MAYOR GETS WORD OF APPROVAL BY TELEPHONE

Plymouth City Hall Grant Ok'd

Plymouth's proposed \$518,000 City Hall has received the approval of the Housing and Home Finance Agency under the provisions of the Public Works Acceleration Act and the Municipal Building Authority is making plans to throw all operations into high gear as soon as the official notification is received.

Approval of the grant was relayed to Mayor Robert Sincock from Washington by Congressman Mrs. Martha Griffiths late Monday afternoon by

However, Harold Guenther, chairman of the MBA, indicated his group will wait for the official notice from Washington and Chicago before calling

Mrs. Griffiths' call came just a day short of two weeks after a Plymouth delegation consisting of Sincock, City Attorney Edward Draugelis and City Manager Albert Glassford went to the Capital to discuss the applications for the City Hall and a new reservoir.

The trio hoped to speed up the applications, which had been more or less dormant since mid-November, by meeting with the state's three Senators and Congresswoman Mrs. Griffiths.

All came back with the idea that progress had

been made although the general thought was that Plymouth's applications would have to wait until a new allocation of \$500 million was approved by Congress.

However, the three did learn that there was still some money in the pot available for Michigan and there was a remote chance that some might be released within a short time.

Monday's telephone call was the answer and justified contention of Sincock and Draugelis, both Democrats, that a personal call on officials in Washington might work wonders. It did.

For Mayor Sincock, it was one of the biggest

It is a belief that some of the trouble in our lives today stems from adults attempting to drive youngsters toward goals for which they have no aptitude, and which ironically are almost worthless, if attained.

We'll narrow the subject matter today to: (a) college education, (b) music training. However, the pressure which adults place on young boys in Little League type athletic competition flickers through the mind, toowe just read about a movement which would bar all parents from little league playing fields.

Concerning more people today, however, is the growing suspicion that over-zealous parents, worried about "status" and related symbols, are jamming the local schools with frustrated youngsters who butt their heads against "college preparatory" programs.

In far too many cases, local high school authorities tell Facts and Opinions, the youths share neither the ability nor the interest in the project of their parents, and the result is much flunking, increasingly high school drop-out rates, hostility, sullenness, and rebellion.

And if-and it's one of those huge IF's-some of those slogging toward a college B.A. in some general a field like literary arts, actually do reach the end, they still won't have much, because this is an age of specialization as far as the high paying jobs are concerned.

Curiously, it's a subject that lurks dangerously under the surface of open discussion. It's an area where the educators in privacy are wont to blame stupid and misguided parents; and one where the parents cry with anguish about "the kind of counseling our children receive in school.

Counselors say they're helpless against mothers and fathers who refuse to accept the fact that their darlings "don't have the aptitude for math, language and science which is needed to get into college.'

The parents retort angrily that their youngsters reach the late years of high school "before anyone bothers to tell us that they're flunking academic courses, and what are we supposed to do at this late date?"

Most of the nation's education experts are just beginning to wonder if a remarkable portion of the enormous pressure for "more higher education" isn't really artificially-induced, and hence, unnecessary.

Better it would be, goes the new thinking, to get good trade programs established early in high school education, and turn out of the 12th grade, draftsmen, business machine operators, nurses' aides, automobile mechanics, and other technicians-types who actually have some kind of background to get a real job, instead of a shabby report card to try to shove through some college entrance board.

And, with it, a new philosophy among parents where they recognize the truth about their progeny and agree to fit round pegs into round holes, "status" or no status notwithstanding.

DPW Boss Explains Facts Of Detroit Water Dispute

the problems that users of Plymouth water are complaining about," was the outspoken statement of Joseph Bida, superintendent of Plymouth's water and Public Works Departments, in a talk to the Plymouth Lions Club in the Mayflower Hotel.

Bida was asked to present a complete resume of the much discussed water prob-

He told the Lions: That he isn't against Detroit water but that he feels the Plymouth residents are not aware of all the pertinent information. As an example he pointed out that many

That the city still has a \$335,000 bond issue hanging over its head on the water system which would have to be paid regardless of whether Plymouth uses Detroit water or keeps its own sys-

That use of Detroit water would probably hike the wawould result in immediate ter rates to Plymouthites more than two and a half times the present rate sched-

That Plymouth does need the reservoir at Beck and Six Mile Roads to maintain pressure. He backed this statement with figures showing the elevation is 75 feet higher in the north side of the city than in the south and the reservoir would keep pressure in the north end up to that of the south.

That the city has a "white elephant" on its hands in the water tank in the south side that was erected in the late '40s for \$45,000 is inoperable and never was practical. The storage tank was erected long before any members of the present City Commission, City Manager Albert Glassford or Bida were in the picture.

That Plymouth doesn't need to go to Detroit for a water supply since it can pump as many as six million gallons daily from the present well fields and not make an appreciable dent in the water

That it has taken 30 or more years to get the iron into the Plymouth water lines and that it will take some time to eliminate it. He pointed out that the water department is using calgon now and it has brought remarkable improvement in conditions. Bida showed samples of pipe before the use of calgon and after to prove his point and the Lions were amazed at the difference.

"Many Plymouth residents believe that rust will vanish as soon as Detroit water starts flowing through the mains," said Bida, "but we know this isn't true. Matter of fact Lakepointe consumers who switched to Detroit water when it became available in the township, are now asking to have softeners re-

"Our system couldn't stand the surges that would come if Plymouth changed to Detroit water. Most of our lines are ancient and surges up to 90 pounds (as could be expected from Detroit water) would have the water department in hot water with broken mains. This would send our labor costs skyrocketing and give the city fathers even more

The fiery, chunky DPW boss told the Lions that a public relations program is badly needed, one that would take the facts home to every user of Plymouth water.

"The complete story of Detroit water as contrasted to Plymouth water should be fully explained to every consumer," he said, "then they should be the ones to make the final decision. After all it is the homeowner who will have to pay the higher rate and who will have to determine whether any advantages gained by using Detroit water are worth it.

"They should be told exactly what this all means in dollars and cents in terms they can understand. They should be made aware of the fact that such a move might bring a hike in taxes. They should be told of all the ramifications and then let them decide what the future will members of the Commission-Carl Shear, Marvin Terry and William Hartmann-wanted desperately to have one of the applications approved before they bow out in April.

Once the official approval is received, Guenther and his four fellow members of the MBA will start the task of getting things moving as quickly as

The other Authority members are: Louis Borregard, treasurer; Joseph Near, secretary; David Mather and Everett Burmester. Draugelis is serving as legal counsel as the city attorney.

Guenther indicated the Authority will meet within the next two days to start work on acquisition of land on the site adjoining the Dunning-Hough Library and extending to the buildings now occupied by the Department of Public Works.

The MBA will have to discuss plans for condemnation proceedings, if needed; order Architect Byron Becker to finalize plans which must meet with the approval of the City Commission before they can be okayed for advertising of bids.

The Authority will have to finalize a lease for the City and make a decision on the matter of issuing bonds to finance Plymouth's \$259,000 share of the cost-the federal government makes a grant of the remaining \$259,000.

The City Commission will have to act quickly on the abandonment of Dodge Street for the City Hall and make a decision on extending Church Street so that it swings by the new structure when completed and then rejoins Dodge Street.

Although the provisions of the HHFA grant provide that construction must start within 120 days of the time of application, Guenther wasn't a bit worried and indicated that "the time factor in the grant will have to be related to the time when the MBA could act and that time is now."

state band championships, but rather to teach music to wide groups of youngsters so they could use it for recreation and personality development.

The incident blew over, but it left scars which still sting in Plymouth.

Within the last few days, we've heard a similar complaint from a dedicated man who teaches accordion to large groups of youngsters and adults in half a dozen metropolitan cities. Among others, he has a class of

350 novices pumping accordions in Livonia every week. Dr. Clarence Spiewak lashes at the parents and "some selfish musical studios" who attempt to "teach kids difficult material for which they aren't qualified, and for which they have no possible use, if they make it."

Among his observations:

• In the accordion world there are state, national and international "championships." Kids are driven to perfect themselves, buy instruments that cost as much as \$1,400, practice and concentrate to the exclusion of all outside interests-and then, at the finish, wind up with a handful of nothing. He says the "international accordion champion" of 1956 still is seeking gainful

• Only 8 per cent of the membership of the Detroit Federation of Musicians today earns a living from music. All others support themselves on non-musical jobs.

• There are youths who devote 10 or 11 years with private studios, spending large sums of money, and at the end of the line receive a "teacher of accordion diploma" printed on some job shop press - only to discover there is no place to teach.

Spiewak is passionate about the importance of music. His protest is against over-specialization.

Music, he says, in most cases should be considered only as something which teaches coordination between mind and muscle, concentration, mental discipline, poise and confidence.

It provides a chance to participate in later years in community social activities, in bands and orchestras. University of Kansas studies showed music students

had higher grades than the average, held a large share of class offices, and generally showed a broader range But, said the professor, all of this should come on a voluntary basis and with the objective one of recrea-

To whip youngsters, for any reason, into a narrow obsession of becoming a virtuoso, is to miss the point. It will ruin his perspective, and leave him in most cases with a skill for which there is even less demand than

that of a bustle repair expert. As usual, the appeal is to us parents.



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

Attic Conversions

In many homes an unused attic will provide ample space for one or two extra roomsbedrooms for the children or guest rooms. Another good source of usable space is the basement, which often offers excellent possibilities for an attractive recreation room, family room, hobby room or TV lounge.

Usually it is possible to have an extra bathroom in either of these areas. In many homes the plumbing lines are so located that they can be extended to the floor above or below at modest

Still other possibilities for conversion to more useful purposes are offered by an open porch or attached garage, either of which can often be made into a comfortable den.

Once you have decided which area of the house offers the best possibilities for remodeling, the next question to consider how much, if any, of the work involved you will be able and wish to do yourself.

Allocation of Work

The answer, in each case, will depend in large measure upon the "handiness" of the homeowner, the amount of time he can or is willing to devote to the job, and the complexities of the project itself.

Do-it-yourseif can be the answer for some people on some jobs. But it is usually not feasible when major alterations are involved, or when you want to add a porch, remodel a carport or put a dormer in an attic. Plumbing and electrical work also call for specialized outside

Having decided who is going to do what in connection with your remodeling project, the next thing is to call in the required general or specialized (plumber, electrician, etc.) contractors for competitive bids.

If you are going to do most or all of the carpentry work yourself, make a rough sketch of the doors, windows or special architectural features, such as dormers or stairis. Mark down all measurements and take the sketch to a reliable lumber dealer. From it he will be able to give you an idea of how much the job will cost. Often, too, he can give you some practical tips on ways to make your remodeling job easier and less expensive.

PIPE MEASURING

To measure the outside diameter of a piece of pipe slip an adjustable wrench (with parallel jaws) over the pipe and close the jaws to fit around it. Slide off carefully without disturbing the setting and measure the distance between the jaws. .

> FAUCET WASHER CHANGING

If you find it difficult to get at the nut that holds the spindle when you're changing a faucet washer, try using an ordinary spark plug wrench. Its deep socket will solve the problem.


