Schools Make It In Cold

It took a lot of doing and quite a bit of explaining but schools in the Plymouth Community held classes as usual last Thursday despite the frigid subzero temperatures.

Supt. Russell Isbister was up long before the crack of dawn and was checking the bus situation with Transportation Director Bob Houghton at 6 a.m.-Bob and his crew had been trying to get the buses started as early as 5 o'clock and only one was ready to roll when Isbister arrived.

After a conference, it was decided to delay classes for two hours and Isbister immediately got in touch with a radio station that was announcing school conditions.

However, the instructions were mixed with other school closings and the announcement was aired that Plymouth schools were among those not opening.

Isbister called a second time and a half-hour later a correct announcement was made but unfortunately most of the parents heard the first report. That started the switchboard buzzing at the Board of Education offices where the staff tried to

correct the reports. Meanwhile, Houghton and his men were busy and finally had the fleet of buses ready for the student pickups.

"Despite the situation, we had 90 per cent attendance in the high school and almost 50 per cent in the lower grades." smiled Isbister, "and we think that was miraculous when one considers that it was the coldest day in the 12 years I have headed the Plymouth school





Facts and Opinions contends that the much-publicized teen-agers in our midst deserve consistency and intellectual honesty from their adults . . . and the same from all laws which rest on the Michigan books.

They don't get it today.

For purposes of the law, a teen-ager today cannot smoke or drink until he is 21. He is not regarded as qualified to exercise his vote

until he is 21. He can drive a car when he is 16.

Or be married when he is 16 (for girls) or 18. And it has been ruled entirely reasonable that he shall offer his services (and his life, if need be) to the

armed forces when he is 18. Nor is it the same from State to State, within the same nation. In some states (and the youngsters know it, and talk about it), it is entirely legal to drink at 18.

In the two youngest States in the Union, Alaska and Hawaii, they could vote at 19 and 20. In two others, down south, they could vote at 18.

Few states indulge in the pretense of a "no smoking" law. It's an ancient Michigan statute and is the laughing stock of students, teachers and parents alike. Thousands of our local youngsters smoke before they are 21 and are in "violation" of a law with every puff. Enforcement is impossible as a practical matter.

Out of all this we believe, could come a logical

To convince our teen-agers that their adults are fair, consistent and honest, there should be a standardized age where "maturity" begins. Eighteen years is a justifiable plateau.

At 18 should come the privileges of maturity, along with the responsibilities-and the latter are many, we hasten to assure the young ladies and gentlemen.

One of the most compelling arguments for the higher driver age is that when 16 or 17 year olds are arrested, they go into Juvenile Court. Not until they are 18 are they processed in adult courts.

The change in the age of a driver's license would be a first step toward standardizing at 18. Lowering of the voting age and the drinking age and elimination of the smoking law all will receive attention here later.

It has been brought to my attention that our water customers are under the impression that a leak in the water meter is their responsibility.

In the City of Plymouth, the city's responsibility is from the shut off at the property line to the water main in the street, also the water meter only. The fittings on each side of the meter and all plumbing plus the water line from the meter to the shut off at the property line is the property owners respon-

The only time the customer is responsible is if hot water goes through the meter or if any one damages the meter deliberately or if meter freezes.

This conference was held at the request of myself and a group of Livonia home-owners led by Mr. and Mrs. George Shirley of 37552 Howell, Livo-

We were appearing originally to plead for rate relief for a group of Livonia residents who have been assigned the "Glenview" exchange. They reside in the western portion of Livonia and are lumped in the same GL exchange which services Plymouth.

This results in some Livonia phone users paying toll rates for calls to Detroit which are four times greater than the rates paid for the same calls from the GArfield exchange, which serves another part of Divonia and which lies eastward of an arbitrary line drawn, north-south, in western Livonia.

The rate structure provides fierce inequity among neighbors and is discriminatory. It not only affects those living in western Livonia, but also those living in Plymouth, Northville, Belleville, and other points.

And, in reverse, it affects all calls made from the City of Detroit to these points.

A phone user in the GLenview or Fleldbrook exchange who makes two calls daily to Detroit, over a year would pay \$360 in toll charges. But a user in the GArfield exchange, right next door, would pay only \$90 for these same two phone calls per day. A secondary point is that some Livonia residents must pay a toll charge for calls within their own community, whereas other Livonia residents do not have to pay this toll. from GL phones, there is an extra charge to all calls placed to GReenleaf phones, of which there are many in northern Livonia. This results in such things as

As a result of the research, it also develops that the metropolitan area as a whole is charged at a higher rate than smaller communities in Michigan. For example, an individual residential phone in the Detroit area has a base rate of \$6.60. In another Michigan community of 10,000 population the rate for the same service is only \$3.95.
