. The two names always have gone hand and hand, making a pleasant sound and just as pleasant reading.

When it comes to saying, Redford Township Redford Union or Redford Township Thurston, it would sound a cumbersome. So I've never written it that way. However, somewhere in articles about RU and Thurston, I generally make some mention to the schools as being in Redford Township.

I suspect that more than anything, my tying Livonia and Bentley has been a habit, just as I'm sure some of the Bentley alumni wish they could quit smoking or maybe wearing their hats in the wrong place.

But I do think that the alumni over at Bentley might have found something more vital with which to occupy their meeting time. I then could have written about something more important today.

Now then, is it going to be "Franklin High" or "Livonia Franklin" when the new school goes full tilt?

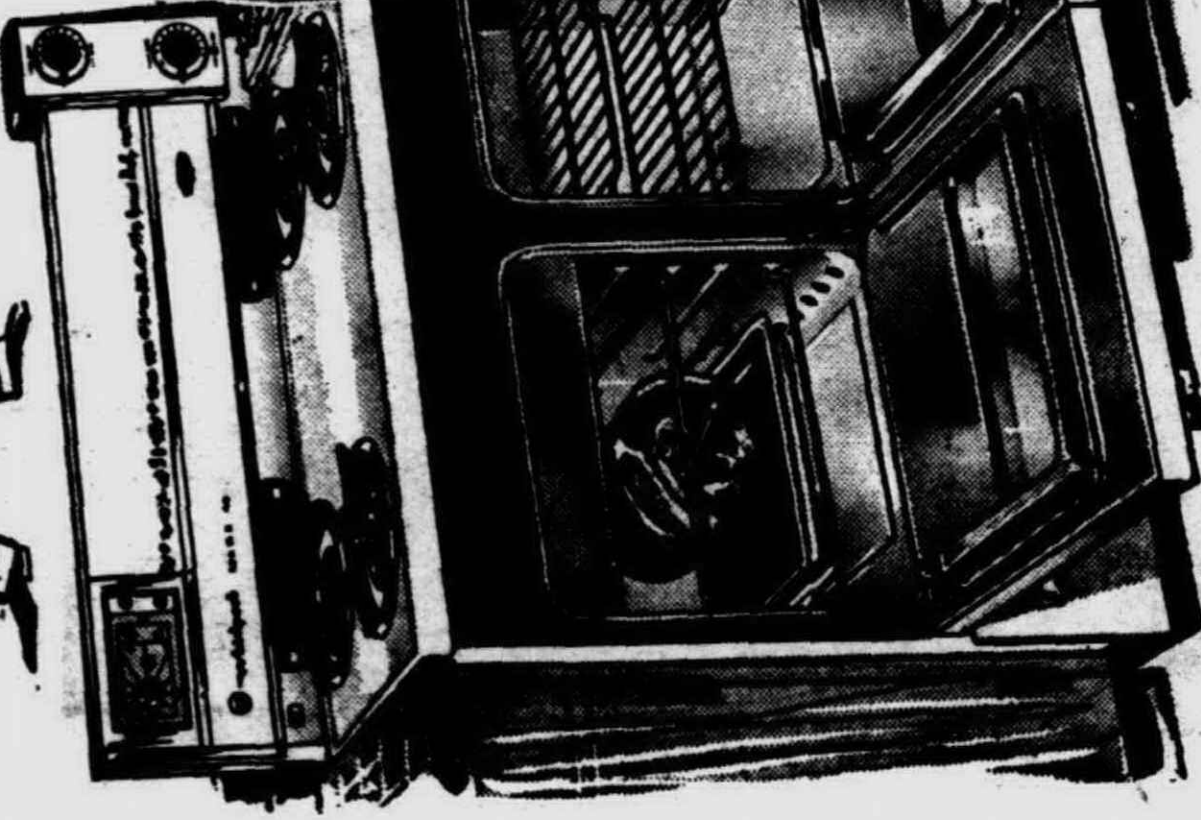

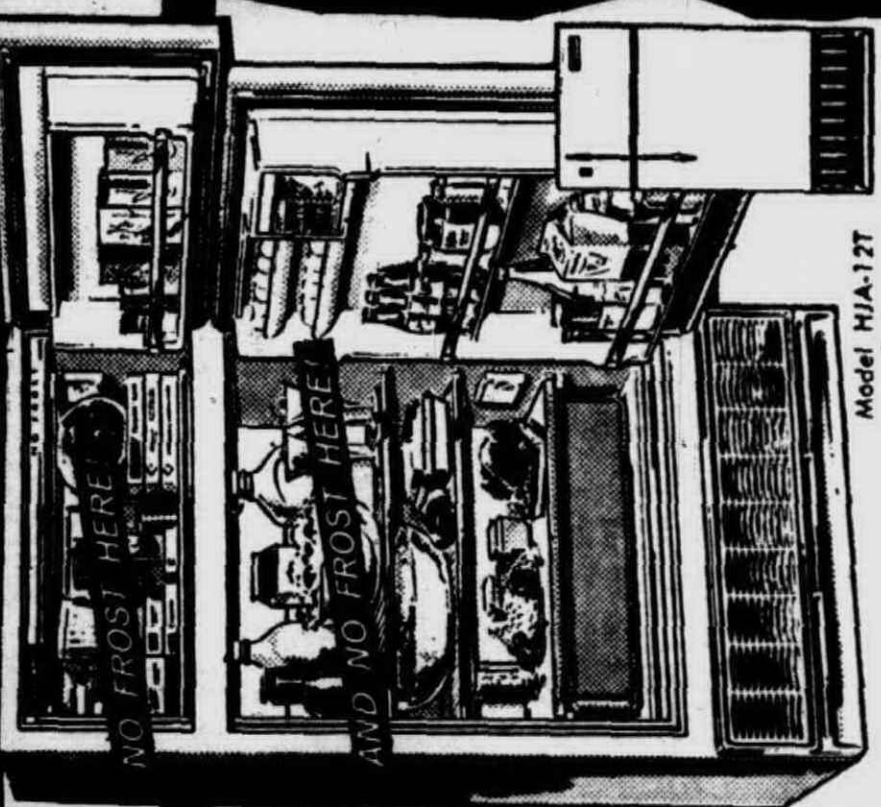

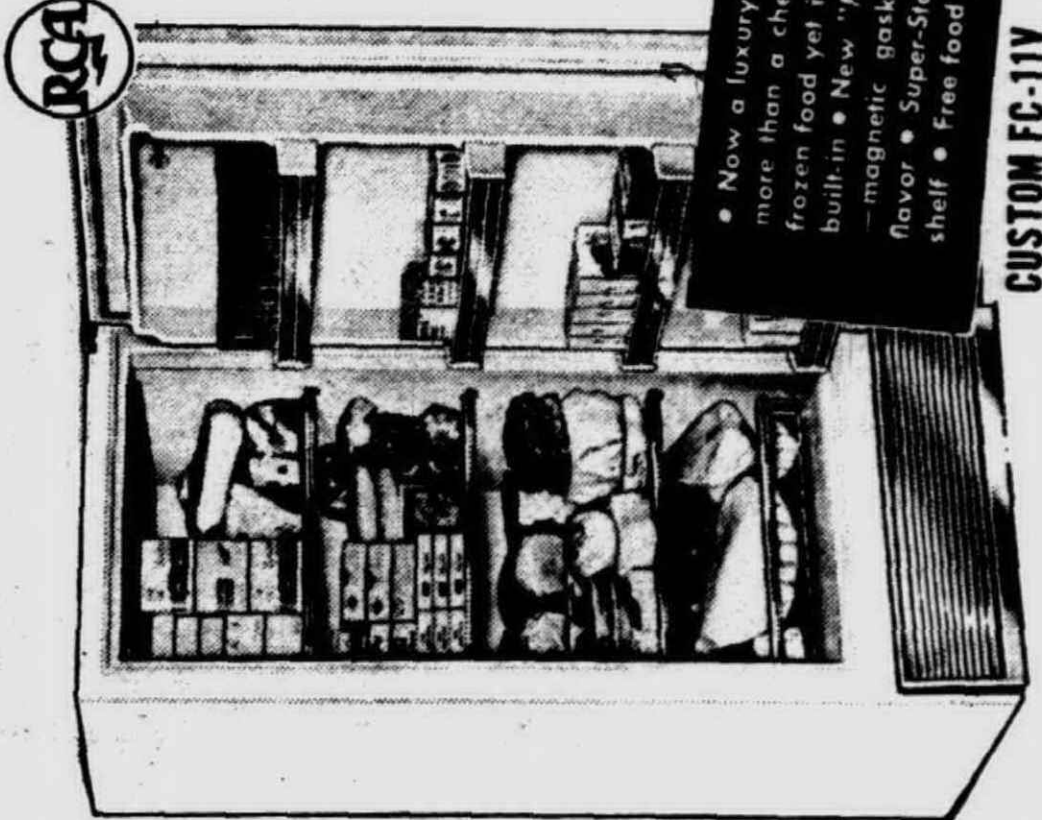
