





Sounds are precious and add an extra dimension to nostalgia, she said, in urging her audience to heed them and be aware of listening.

Similar sounds in tone, depth and volume will bring back to one's memory a certain far off place once visited or an experience of the past perhaps forgotten by the con-

scious mind.
In addition to stressing the importance of listening to sound, Miss Kimbrough em-phasized the need for teaching foreign languages in grammer school.

In a world that is growing smaller each day the knowledge of foreign language is gaining in significance. The time to learn a foreign lang-uage is in grammer school when a child has no selfconsciousness and when learning is mainly by the ear, i.e., mimicking, she said.
