

To get there in those days, one had to drive across an old narrow wooden bridge and almost through a woods. Across the street from Streng's, slightly to the east, stood the old Shattuck home where Sam and Bonnie (Mrs. Charles Garlett) grew up. In those days one traveled dangerously by car, crossing that old bridge and through the woods, going and coming from Detroit. In fact, springtime floods passing under the old structure made it frightening to even walk across. Here, however, was the site of the restaurant.

in Norway, hand embroidered pillows, table clothes, etc. - in typical Norwegian fashion - pictures of every member of her family are in sight. In the living room alone, there are 28 photographs of her family. In an interview with The Plymouth Mail, during which Mrs. Davidson graciously served coffee and Danish

(she married a Dane) coffee cake off Danish blue dishes, set on a wedgewood blue, hand embroidered "coffee cloth," Mrs. Davidson told of some of the differences between the Norwegian and American celebration of Christmas.

The Christmas holidays in Norway begin Dec. 23 and continue through January 13, throughout which time

parties and gatherings of friends and neighbors are the order of the day (or days). Their big Christmas dinner is served Christmas Eve (about 7 p.m.), after which gifts are opened.

Tree decorations are similar to decorations used in America, with the addition of Norwegian flags and baskets made of heavy shiny paper, filled with candy and nuts, which are also hung on the tree.

As in America, the children leave food for Santa Claus, but in place of Christmas cookies and milk, left by American children, Norwegian children leave a bowl of "Risengrynsgrot", a rice porridge.

Even the birds celebrate Christmas in Norway, as on that day Norwegians hang outside a bundle of wheat, bound together on the top with

Christmas (Eve) dinner in Norway varies considerably from the traditional American Christmas dinner. Their menu consists of a pork roast, cabbage, boiled potatoes, pickled beets, assorted pickles, cranberries, nuts and fruits and a variation of plum pudding, and of course, beer or
