## Announce Plans for 120-Acre Industrial "Park" in Township

Hopes for the Plymouth area's continued industrial expansion, in order to meet the increasing tax needs of the local School District, received a significant shot in the arm this week.

It came in the form of an announcement that 120 acres in Plymouth Township would be opened immediately to industrial development by the Patrick J. Finlan real estate agency here.

The property, already zoned for industrial use, is located east of Lilley Rd., between Ann Arbor Rd. and Joy Rd. The Chesapeake & Ohio railroad tracks slice diagonally through the eastern edge of the proposed development.

It will be named "Plymouth Township Industrial Park."

Although no industrial firms have yet agreed officially to occupy the tract, Patrick Finlan, owner of the real estate firm spearheading the project, said Tuesday that several leads at the present could materialize into definite agreements at any time.

"We've already been working with a number of industrial companies who have indicated an interest in locating in the Plymouth area," Finlan said. "We feel that a few of these leads could firm up very shortly."

He declined to identify any of the prospective tenants, but said that many of them are "major firms" and several are on the order of RCA which recently moved into the City's industrial park along Plymouth Rd.

Former mayor Robert Sincok, who joined the Finlan firm two months ago and last week officially vacated the mayor's office, will be placed in charge of the project, Finlan said.

The announcement of the proposed development was met with favor by City and Township officials, as well as the administrators of the non-profit Industrial Development Corp. here.

A spokesman for the IDC said this week that leads un-

covered by IDC officials would be funneled to the Finlan firm for further exploration.

A lack of funds in recent weeks has somewhat hampered the IDC's activities in securing still further industry for the Plymouth community.

Plymouth Township Supervisor Roy Lindsay greeted the announcement with pleasure.

"We're always in favor of further industrial development throughout the community," he said. "On paper, this project has valu-

able attributes and we certainly will do all we can to see it through to successful completion."

He indicated that final plans for the development should be cleared through the Township's planning commission so that the Township

is kept abreast of the project. Township water and sewer facilities are readily available to the proposed development. All improvements will be handled by the developing firm, in conjunction with the needs of the incoming industrial tenants.

"It's conceivable that work on initial improvements will begin late this summer or early in the fall," Finlan said.

Price of the property to prospective tenants was not disclosed.

Although the Finlan real estate firm does not own the property outright at this time, it has obtained options on the land in order to proceed with the development. The long-term options only recently were completed through the efforts of Louis Meck, another member of the Finlan firm.

The property involved is presently owned by the Koss family and the Postiff estate.

Three factors, according to Finlan, lend themselves to the overall appeal of the 120-acre tract as far as industrial tenants are concerned.

## New Commissioners Eye Future of Old City Hall

Plymouth's 85-year-old City Hall, once an opera and movie house, became the center of a mild controversy Monday night as City Commissioners discussed the merits of saving the long-time landmark.

The building, erected about 1878, had previously been destined for destruction when the City's new municipal headquarters is completed the middle of next year.

But now the Commission is mulling over the possibilities of retaining the Victorian-styled structure for use as a community center and historical museum.

The meeting of City Commission Monday night was its first normal business session since four new members were elected to office April 1.

Richard Wernette, who earlier in the evening was named the City's new mayor, opened the discussion, saying he was reluctant to see the old City Hall torn down without further study.

Other Commissioners said that some Plymouth citizens had indicated an interest in preserving the community landmark, which for many years has been the center of the City's administrative activities.

Attending the meeting were Byron Becker, architect for the new City Hall, and Harold Guenther, chairman of the municipal building authority which has been placed in charge of the project.

Becker, asked for his opinion on the possibility of saving the old City Hall, said he "did not feel that it is structurally sound."

Guenther spoke up, saying "there's admittedly a lot of nostalgia connected with the old City Hall." He added that he has been approached unofficially by local philanthropists who have offered to contribute funds toward preserving the building.

He also suggested having the building formally inspected by the State Fire Marshal's office to determine if it was worth renovating for further use.

The question of financing the renovations was also discussed briefly. "I'm sure we could find the necessary funds if we feel the building is worth saving," Wernette said.

Commissioner A. E. Vallier mentioned that the "people of Plymouth should have a say in the matter."

The possibility of losing part — if not all — of the \$255,500 federal grant that soured the new City Hall plans also arose. The demolition of the old City Hall was one of the aspects of the grant request.

Guenther was empowered to contact the Housing and Home Finance Administration regional office in Chicago to clarify this point. He may possibly make a personal trip there to do so.

Becker explained that additional cost will be involved in preparing new site-clearance plans, since he already has prepared a set of plans to include the demolition of the building.

Commissioners were willing to accept this expense, saying that the total cost of the pro-

ject could be reduced since less demolition would be required at the outset.

The end-result of the hour-long discussion on the matter was almost aftermath. Commissioners agreed to hold a public meeting on the issue on April 29 at 8 p.m. in the Commission chambers.

Another meeting had earlier been called for that same night in order to hold a public hearing on the City's proposed 1963-64 budget. That portion of the meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m.

The public is invited to attend both sessions.

# Name Wernette New City Mayor

City of Plymouth's new mayor, 55-year-old Richard Wernette, brings impressive credentials with him as he assumes the City's highest public office this week.

A resident of Plymouth for 12 years, Wernette was unanimously elected mayor Monday night by his fellow City Commissioners.

He succeeds Robert Sincok, who held the office since 1961.

An attorney, Wernette is an estate analyst for the Wayne County probate court with offices in the City-County building in Detroit.

He was first elected to the City Commission here in 1957 when he finished high enough in the final balloting to earn a four-year term. In 1961 he was re-elected to another four-year assignment.

Wernette is one of three incumbent members on the Commission, who this week were officially joined by four newcomers, George Lawton, Arch Vallier, Jamiel Jabara and Robert Smith.

The two "veterans" with whom Wernette has served during the past two year span are James Houk and Robert Beyer. Houk, at Monday night's meeting, was named mayor pro-tem.

As mayor, Wernette will be facing the City's problems over the next two years with an attitude of "Careful scrutiny," combining his knowledge as an attorney with the wide range of experience gained as a Commissioner since 1957.

## Symphony Society Seeks Members

Already looking ahead to its 1963-64 season, the Plymouth Symphony Society this week began its annual spring membership campaign.

The drive, aimed at raising a portion of the funds required to support the free concerts next year, will continue to May 22.

With an annual budget of approximately \$10,000, the Symphony Society relies heavily on membership subscriptions to meet the financial needs of the popular program of free concerts presented here throughout the fall, winter and spring.

(The final concert of the 1962-63 season is set for this Sunday afternoon in the Senior High.)

A variety of membership subscriptions furnish 53 per cent of the Society's annual budget.

Another 20 per cent is provided by the Community Fund, 21 per cent comes from the fund-raising efforts of the Symphony Women's League, and the remaining six per

cent is derived through miscellaneous contributions. Letters inviting residents to become members of the Society, or renew previous memberships, were sent out this week by President Robert F. Webber.

Mayor Richard Wernette is expected to proclaim the week of April 21 as Plymouth Symphony Week to lend further impetus to the campaign.

There are three types of memberships available in the Symphony Society — family, business, industry. The membership drive will concentrate on the "family" subscriptions and a goal of \$3,250 has been set for this aspect of the appeal.

Family memberships are offered in the following categories:

"An 'active' membership is \$7.50; 'supporting' memberships are \$15; and 'sustaining' members contribute \$25. 'Patrons' of the Society are those persons who contribute \$50 or more.

This is the second year that

the annual membership campaign is being conducted in the spring rather than in the fall, wrote Webber in his letter announcing the drive.

"We would greatly appreciate your continued support and sincerely hope some of you can be prompted to 'graduate' to a supporting, sustaining or patron membership," the letter said.

Final day of the drive coincides with the date of the Plymouth Symphony Society's annual meeting.

Mrs. Dean Manley is chairman of the family membership portion of the overall campaign. George Lawton is chairman of the industrial appeal, and James Taylor is in charge of the business appeal phase of the drive.

Plymouth's 100-piece Symphony Orchestra will present its final free concert of the 1962-63 season Sunday afternoon, April 21, in the Senior High Auditorium.

Special guests will be 18-year-old Detroit pianist James Vincent Tocco and the 30-voice Kenneth Jewell Chorus.

Both Tocco and the chorus group are enjoying wide acclaim these days in Detroit and surrounding areas.

Wayne Dunlap will direct the Symphony Orchestra as it draws the curtain on its current season. Sunday's performance starts at 4 p.m.

Ballots, accompanied by detailed

descriptions of the plans, will be placed in the mails during the month of May to more than 50,000 residence and business customers whose telephone service may be affected by the outcome of the vote.

Among the plans is a proposal for a entirely new type of service that would give telephone users unlimited, toll-free calling privileges into wide sections of Detroit, including the downtown and the midtown "New Center" areas.

The plan, named Super Extended Area Service, would be the first of its kind in a metropolitan area anywhere in the country. It is designed to meet the ever-changing calling habits of persons who have moved to the suburbs from a core city.

Three other proposals — each providing liberalizations in the present Metro-Calling service — will be included in the poll.

Customers also will be asked whether they would favor retaining their existing service in preference to any of the new proposals.

Polling will be conducted by Michigan Bell among all residential and business customers served with Garfield (42), Glenview (45), Greenleaf (47), and Fieldbrook (34) telephones.

Intended to replace the present flat rate service, Super Extended Area Service (EAS) would create a larger toll-free calling area into the Detroit zone. Super EAS would be offered to customers with all grades of residence service.

Another proposal would combine Super EAS with the



(Continued from page 1) present Metro-Calling Service which provides customers with toll-free calling throughout the metropolitan area from 6 p.m. to 9 a.m., Monday through Saturday, all day on Sunday and three holidays. A third proposal would combine Super EAS with an expanded Metro-Calling Service offering. Metro-Calling would be expanded by moving up the effective daily starting time from 6 p.m. to 4 p.m., providing about 50 additional day-time calling hours monthly throughout the metropolitan area. The fourth proposal on the ballot will ask customers if they would prefer only the expanded Metro-Calling Serv-

ice without the additional calling privileges of Super EAS. The present Metro-Calling Plan would continue to be offered to customers who desire it whether Super EAS or any of the other plans becomes effective. Rates for the various proposed plans would vary slightly, as they now do, among the four different telephone areas — Garfield, GLenview, Greenleaf, and Fieldbrook — all of which have different calling distances. For residence customers with GLenview telephones, the one-party rate for Super would be \$8.55 per month and the two-party rate would be \$6.45. Maximum residential flat rate increase is \$3.60. Letters accompanying the ballots, which soon will be mailed to customers, will describe the rates and calling privileges that would be available under the various proposed plans. Business customers will be asked to vote whether they favor having Super EAS or retaining their present service. The business rate for GLenview Super EAS would be \$21.65 per month. The basic monthly rate would include unlimited calling within the present local calling area. In addition to the basic monthly rate, business customers would pay 4.2 cents for each call into the portion of the super extended area that is in the Detroit Zone. However, there would be no time limit on the length of the calls. Today, business customers pay either toll charges or multi-message units for these calls. Use of the plans in this area could lead to them serving as models for introduction throughout the metropolitan area.

Wernette upon taking office, "is that we can continue to encourage more industry to locate in this general area and that we may also assure that Plymouth will remain the ideal residential community it is today." He said that the City will continue to cooperate with surrounding governmental units for the orderly development of the area. Wernette also cited the achievements of his predecessor, Robert Sincok. "Mayor Sincok brought a wide degree of practical wisdom and diplomacy to the office, and was a significant factor in the success enjoyed by the outgoing Commission. "It is an honor to follow him into office," Wernette added. The City's new mayor was born on a farm near Remus, Michigan, and received his high school education through an accelerated program at Ferris Institute in Big Rapids. In 1932 he was graduated from the University of Detroit Law School and entered private practice as a lawyer in Detroit. Within a year, however, he moved back to his hometown of Remus, had his own law practice there and served as a justice of the peace. Following a two-year stint on the Michigan Auditor General's staff in Lansing, Wernette in 1940 became a clerk in Wayne County probate court. He has remained there ever since, and presently is an estate analyst. Wernette, who counts hunting and fishing among his hobbies, lives at 387 Adams. His wife, Jean, is a teacher at Starkweather Elementary School here. They have two children, Dee, 19, a sophomore at Antioch College in Ohio, and Tim, a 15-year-old Plymouth High sophomore. Wernette is a member of the First Presbyterian Church of Plymouth and is a former church deacon and former elder of the church. He is also a member of the board of directors of the Wayne County Employees' credit union, as well as the Michigan State Bar, the Detroit Economic Club and the Plymouth Democratic Club.

**White Cane Sale May 3, 4**

With final details fully confirmed, the Plymouth Lions Club today begins its "countdown" for the community's annual White Cane Campaign, scheduled this year for May 3 and 4. The drive was given its initial impetus this week by Mayor Richard Wernette's proclamation naming April 28 through May 4 as "White Cane Week" here. Gov. Romney has designated the same period as White Cane Week throughout the state. Plymouth Lions Club members will gather for an 8 a.m. breakfast Friday, May 3, at the Mayflower Hotel before taking to the streets for the first of two 12-hour stints on major street corners in Plymouth and Northville. The members will be out again in force on Saturday, May 4, from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m.

Lions will be identified by bright yellow helmets and White Canes, to which will be attached a container in which donors can place their contributions. The drive is symbolized by the White Cane, the universal identification of a blind person. White Canes are provided free of charge by Lions Clubs, but Lions Club charities to the blind go beyond this, according to Dick Miller, 9018 Morrison, co-chairman of this year's drive. The Plymouth Lions also make a substantial contribution to the Leader Dog program. In addition, glass and eye examinations are supported locally. During the past year the Plymouth Lions have also supported the Michigan Eye Collection Center, the Michigan Council of National Federation of the Blind, and a welfare home. They have also underwritten the cost of sending the Plymouth Band to St. Francis, a party for visiting Swedish Youths and other local civic endeavors.

## The Antique Corner

Are you familiar with the marks that appear on fine china, silver, pottery and porcelain? Did you know that these marks are called "hall marks" and that they represent different identifications to mark quality, registration, and duty?

Most European countries this marking process is demanded by law, although there are different methods of marking china.

In china and porcelain the marks can be impressed by a process in which the identification is stamped in the piece while it is still soft.

Another method is called "stamped" — this is done by hand while the piece is in a soft composition. Two other methods of marking are underglazing in color by hand, limited to blue and overglazing by being stamped, printed, or painted directly into the glaze.

The study of these hall marks are interesting in themselves because they cover the entire history from the establishment of the various companies and their progress through the years and their eventual outcome. It is not uncommon to find yourself involved in family histories and international events while probing more conclusively into the marks.

The mark "Sterling" on silver indicates its purity and is an accepted standard all over the world. The origin of the word is credited to a band of immigrant Germans who traveled through Europe and called themselves the Eastlings because of the direction they lived in. They were asked to refine some silver for coin purposes by King John in the year 1300. In a short time the first two letters were dropped and the word sterling was accepted as a pure silver standard.

It is of interest to note that hall marks on silver were put into pieces for one purpose only, not to be of benefit intrinsically but to prevent fraud. Each piece properly marked assured the buyer of its merit for although silversmithing was a highly respected art there were those who attempted to forge hallmarks to gain unearned profits.

For example, the earliest known fraud was the sale of plated ware that was marked to represent an item equal to the silver standard. On certain silver pieces date letters were used to mark the date of creating. The use of these date letters were so arranged as to represent a span of twenty years. The alphabet letters from A to U or V with the exception of the letter J were used. The dates that are found engraved into silver pieces are of little help in placing the age of a piece because they were inscribed at the time of presentation and not necessarily when they were created. Some time spent with a silver hallmark book will reward the searcher with the host of information about his article if he will take the time to transcribe the code of the silver hallmarks.

# Hopkins Wins Grant for Summer Study in France

John Hopkins, of Northville, French language teacher at Plymouth High School for the past four years, received word last Friday that he won a National Defense Education Act Grant for study of the French language.

The Grant entitled Hopkins, the second French teacher from PHS to win the Grant in the last two years. (Mrs. Marguerite Bromley won a similar Grant in 1961) to attend an expense-paid second level institute for secondary French teachers in Tours, France, this summer.

Purpose of the nine-week institute, sponsored by the University of Oregon, Eugene, Ore., is to give participants a first-hand acquaintance with the French way of life and with France itself, in addition to developing the participants' control of the French language and to increase his knowledge of effective methods of teaching it.

Out of a total of 520 applications, only 80 grants were awarded.

Hopkins, who will leave by Air France jet on June 19, from New York, and will return to New York by Air France jet on August 19, will

live with a French family, during his stay in Tours.

Some of the courses Hopkins will study at the institute include Linguistics, culture, methods, directed conversation, oral practice, writing and phonetics, completion of which will earn him 12 quarter-hour credits toward his masters degree.

Preceding the seven week intensive study period, the Grant winners will spend six days in Paris visiting museums and artistic and historical monuments in the city and suburbs.

Upon completion of the study period, a field trip, intended to illustrate the extent and variety of French civilization from Roman times to the present day, will be conducted by motor coach to parts of Languedoc, the Rhone Valley, Burgundy, Champagne and the Ile-de-France.

Hopkins is a 1955 graduate of Western Michigan University and has taken graduate courses at Western and Michigan State University. Prior to coming to Plymouth he taught in South Lyon and Kent City.

In 1960 Hopkins attended an institute at MSU similar to the one he will attend in Tours this summer.

A regular meeting of the City Commission was held in the Commission Chamber of the City Hall on Tuesday, April 2, 1963 at 7:30 p.m.

The Clerk presented a communication from Johnson & Anderson, consultants, requesting a meeting with the commission relative to problems to be encountered in the reconstruction of Ann Arbor Trail from Hamilton Street to the East city limits. The matter was referred to the next regular meeting.

The City Manager presented a communication from the Rotary-Ann's requesting permission to hold their annual Easter Lily sale on the streets on April 15 and 16, 1963.

Moved by Comm. Hartmann and supported by Comm. Shear that the Rotary-Ann's be permitted to sell Easter lilies, as outlined above. Carried unanimously.

The Clerk presented a communication from Councilman Ed Corner of Detroit acknowledging receipt of the resolution adopted by the City Commission recommending a county assessor. The communication was ordered accepted and filed.

The City Manager presented a communication from the Plymouth Theater Guild requesting permission to conduct a cat contest in Kellogg Park on April 20, 1963.

Moved by Comm. Hartmann and supported by Comm. Beyer that the Plymouth Theater Guild be granted permission to hold a cat contest, as outlined above. Carried unanimously.

Earl Merriman, representing the Plymouth Association of Insurance Agents, presented a report outlining the type of coverage contained in a new type of comprehensive policy for municipalities, known as the Public Institutional Property Form.

Moved by Comm. Terry and supported by Comm. Shear that the City Manager be authorized to purchase the Public Institutional Property Form insurance policy. Carried unanimously.

The City Manager reported relative to the cremation of bonds and coupons, advising that the cost varies according to number of bonds and coupons, but would save space and time in retaining same.

Moved by Comm. Hartmann and supported by Comm. Beyer that the City Manager be authorized to execute agreements for the cremation of bonds and coupons in accordance with Act 56, P.A. 1962, and as amended. Carried unanimously.

The City Manager reported that the sale of the \$60,000 Urban Renewal Bonds has been accomplished and the money received for the Mill Street Urban Renewal Project.

The City Manager reported that a conference had been held with the Wayne County Road Commission relative to paving Haggerty Road from Plymouth Road southerly to the bridge, and the county advised the cost is estimated to be \$85,000.00, with the city to assume 1-3, or \$28,333.00.

The City Manager reported that bids have been prepared for the sewer and water truck body, said bids to be taken on April 25, 1963.

The City Manager reported that the fire department was in need of new hose, and Deputy Chief Groth explained the type of hose his department would prefer.

## 212 Teachers Mull Over New Pay Contracts

It's "salary contract time" for teachers in the Plymouth School District.

The 1963-64 Contracts, distributed last week to the 212 teachers on the faculty of the Plymouth public school system, follow the current salary schedule and incorporate all regular increment raises.

Superintendent Russell Isbister has proposed to the School Board that an across-the-board salary increase of \$100 per teacher be included in next year's budget, providing the necessary additional funds are available.

At present, however, with no extra funds on hand, the contracts reflect only the present pay schedule.

The teachers have been asked to return the signed contracts by April 26.

Average teacher salary within the Plymouth school system this year is \$6,732. The current budget allocation for salaries for all regular teachers amounts to \$1,427,179. The figure includes all extra pay to those teachers who perform additional duties, such as coaching.

The starting annual wage for a newly-graduated teacher here is \$4,800. Salaries go as high as \$8,150 in the case of teachers with master's degrees and 11 years teaching experience.


John Jay Temple, president, also stated at the 25th Annual Meeting of the members of The American Hospital Medi-

## Plymouth School District Still Owed Half Million

With less than two months of the academic year remaining, nearly one-half million dollars in general operating fund estimated receipts have yet to be paid the Plymouth Community School District.

Largest outstanding amount is a \$397,000 figure, due the district in state aid funds, the subsidy paid each district by the state on a basis of per capita enrollment.

The balance to be paid in the form of state aid represents essentially one-half of an \$800,000 estimate which the School District figured it would receive in state aid payments during the 1962-63 school year.

In recent years, due to Michigan's not-altogether-solvent financial condition, state aid has frequently been slow in arriving at the school districts.

The Plymouth School District, in October, estimated it would have

total general operating fund receipts this year of approximately \$2.5 million. To date, slightly more than \$2 million has been received.

Of the balance still estimated to be forth-coming, state and federal funds comprise more than 90 per cent of it. Only \$41,000 is delinquent locally and half of this (\$22,500) consists of delinquent local taxes.

A balance of \$7,100 is also due the School District in the form of tuition payments from out-of-district students who attend school here. Another \$4,400 will be received during the forth-coming summer school session.

School Board members, at their regular meeting earlier this month, evidenced their concern over the amount of receipts that are still forth-coming, but left the impression that the general operating fund budgets would not be thrown out of line.

Ground-breaking is expected to take place within the next six weeks, although the exact date has not been determined.



## A NEW Telephone Rate Plan for GLenview Customers

To meet the needs of our GLenview customers who want to call Detroit telephones more often, Michigan Bell is considering a new plan outlined below. We'd like to know what you think of it.



This map shows the proposed Super Extended Area additions (slant-lined areas) for the Plymouth exchange. In addition to their present local calling area, GLenview (45) customers would be able to telephone toll-free to the entire west side of Detroit, including the Downtown and Midtown-New Center areas, and all of the Farmington zone. (See Page 11 of your new telephone directory.) All zones and exchanges shown on the map, except Ypsilanti, Ann Arbor and South Lyon, comprise the Metro-Calling Service area.

#### SUPER EXTENDED AREA SERVICE

The new plan, known as Super Extended Area Service, would provide non-optional a toll-free calling area into Downtown Detroit and the Midtown-New Center area as well as all of the western part of the Detroit zone and the entire Farmington zone (see map). GLenview customers can already call the Livonia and Wayne zones and the Ypsilanti, Ann Arbor, South Lyon and Northville exchanges without a toll charge.

**Residence Flat Rate Service.** The new non-optional plan would have these basic rates for residence customers:

- 1-party, flat rate, \$3.60 more than present rate, or a total of . . . . . \$8.55 a month
- 2-party, flat rate, \$2.45 more than present rate, or a total of . . . . . \$6.45 a month
- Rural, flat rate, \$1.95 more than present rate, or a total of . . . . . \$6.00 a month

**Residence Metro-Calling Service.** Metro-Calling Service will continue to be offered to residence customers between 6 p.m. and 9 a.m. for \$10.95 a month. In addition, Michigan Bell is considering three new options:

- 1. Metro Service customers could also have the new Super Service during the other hours of the day (9 a.m. to 6 p.m.) for only \$1.20 more or a total of \$12.15 a month
- 2. Or they could subscribe to Metro-Calling Service beginning earlier in the day (4 p.m. to 9 a.m.) for only \$3.55 more, or a total of . . . . . \$14.50 a month

3. Or they could combine the "After 4 p.m." Metro Service with the new Super Service during the remaining hours (9 a.m. to 4 p.m.) for only \$4.75 more, or a total of . . . . . \$15.70 a month

**Two-Party Residence Measured Service.** For GLenview residence customers not needing the Super Service's greater calling area, Michigan Bell would offer an economical 2-party residence measured service for \$3.05 a month including 55 messages covering calls made within their present local calling area. Additional messages would cost a nickel each and toll charges would still apply for calls outside that area.

**Business Flat Rate Service.** The new non-optional plan would have these basic rates for business customers:

- 1-party, flat rate, \$11.05 more than present rate, or a total of . . . . . \$21.65 a month
- Rural, flat rate, \$2.95 more than present rate, or a total of . . . . . \$9.05 a month

In both instances above there would be an additional charge of 4.2 cents for each call to the Detroit portion of the Super Extended Area (regardless of length of time talked). Toll charges would still apply for calls outside that area.

**Business Measured Service.** The present business measured Service, at \$6.85 a month, including 75 messages, would not change. Customers having this service would continue to pay toll charges on calls outside their present local calling area. **Note:** Customers outside the base-rate area who pay either mileage or locality area charges would continue to pay them in addition to the above rates. All rates exclude taxes.



The Zoning Map of the City of Plymouth, originally made a part of this Ordinance, as such map has been heretofore amended and as now further amended by "Zoning Map Amendment No. 32 of the City of Plymouth" which map is hereto attached and made a part of this Ordinance, shall be the official Zoning Map of the City of Plymouth.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall become operative and effective on the 24th day of April A.D. 1963.

# Eighth Grader's Science Display Judged 'Outstanding' at Cobo Hall

Joe Graye, a 14-year-old eighth grader at Our Lady of Good Counsel school here, appears to be Plymouth's latest addition to the ranks of up-and-coming young scientists.

At the very least, Joe has his sights set on becoming a horticulturalist eventually.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Graye, 8820 Lilley Rd., Joe already has made a significant start on the road to his chosen career.

Last week, his display illustrating an experiment involving artificial light and the controlled growth of corn was judged "outstanding" at the Metropolitan Detroit Science Fair, held in Cobo Hall.

The blue ribbon was the latest achievement by the Plymouth boy in the field of horticulture and related study.

Specifically, the experiment was designed to see if plants can grow without sun light, and — if so — under what degree of intensity of artificial light will the plants grow best.

Results of Joe's experiment showed that corn plants will grow satisfactorily under artificial light, and that the rate of growth is dependent on the level of artificial light intensity.

Joe appeared to take his most recent success with utmost calm, speaking of the achievement in a soft voice that tended to underplay his youthful accomplishments in the world of science and horticulture.

In rapid succession this year, Joe was acclaimed a winner in the local OLCG science fair, organized as a result for a regional science exhibit at the University of Detroit, and went on to win the "outstanding" award at the Cobo Hall exhibition earlier this month.

His display in the OLCG science fair depicted the human digestive system. When notified that he could then enter the regional exhibition at U-D, Joe built the more complicated experiment on controlled plant growth.

Although his father helped him with the carpentry work on the project, the idea for the experiment involving corn plant growth was his alone.

The exhibit consists of several "shafts" in which corn plants are placed. Each individual shaft is illuminated by electric light of varying intensity, ranging from 15 watts to 150 watts.

Accompanying the experiment itself is a chart describing the results he observed in the test. The corn grown under the 150-watt bulb grew the fastest.

The growing shafts are lined with aluminum foil to diffuse the light as evenly as possible around the corn sprouts.

It took the youngster two weeks to build the exhibit and a week more to conduct the test on corn growth.

Joe's father is a wholesale florist.

"I've lived around a greenhouse all my life," said the youngster, "and I've been interested in horticulture ever since I can remember."

"Last year, I had an exhibit on the growth of beans and got as far as the regional science fair at University of Detroit with it."


Fred Crissey is Joe's science teacher at OLCG and served as the youngster's technical advisor on his most recent experiment.

## Canton OK's Lease For Vacant School

Eying an increase of activity at the Cherry Hill school, which has been converted to a Canton Township community center, members of Canton's Board last week approved the installation of a light to illuminate the school grounds at night.

The building, vacated and closed sometime ago by the Plymouth School District, more recently had been leased by Canton Township for \$1 a year — for use in community activities.

It is located at Cherry Hill and Ridge Roads. Another vacant frame school house in Canton, the Canton Center school, has also been leased to Canton at the same \$1 per year price.

The School Board approved the most recent lease one night last week and Canton's Board signed it into full effect the following evening.

It will be used as a library and community museum. The Canton Center school is located on Canton Center at Proctor Rd.

In other business during their regular monthly meeting last week, Canton's Board members adopted a mutual aid agreement between the fire department and departments of neighboring communities.

The decision is contingent upon approval of the Canton legal counsel, attorney William Sempliner.

Building Inspector Lovette Gee was directed to prepare — in cooperation with Clerk John Flodin — a proposed revision of building permit fees.

The move is aimed at bringing Canton's building permit fees more in line with those charged in other communities nearby.

The Township Board also approved a contract with the Wayne County Road Commission whereby secondary roads in Canton will be covered this summer with a dust palliative.

The palliative — composed partially of chlorine — keeps dust to a minimum on gravel and dirt roads.

A Canton fire prevention code was passed. It regulates storage of flammable items, requires that permits be obtained from the fire department for the burning of rubbish and trash in the Township, and generally controls hazards that might cause fires.

New elected officials were sworn in at the start of the meeting, held in the Township Hall on Tuesday night, April 9.

As additional funds become available, the Board will strive to incorporate the five deferred items, it was indicated.

None of the deferrals will delay the scheduled opening of the building. Board members have hopes that at least a portion of the new building will be ready for occupancy by the start of the second semester of the 1963-64 school year.

An art-room spray booth, costing \$370, was ranked number one on the priority list and a \$6,300 parking lot extension was given second priority.

A number of cafeteria equipment items were listed as third priority. They total \$4,900 in deferred costs. Wood cabinets in the hall room and "living-dining" area were ranked fourth at an estimated cost of \$500.

Final item on the priority list amounts to \$750 and involves a laminated wall around the stage.

The School Board also is considering a recommendation that shelving for storage rooms, stage lighting devices and stage curtain tracks be installed at the new portion of Junior High West as soon as funds become available.

The action to defer certain less important expenditures was prompted when construction bids exceeded the budget limitations of the School District's five-million building and site sinking fund.

City of Plymouth served as the collecting agency for the School District, the county and the community college.

"I am, of course, disappointed that this reasonable regulation failed to be adopted this year," said Kelley, the state's chief law enforcement officer. "However, I think we have made clear the necessity of regulation of this multi-million dollar industry in the public interest."

## Set Priority List For Deferred Items At Junior High West

In order to stay "within budget" in connection with three major school construction projects here, Board of Education members elected last month to defer \$12,816 in costs to phase II of Junior High West.

A priority list for accomplishing these deferred items was submitted to Board members at last week's regular meeting.

As additional funds become available, the Board will strive to incorporate the five deferred items, it was indicated.

None of the deferrals will delay the scheduled opening of the building. Board members have hopes that at least a portion of the new building will be ready for occupancy by the start of the second semester of the 1963-64 school year.

An art-room spray booth, costing \$370, was ranked number one on the priority list and a \$6,300 parking lot extension was given second priority.

A number of cafeteria equipment items were listed as third priority. They total \$4,900 in deferred costs. Wood cabinets in the hall room and "living-dining" area were ranked fourth at an estimated cost of \$500.

Final item on the priority list amounts to \$750 and involves a laminated wall around the stage.

The School Board also is considering a recommendation that shelving for storage rooms, stage lighting devices and stage curtain tracks be installed at the new portion of Junior High West as soon as funds become available.

The action to defer certain less important expenditures was prompted when construction bids exceeded the budget limitations of the School District's five-million building and site sinking fund.

Despite the high-pressured politics, and some questionable methods used by opponents, our own Detroit was selected to represent the United States as the American city bidding for the 1968 Olympic games.

The automobile city had been chosen last fall, but Los Angeles "hollered" loud and long until the selection committee reopened the bidding again.

The California city really wanted the games and went all-out with "no holds barred." The Hollywood approach staged by the Westerner for the committee went for naught when Detroit was again chosen.

Now-all we have to do is wait and see if the World Olympic Committee will pick Detroit as the 1968 site so we can have a ringside seat. Our chief contenders will be Lyons, France; Buenos Aires and Mexico City.

I suppose there are two ways of looking at the Californians attitude. True, they would not take "no" for an answer, and did everything possible to change the first verdict. However, there were a few Los Angeles sportscasters and writers who thought that the coast city had struck a "blow below the belt" — so to speak — especially when the Olympics are supposed to exhibit the highest type of sportsmanship.

All this may have been good, though, for it prompted Detroit to get off its "tut-tut" end and get going on something concrete.

The Michigan delegation did a splendid job of "selling Detroit" as the 1968 site. Our state needs more favorable national publicity to offset the adverse financial news stories of the past 10 years.

I honestly believe this is good for Michigan, and it will affect the business climate of our area by bringing much business here. Of course it will mean spending millions of dollars for a stadium, housing, promoting, etc., but it will be money well-spent.

And housing can be used for Wayne State after the event is over.

We have spent millions of dollars on our state highways and expressways, but we receive back many millions from tourists that come to our state in the summer. The more money we can bring into our state treasury the less taxes our local citizens will have to pay. Economists estimate that the games will bring in 140 million dollars to this area — and that is not a bad thing!

Some say, "Why not spend the money for hospitals and on the mentally ill, the juvenile offenders, etc.?" I would like to think that we might rent the large stadium afterwards and let the money go for something like this, or leave the tax on racing after the stadium is built and let it go for the above needs.

I really think Detroit has more to offer, or will have by then, than Los Angeles. The latter has a 30-year old stadium — the Coliseum — and this would need extensive remodeling to bring it up to present-day standards. We were in this huge stadium a couple years ago when we witnessed a Dodger baseball game and that was our impression at the time.

If Detroit is picked as the world site for 1968 we will order our tickets real early so that we will have a front row seat. The average person is very fortunate if he ever gets close enough to see an Olympic attraction, and one that comes to our shores only about once in every 40 years.

# Thinclads Falter at Finish, Lose to Bentley in Opener

Bentley High recovered at the last possible moment Thursday afternoon, swept first place honors in three concluding dual-meet events and defeated Plymouth 55.5 to 53.5.

It was the Rocks first dual-meet loss since the 1961 season.

Leading 53.5 to 36.5, Plymouth was literally shut out by the Bentley thinclads in the final three events, the mile run, the mile relay and the 880-yard relay.

As a result, the Rocks opened their 1963 track campaign with a deficit, one which they will not have an opportunity to balance until April 23 when Trenton visits here.

Bentley swept first, second and third in the mile run, and just as efficiently scored solid victories in the two concluding relay events.

Plymouth coach Keith Baughmann nonetheless seemed heartened by the Rocks performance against the Bulldogs, who had been eyed warily around the league as the next best thing to a powerhouse this year.

As it turned out, Bentley emerged a winner in its first outing, although not by such a decisive margin as to throw further fear into the other teams around the conference. "It was our first meet this

year," Baughmann said, "and it's hard to say exactly how we're going to do in the league this spring. I know that we're going to improve."

He left observers with the thought that Plymouth's performance, although a losing one, was more encouraging than had been expected.

A year ago, the Rocks marched forcefully through an unbeaten dual-meet campaign and scored a smashing victory in the Suburban Six League championship meet.

Except for the last three events last week against Bentley, Plymouth almost picked up where it left off at the conclusion of the 1962 year.

Plymouth scored at will in the field events.

Chris Gaffield and Mark Schultheiss shared first place honors in the high jump at 5-feet-6. Hugh Sarah won the shot put with a toss of 51-feet-2. Jim Ayers finished second.

Bob Steele scored his first of three individual victories with a win in the broad jump (20 feet, 1/4 inch), and Mark Fischer was second for the Rocks.

In the pole vault, Fischer was first with a leap of 10-feet-6 and Herb Park tied for second.

In the track events, Steele led off with a record-shattering performance in the 120-yard high hurdles. His time of 15.1 seconds set a new school standard, breaking the old mark established in 1931 by Harold Wagenschultz and tied last season by Steele himself. It was 15.2 seconds.

Gaffield was second in the event.

Dave VanOrnum was third in the 100-yard dash and Bot Pringle did equally well in the 80-yard run.

John Bowsman scored a second in the 440-yard dash and Steele followed with his third outright victory of the afternoon on the strength of a 20.2-second performance in the 180-yard low hurdles.

Gaffield tied for third in the same event.

Van Ornum was second in the 220-yard dash and Dennis Tonkovich was third, but that was as far as Plymouth was destined to go against the Bentley thinclads.

Up to that point, Plymouth held a commanding 53.5 to 36.5 margin.

Bentley scored a sweep in the mile run and returned with conclusive victories in both relay events to win the meet.

## Dick Underwood's First Book Scheduled for July Release

Publication of a fiction novel entitled "A Little Bit of Love," by Holt, Rinehart & Winston early this summer is bound to generate some excitement in the Plymouth area.

The book, which is scheduled for publication about July 15, is authored by former localite Dick Underwood, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold R. Underwood, of 11731 Priscilla Lane.

The story line, according to Underwood, a 1951 graduate of Plymouth, centers around a love story concerning an American man and German woman.

Employed by General Motors' central office and the Chevrolet central office, in Detroit, since 1958, Underwood was married last November — the same month that he received word from his agent in New York that his book had been sold.


