Incumbent Niemi Eyes 2nd Term in Plymouth

Light Vote for School Board

Although two posts, each for a four-year-term, are up for grabs in the seven-man scrap for the vacancies on the Plymouth Community District school board, lack of voter interest may hold balloting down to the lowest total in several years

in the election next Monday June 10.

At least that's the prediction of veteran politicians in the area who have followed the school board vote for years. When the issue only to fill board vacancies, the voters

show a complete lack of interest although Board members have been held up for criticism later by the same persons who couldn't find time to pull a handle on a voting machine. The seven candidates, including three from the city and

four from the township, are headed by incumbent Harold Niemi who is seeking his second term. Niemi, who has been chairman of the all-important finance committee for several years and served as Board president a year ago, decided to

seek re-election after learning that his new position with Ford Motor Co. wouldn't interfere with meetings.

The second vacancy came when Peter Zylstra took a position in the Bay City-Saginaw area and reportedly will move there. He found it difficult to attend meetings in the past six months and didn't file petitions.

The race stacks up as one of the most interesting in some time with no less than four considered as the top contenders. Incumbent Niemi looks like a shoe-in to retain his post. He has been considered one of the most outstanding dedicated members of the Board during his term of office. It is hard to see any of the others dropping him out of the picture.

Thus the battle for the second position seems to rest between Carl Schultheiss, 11705 Amherst Court, who was third in the election last June with the top two gaining berths; James Garber, 42269 Hammill Lane, in the Lakepointe subdivision; and John McLaren, 1008 Roosevelt, veteran Plymouth lumber, coal and fuel businessman.

Although George Conover, 279 Blunk, ran for office a few years back, he doesn't appear to have the backing of the top four. The same is true of Glenn Schroeder, 1330 Beech, and Patrick O. Gannon, 165 Burroughs, who are making their first pitch into local politics.

GEORGE CONOVER, 279 Blunk, graduate of Rutgers with a degree in Mechanical Engineering. Employed at Detroit Diesel for the past 15 years during which time he has resided in Plymouth. Member of the School Planning Committee, Methodist Church, Society of Automotive Engineers and interested in Boy Scout work. He and his wife, Marjorie, are the parents of four children: William, at Michigan State University; Don, at University of Michigan; Robert, Junior High East; and Nancy, Bird School.

CARL SCHULTHEISS, 11705 Amherst Court, graduate of Wisconsin with degree in electrical engineering. Manager of Engineering Services at Burroughs. Was a Board member in Libertyville, Ill. Member of the Methodist Church, Institute of Electronic and Electrical Engineers, active in Boy Scout work for years. He and wife, Jean, are parents of three children: Wade at Michigan State University; Mark, senior at Plymouth High, and Gail, in kindergarten at Bird School. Has resided in Plymouth seven years.

GLENN SCHROEDER, 1330 Beech, graduate of Michigan State University with a degree in Business Administration. Supervisor of cost analyst in the controller's office of the automotive assembly division of Ford Motor Co. in Dearborn. Has resided in Plymouth 10 years. He and wife, Margaret, are parents of three children: Cathryn and Mark, at Smith School; and Dave at home.

PATRICK O. GANNON, 165 Burroughs, Graduate of Ironton (O.) High School. Resided in Plymouth two years. Employed as machine operator at Chevrolet Spring and Bumper plant. Veteran of World War II and a member of the Church of God. He and his wife, Brookie, are the parents of twins, Patrick Michael and Patricia Ann, both attending Starkweather School.

JAMES GARBER, 42269 Hammill Lane, Lakepointe subdivision. Received B.A. Degree from Albion College and LL.B. from University of Michigan. Employed in legal division of

the Wayne County Road Commission. Past president of the Plymouth Junior Chamber of Commerce, selected as "Man of the Year" in 1962, co-founder of Plymouth Community Band; charter member and first president of Plymouth YMCA; member of Presbyterian Church, Michigan Bar Association and the Albion College Alumni Association of Greater Detroit. Has resided in Plymouth community for 11 years. He and wife, Marianne, are parents of two sons, Ralph and James, Jr.

HAROLD NIEMI, 47566 Joy Road, is seeking a second term. He served two consecutive terms as president during his current stint. He holds a Bachelor's and Master's degree in Business Administration from Northwestern University and is a Certified Public Accountant. Has resided in Plymouth since 1956 and is a member of the Presbyterian Church. He is manager of Investment and Systems Analysis for Ford International Division of Ford Motor Co. He and his

wife Bernice are the parents of four children: Barbara, a member of the Plymouth High graduating class; Susan, a sophomore at the high school; Bruce at Junior High West; and Bette at Gallimore School.

JOHN D. MACLAREN III, 1008 Roosevelt, lifetime resident of Plymouth. Attended Detroit Business University, University of Michigan and Wayne State University. He and his wife Jane are the parents of two children: John D. MacLaren IV, a junior at University of Michigan, and Cynthia, a member of the graduating class at Plymouth High who will enroll at Central Michigan in the fall. He is following in the footsteps of his grandfather, John D. MacLaren I and his father, John J. MacLaren, in the lumber, coal, fuel oil and cement business. Making his first bid for a public office. Served as president of Smith School PTA for two years. Member of the Presbyterian Church and the Chamber of Commerce.

Joe came to Plymouth from Portland nine years ago and operated a small laundry for a time until

accepting the post with the City.

He automatically relinquishes his posts as Urban Renewal director, chairman of the Election Board, City Clerk, City Accountant, head of the Water Dept. and recorder of vital statistics with the resignation.

Near, who also is secretary of the Municipal Building Authority, plans to retain that position.

Joe and his wife, Regina, reside at 750 Irvin St., with their three sons: Guy David, 9; James, 11; and Joseph Arthur, 12.

At Traditional Memorial Day Parade

6,000 Pay Tribute to War Dead

More than 6,000 lined streets of downtown Plymouth Thursday to pay homage to the community's war heroes in the traditional Memorial Day parade and program.

Larry Gubow, U.S. Attorney for Eastern Michigan, a veteran of World War II and honored as Michigan's "Veteran of the Year" at the State Fair three years ago, was the principal speaker.

Prior to the start of the parade, the Navy Mothers Club held solemn services at the bridge near the Hillside Inn on Plymouth Road, casting wreaths into the waters in memory of the sailor dead.

The bridge ceremonies were in charge of Commander Leona Schomberger and included: prayer by Major Ernest Hammer of the Salvation Army; reading, Erma McLean; solo, Glyn Norton; casting of wreaths into water by Joan Sackett and Nora Donovan; three volleys by the VFW Drill team; and taps by Bugler Harry Krumm of the VFW unit.

The services paid tribute to the following men who died for their country while serving in the Navy: John Donovan, Peter Gayde, Charles Hadley, Donald Hunter, Keith Lawson, Harold Leach, Elmer McIntyre, Leonard Mende, Jack McLean, James Sexton, Ronald Tobey, Jesse West and Ovid Deace.

The parade, which included two marching bands and units from the VFW, American Legion, Elks Club, Girl Scouts, Campfire Girls and Brownies and Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts, started from Theodore and moved down Main Street past Kellogg Park and ended on Ann Arbor Trail south of the park.

Vernon Overmyer, of Passage-Gayde Post 391, American Legion was the Grand Marshal with James McKindies, of Mayflower Post 6693, VFW, as the Aide to the Marshal.

Studies Industrial Park Site

Detroit Co. Eyes Plymouth

A large Detroit equipment company is making a thorough study of Plymouth's Industrial Park with the idea of constructing a 35,000-square-foot plant if the site measures up to requirements. That's the news passed

along to the City Commission following a session a week ago when the Commissioners met with top officials of the company.

The firm sells, leases and services heavy equipment in road building and currently has a plant in the Tireman-Livornois district.

The proposed Plymouth facility would be at least 35,000-square feet for sales and service, stocking of parts and warehousing, according to the scuttlebutt.

The Commission hopes to have a firm commitment from the company within a short time and if negotiations should be completed, construction would be started within two weeks after the final papers are signed.

Stahl Buys Continental Can Plant

Quick work by members of the Plymouth Industrial Development Corporation with considerable help from National Bank of Detroit's Floyd Kehrl resulted in Precision Control, a division of Stahl Manufacturing Co., of Detroit, purchasing the vacant Continental Can Co. building on Junction St.

The IDC announced several weeks ago that Superior Sliding Door had tentatively agreed to take over the building, but negotiations broke down and it appeared for a time that all of the work getting the plant ready for occupancy was for naught.

Then Kehrl stepped into the picture and induced Stahl Co. President Benjamin Stahl to look into the situation. IDC officials took over and the deal was consummated a week ago.

Precision Control will employ more than 100 in its diversified stamping operations according to Stahl officials.

The division will be added to the list of Stahl plants which include the Stahl Manufacturing plant on Woodbine St. in Redford Township; the Vincent Plating Co., now operating in the former Universal plant on Mill St. in Plymouth, and another division in Memphis, Tenn.

Precision Control officials indicated they will start moving in equipment immediately.

Rep. Paul Chandler Named To Special Committee To Investigate Boxing In State

State Rep. Paul Chandler of Livonia was appointed today to a special House of Representatives committee which will study boxing and make recommendations for changes in regulations.

Chandler was co-sponsor of a resolution in the House setting up the committee, which also includes Reps. Oscar Bouwsma of Muskegon, Roy L. Spencer of Attica, Edmond Lesinski of Detroit and Francis Beeton of Muskegon.

Speaker of the House Allison Green made the appointments. The boxing resolution declares: "Whereas, Recent events in the sport of boxing, which resulted in at least one fatality and other serious injuries, indicate a need to re-examine the laws and regulations governing this sport, both professional and amateur; and

"Whereas, While this sport is of ancient origin, it is one that demands strict regulation and control since the degree of risk of injury to participate is very great; and

"Whereas, To date the conduct of the sport in this state has been excellent but it is in the public interest that a thorough study be made at this time; now therefore be it

"Resolved by the House of Representatives, That there is created a special committee to consist of five members to be appointed by the Speaker, to function during the interim between the 1963 and 1964 Regular Sessions of the Legislature, to study the laws and regulations governing the sport of boxing, both professional and amateur, and to report its findings and recommendations to

the 1964 Legislature; and be it further

"Resolved, That such committee is authorized to administer oaths, subpoena witnesses and examine books and records of any persons, partnerships or corporations involved in a matter properly before such committee."

Need Tank to Boost Pressure

Plymouth's City Commission was told Monday that the only logical solution to the problem of providing ample water pressure to the Western Electric plant was a water tank in the Beck Rd. area.

Frank Lodge, representative of the consulting engineering firm of Johnson and Anderson, told the Commissioners they had three alternatives but the water tank was the only sure answer.

"This tank would solve the problem," he said, "it would keep the pressure at the desired level and it doesn't mean that it has to be one with the capacity of the proposed reservoir although that would be a solution. The reservoir would store between two and three million gallons."

The Commission discussed the feasibility of moving the inoperative Byron Street tank to Beck Rd. but decided to discard the plan due to the cost.

Commissioner James Jabara gave figures showing it would cost more than \$40,000 to dismantle and reconstruct the tank where a new tank would cost \$55,000 with all extras.

The matter was tabled for discussion at a committee of the whole meeting next Monday night.

Wayne Dunlap, director of the Plymouth Symphony, appealed to the Commission to study a plan for the purchase of a portable stage to be used in Kellogg Park for band concerts and other civic activities.

Commissioners George Lawton and Robert Smith will meet with Dunlap and his group to check costs and the possibility of making such a project a community affair that would be partially financed by service clubs and the City Commission.

Mayor Richard Wernette appointed Arthur Karnatz to the Personnel Relations Commission and deferred action on filling the vacancy on the Municipal Building Authority Board created by the resignation of David Mather a week ago.







SCHOOL BUSINESS IS YOUR BUSINESS

Children five through eight, and particularly boys, constitute the most critical group by far, he said, and darting suddenly into the street in the course of play, generally from behind a parked car is the most hazardous thing a youngster does. May, June, July and August are the danger months for child accidents.

Check Attic Ventilation

Now is a good time to check your attic ventilation, and to correct it if need be.

Here is how to tell if you have enough ventilation: Measure all the actual ventilator openings in square inches. If the total amount of openings in square inches is approximately equal to half the total amount of attic floor space in square feet, you have sufficient ventilation, according to the Metal Ventilator Institute.

If not, you will want to install large ventilators, or add extra ones, to provide the proper amount.

It's too cold to work in the attic in the winter months. And — particularly if your attic is not properly ventilated — it will be much too warm to

work in during the summer months.

Inadequately ventilated attics build up temperatures higher than outdoor temperatures in summer months, because there are not enough openings for heat to escape.

You'll probably say you read the following in this column a year ago and the year before that.

And you'd be right! But, what we're going to say is important enough to keep repeating every June just as the high school athletes wrap up their interscholastic competition and turn to performing on independent teams during the summer months.

Only graduating prep seniors aren't affected by the State regulation which prescribes what is right and what is wrong if schoolboys are to retain their eligibility when classes resume in the fall.

Specifically, returning high school athletes must NOT (1) accept any cash for their athletic play during the summer, or (2) accept any reward for their services, unless said award is a plaque, cup, ribbon, etc., and doesn't carry a value of 3, exclusive of any engraving charges.

The penalties are strict in both cases. Boys violating the rules not only can be suspended from high school competition, but their schools could wind up being forced to forfeit every victory in which they played illegally. It's happened more than once that a team has captured three or four . . . and sometimes even a championship . . . and then had all his joys squashed because it was discovered a player had violated the awards rule or the amateur practices regulation.

Very often, some adult is much more guilty than the boys involved.

The would-be, good guy who stages a golf tournament or runs a baseball team, sees no reason why he can't reward a star. So he tells the boy:

"Here take this. You won't get into trouble." Well, when the trouble arrives, it's not the adult who suffers. It's the prep . . . and also his coach, his team and . . . fellow schoolmates.

The best thing a schoolboy athlete, who performs on an outside team during the summer, can do is TO ACCEPT NOTHING FROM ANYBODY until such time as he has checked matters with a member of his school's coaching staff.

If the coach isn't around, just tell the would-be giver "you're sorry." Tell him you'll wait until you see the coach in the fall and, then if the gift is okay, you'll drop around to pick it up.

There's this bit of advice for adults who might be thinking of "taking care" of their schoolboy athletes for a summer's play on sandlot teams or in golf tournaments, etc.

Before you set up your prize list, drop a note to Charles E. Forsythe, State Director of Athletics, Lansing 2, Mich. Tell him what you have in mind. Forsythe, or his aide, Al Bush, will shoot back an immediate reply. They'll tell you what's right and what's wrong.

Now that school is about to end until June, it's interesting to hear what communities like Livonia, Plymouth and Redford Union have in mind—recreation speaking—for their residents.

The Livonia Parks and Recreation Department estimates that 5,000 will participate in its baseball and softball leagues this summer.

The huge program includes a variety of classifications in baseball, ranging from eight-year-olds to adults; plus men's and women's softball.

There'll also be golf, tennis and a lot more in Livonia. So we suggest you contact your nearest recreation director. He'll give you all the news.

If you're too lazy to leave the house, call the recreation department. Those in Redford Township and Plymouth should do likewise.

DRC Moves Post Back As Experiment Fails

Satisfied after a month trial that Detroit area racing fans do not want a 2 p. m. start, officials of the Detroit Race Course switched to a 3 p. m. start on weekdays, effective Wednesday, June 5. It will also have a daily double on the last two races, with eight events daily except Saturday.

"We believe we have given the 2 o'clock starting time a fair trial," said DRC President E. E. Dale Shaffer. "It is our considered opinion that it is too early for racing enthusiasts of the Detroit Metropolitan area."

"We feel that a 3 p. m. start on weekdays will give a greater number of people a more convenient opportunity to enjoy our facilities and the added weekday daily double will provide an interesting and popular addition to our racing program."

Permission for the added daily double was granted by the Michigan Racing Commission on a trial basis.

Racing Commissioner Edgar

Hayes also approved the cut from nine to eight races on weekdays. The second daily double will be held on the seventh and eighth races.

The Saturday and holiday schedule will remain the same with a 2 p. m. post on the first two events and the usual 10 races.

Meanwhile, Racing Secretary John Daniels is busy with plans for the \$50,000 added Michigan Mile and one-sixteenth on Saturday, June 22.

The rich stake is the high-spot of the thoroughbred season in Michigan and Daniels had a load of mail to look through starting Thursday—all entries must have been postmarked by midnight Wednesday.

He anticipated more than 35 nominations including many of the nation's top distance stars with Crimson King Farm's Crimson Satan listed as almost a sure-fire entry.
