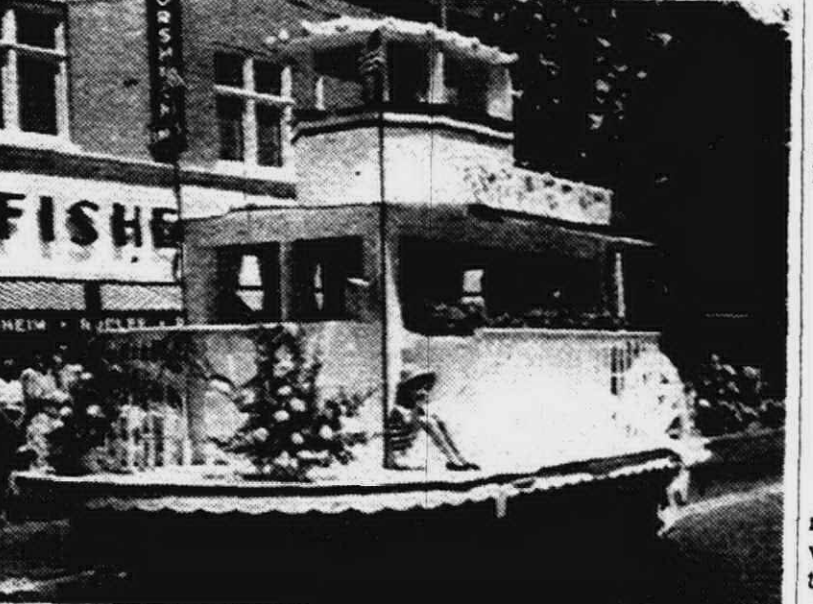

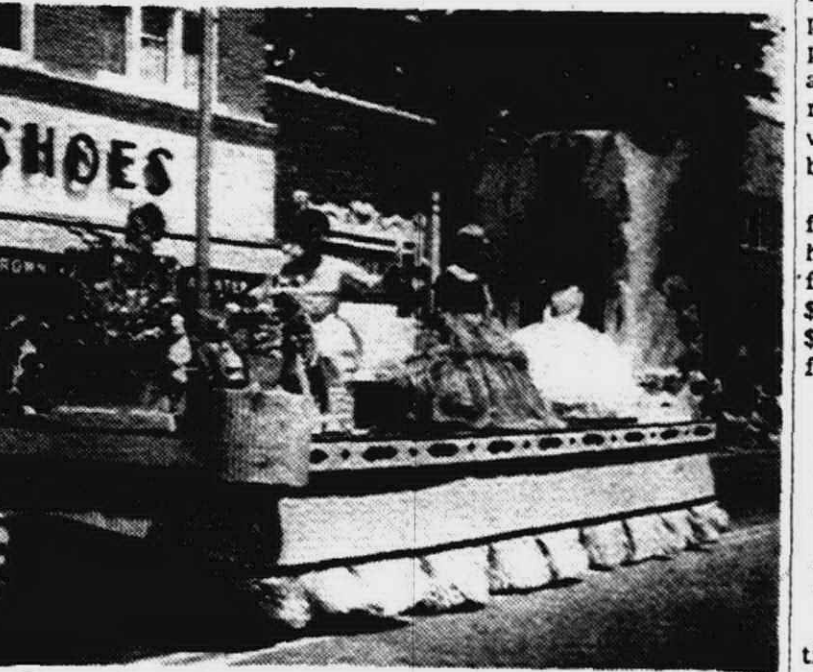
QUEEN BONNIE GIBSON had big smiles for all from her seat in a convertible after her selection as Miss Plymouth over 19 other candidates.

# School Board OKs Pay Hikes

## Boosts Hit By Union

The Plymouth School Board Monday approved its 1963-64 budget calling for expenditures of \$2,663,000, an increase of \$201,000 over last year, and including pay hikes for all employees.

The proposed salary increases, which were announced three weeks ago, include \$100 across the board cost-of-living for all members of the professional staff, a five cents per hour boost for non-classified workers, \$200 for principals on the salary schedule and flat hikes for the four administrators under contract directly to the board.

The latter consists of: Supt. Russell Isbister, \$500; Assistant Supt. in Charge of Business Melvin Blunk, \$350; Senior High Principal Carvel Bentley, \$250; and Junior High Supervising Principal William Harding, \$350.

However, the increase for the non-classified workers, which includes school engineers and maintenance personnel, brought a loud complaint from Robert Ross, business agent for the Union representing the group.

Ross termed the five cents an hour boost as "inadequate" and indicated the union members were unhappy with the proposal.

"We feel the Board has failed to take into consideration that an increase in enrollment (the board is looking forward to 280 more students come September) means more work for the maintenance men just as it does for the teaching staff.

"We note that the Board has added nine teachers because of the higher enrollment but there hasn't been a thing said about giving our workers more help. It seems strange to us that the Board makes large increases to some segments and small to others—we are in the small class."

Ross pointed out that the custodial force includes 41, a majority of whom are in the low \$4,400 classification.

"Matter of fact," he said, "it is real nice for the Board to agree to pay half of the premium for Blue Cross insurance but we wonder how many members of the Board know that more than half of our members can't take advantage of the offer—they can't afford to pay their half."

The Board agreed to take the matter under advisement but went ahead with approval of the budget as drawn up.

Of the \$201,000 increase over last year, Board President Gerald Fischer pointed out that it was based on a three-way plan. Part of the increase was planned a year ago, part is from an increase in receipts and the remainder came from savings when the Board under ran the budget for last year.

The increases came from the following items: required salary hikes, \$56,000; costs resulting from increased enrollment, \$59,000; program improvement, \$49,000; salary adjustments and fringe benefits, \$40,000.

The budget shows that the Board anticipates an increase of \$124,000 in receipts based on a higher tax base (state equalization valuation) and state aid, neither of which will reflect any additional boosts in the tax rate.

The Board approved an additional nine teachers, six in the elementary grades and three in the secondary. It allowed for an additional clerk at the high school and a part-time clerk in the administrative office.

It also okayed five additional teachers because of program improvements including: an additional visiting teacher, one for special education at the high school and three for classes in art, music and physical education in the elementary schools.

In other actions, the Board: Approved changes in work orders for Farrand School and the Senior High.

Passed resolutions asking permission of the Michigan Finance Commission to issue bonds totaling \$475,000 for the building and sinking fund and \$550,000 for operating funds.

# Biggest 4th Parade, Fireworks Draws Thousands to Plymouth

July 4, 1963 will long be remembered by Plymouthites as the date of the greatest Independence Day celebration in the community's history—thanks to long hours of work and months of preparation by the 60 members of the Plymouth Junior Chamber of Commerce.

More than 10,000 braved 90-degree weather and a scorching sun to view an hour-long parade through the downtown Plymouth business section as an all-time high total of 89 units joined in the longest procession in history.

But that was just a sample of what was coming for the fireworks display in the evening at the carnival grounds on Mill Street, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce in cooperation with the Jaycees, attracted more than 20,000, according to police officials and jammed every inch of parking and space available within a half-mile of the grounds.

There isn't any question in the minds of even the oldest resident of the area but that the day-night celebration will go down in annals as the biggest and greatest ever.

From the moment that Mayor Richard Wernette and Township Supervisor Roy Lindsay

joined with Jaycee President James Garber and President-elect Wendell Smith in heading the parade until the final bomb sounded at the fireworks, there wasn't an idle moment.

The parade was packed with colorful units—42 floats, 20 candidates for the title of Miss Plymouth headed by Bonnie Gibson, 1022 Penniman, who was selected as Queen in the judging

Wednesday night at the senior high school, smart precision drill units, two bands, youngsters carrying signs telling of their work, and a group of noisy go-karts that wound up the procession and had everyone in a dither as they whirled round and round in the street.

More than 20 Jaycee members donned clown outfits and regaled the crowd with their antics to keep things lively throughout the long parade. There wasn't a bit of delay once the procession started and it moved rapidly down Main Street to Hartsough, across Hartsough to the Junior High East athletic field before the judges.

The Plymouth Kiwanis Club float won the grand prize for the best organizational display with its Spirit of '76 depicted in the historical pose that is so familiar to Americans—three youths with a drum, fife and a flag.

Other prizes were awarded to Davis and Lent for the best commercial float; best drill unit, the VFW Mayflower Post color guard, which recently won the state championship in the annual competition in Kalamazoo; and best marching unit, the U.S. Navy Tars and Rifles drill team.

The Plymouth Township firemen won the annual water battle in an hour-long competition over teams from the City of Plymouth and DeHoCo.

The Township team defeated the Plymouth City No. 1 outfit while DeHoCo upended Plymouth City No. 2. Then came the championship scrap between DeHoCo and the Township and it kept the crowd interested for more than a half-hour before the Township wore down the DeHoCo outfit by taking two of three matches.

Maurice Ferguson, Powell Road, Plymouth, became the first Plymouthite to win the Black Angus steer in the competition sponsored by the Plymouth Chamber of Commerce.

Miss Gibson was crowned Miss Plymouth in the final judging at the Teen Hop, sponsored by the Plymouth Firemen's Association, Wednesday night.

She won over a field of 19 others. Named as her attendants were: Sally Phillips, 334 N. Evergreen; Kathy Keller, 651 Sunset; Cheryl Wright, 48485 Gyde Road; and Bonnie Onusko, 1250 Hartsough.

Phyllis Freppon, 11, 35576 Oakwood, Wayne, was the winner of the bicycle which was awarded Saturday evening.

The 1903 Oldsmobile, donated by the Junior Chamber of Commerce, was won by six-year-old Tommy Quigg, 301 Elizabeth, Plymouth. He was entered in the competition by his father who thought the youngster's name on a ticket would bring luck—it did.

## Job Registrations Soar in Plymouth

Accelerated by the impetus provided by a full page advertisement in the Plymouth Observer, a contribution by Publisher Paul Chandler to the project, registrations for the Young Adult community employment service provided by the Y.M.C.A. jumped more than 33 per cent since last Friday.

That was the announcement of Co-ordinator Mike Hoben who indicated the total was well over the 100 mark and the project was progressing very satisfactorily in its second week.

Hoben reported success in securing employment for

those registering for jobs. Matter of fact, he pointed to figures which showed he had been successful in finding jobs for one of every three that has signed up.

"Of course," he pointed out, "only a few of these are permanent jobs as of this time but we believe we are making tremendous strides in that direction and hope to land steady jobs for a majority of those seeking help."

Hoben is busy with plans for vocational training classes and already has had offers of aid from two or three instructors who have indicated they will be willing to take over classes for periods of times to help many of the young adults get started in learning a trade.

A skilled electrician was one of the first to volunteer and even went so far as to offer the use of his equipment in the classes.

He plans on holding sessions twice a week for several weeks to give those interested a background and early training in the trade.

The campaign received a big boost Monday morning when the Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors voted \$1,000 for the project.

This raised the total to within \$1,000 of the amount needed. Previously, the Rotary Club approved a contribution of \$1,000; Kiwanis, Lions and Junior Chamber of Commerce, \$500 each.

## Stockmeyer Analyzes Nation's Air Defense

Although the air defenses of the United States have been improved considerably in the last decade, "much more work needs to be done to protect the country from an all-out nuclear attack by Russia."

This is the impression brought back to the metropolitan area by Norman O. Stockmeyer, a Wayne real estate broker, who returned last week from an "Operation Understanding" tour of air defense centers in Texas, New Mexico and Colorado.

As a guest of the United States Army Air Defense Command, Stockmeyer made the trip with several other Detroit-area businessmen and civic leaders. Each member of the group was designated as an "ambassador of air defense," Stockmeyer said on his return.

The group was briefed on the operation of the Army's only air defense school at Fort Bliss, Texas, two nearby missile ranges, and toured the headquarters of the North American Air Defense Command and the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs.

"I was tremendously impressed by all the hardware we saw," Stockmeyer said. "But I was even more impressed by the caliber of the personnel at the places we visited."

Stockmeyer, the 1962 Republican candidate for Michigan secretary of state, and an original promoter and director of the Bank of Livonia, currently serves as secretary of the Wayne County Board of Education, and treasurer of the Wayne County Association of School Boards.

"One thing that I think should be pointed out is that our Army right now is not capable of defending us against everything the Russians could throw at us in an all-out nuclear war," Stockmeyer said.

"And the Army is the first to admit this." America's air defense system currently is able to detect, identify, intercept and destroy only manned enemy bombers.

"We were told that we don't have an impregnable air defense system and maybe never will have one," he said.

"But civilian scientists and military experts are hard at work around the clock to make our existing defenses as good as possible and are trying to come up with something that will stop more of what the Russians have."

He said the United States is not able at the moment to intercept or destroy Russian intercontinental ballistic missiles, submarine-launched missiles and hostile satellites although

they can be detected and identified.

Meanwhile, the missile training school at Fort Bliss, Stockmeyer said, which he described as "big business," is going full swing in turning out the soldiers who man the Nike missile bases around Detroit and some 350 other missile sites in the Free World.

"The school uses equipment and buildings worth about \$63,000,000 and costs about \$20,000,000 a year to operate," he said.

The Detroit-area group was escorted on the trip by Col. Alfred J. Floyd, commander of the Detroit Air Defense system, and Lt. Ross Wingler, both stationed at Selfridge Air Force Base.

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## Gain More Living Room With Patio

An attractive screened-in patio is an example of what can be done by a homeowner of average do-it-yourself ability, provided he has a sound plan and goes about it methodically.

Thousands of owners of moderate-size homes are discovering that to accommodate the physical needs of a growing family (and for more peace of mind) the original living area simply must be expanded.

A screened-in patio can add greatly to the comfort of all concerned and, at the same time, increase the value of the home.

An 'outdoor living room' can be used when entertaining guests, serving family meals, staging children's parties, or as a protected play area on rainy days or even for sleeping under the stars.

A 12' x 12' patio, for example, can be constructed during weekends. It will take even less time, if you already have a concrete slab.

Here's how you can do it all for approximately \$500: First,

have a concrete slab poured. The approximate cost will be \$135 for materials and labor. You can save the labor cost by doing the slab work yourself, but it's a pretty back-breaking job. One thing to remember no matter who does the work: Provide adequate drainage away from the house. Also, concrete footers for the slab must be below the frost line for the area in which you live.

From that point on, everything can be done by yourself. Place natural slate in the concrete before it is cured, to create a more attractive floor. Once the slate is set, a thin mixture of cement and fine sand should be used to fill in between the slates.

Sink creosoted 4" x 4" posts in the uncured concrete (any wood going below ground level should be creosoted, whether it goes directly into the earth or not). To take the screening later, sink 2" x 4" posts in the concrete midway between each 4" x 4" post, and also place 2"

x4" base plates on top of the concrete between each post.

Nail 4' x 4' framing across the tops of the posts the length of the patio. Then secure 2" x 6" rafters to the roof of the house and top of the 4" x 4" framing, and nail a 1" x 6" face plate against the outside of the 4" x 4" framing the length of the patio.

Nail corrugated Fiberglas-reinforced plastic panels to the 2" x 6" rafters, after placing longitudinal and corrugated wood filler strips over the rafters and in alignment with the corrugations of the panels.

Next, use Fiberglas screening in 5 and 6-foot widths, tacking it (or you can staple) to the posts about every inch. This screening won't rot, rust, corrode or dent, and is glare-free. Use framing strips of wood to cover up the tacks and give a trim appearance.

Ventilation just under the roof is important, so fashion a lattice effect using wood slats 1 1/2" wide and 3/4" thick at each end of the patio. It lets air through and at the same time gives a decorative effect.

## Partitions Can Create More Room

One of the most effective ways to make a house or an apartment more attractive and livable is to partition existing rooms. Best of all, you can easily build partitions yourself without carpentry experience or power tools. There are many different uses for partitions, according to the National Lumber Manufacturers Association.

Enclosing a portion of the kitchen, for example, provides a more pleasant, semi-private dining area. Similar improvements can be produced by partitioning studies out of living rooms or porches, and erecting vestibules around front doors.

Make one big bedroom into two smaller ones by means of partition. This idea is particularly useful to families with young children, for growing youngsters inevitably need rooms of their own.

Partitions consist simply of a framework made of 2 x 4 lumber covered with wood paneling or wall board; 2 x 4's are also used to frame doorways and other opening. Molding strips laid along the top of the partition offer easy means of hiding gaps between it and the ceiling.

If you have building plans, take them to a lumber dealer. For a nominal charge, he'll cut all the components to the right size. Then all you need do is put the pieces together with simple hand tools.

The use of angle braces and similar metal fasteners eliminates tricky nailing and permits much of the work to be preassembled on the floor or table.

Most partitions, besides dividing unsatisfactory areas, also perform decorative functions. Instead of erecting a full floor-to-ceiling separator, for example—run it only part-way up. Instead of making a solid wall—design it with vertical or horizontal openings or dowels spaced a number of inches apart.

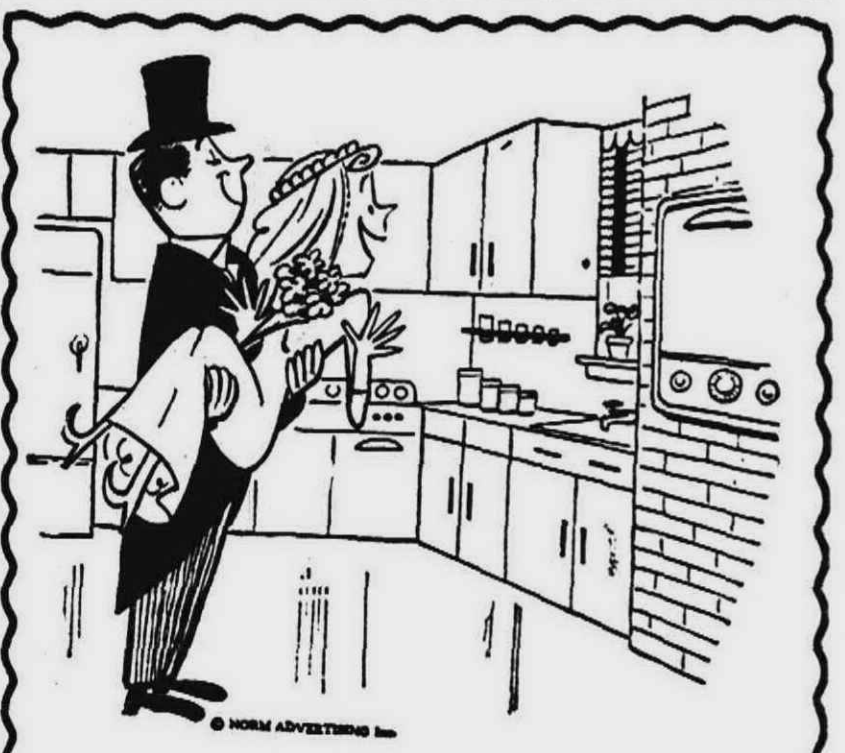

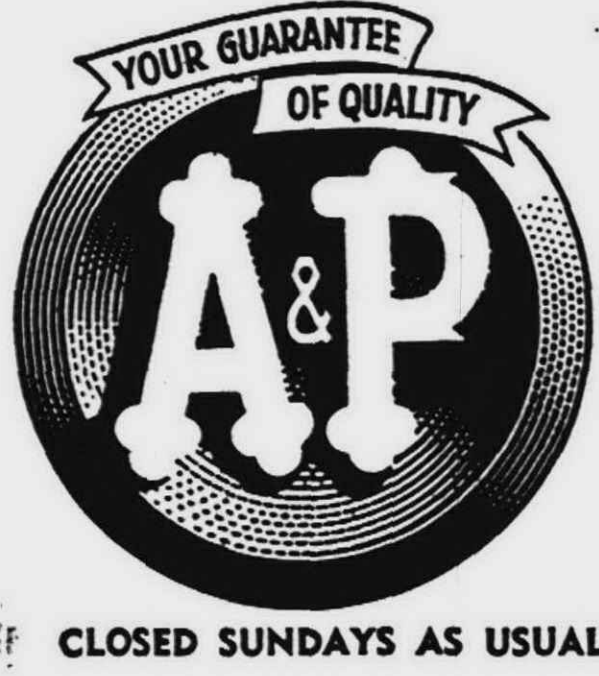

Carl Sandburg Library Books Focus on Nation's Racial Problems

Racial strife in Birmingham, Ala., and other parts of the South has focussed national attention recently on desegregation and the Negro problem. Books and magazine articles about all aspects of the problem are available at the Carl Sandburg Library, according to Librarian Skip Rosenthal.

One recently-published book is "The Negro Revolt," by Louis Lomax. Besides giving a brief history of race relations in this country, Lomax discusses Negro grievances and the freedom rides, sit-ins, and other means being used to integrate buses,

schools, and other public facilities. The author, a Negro, contends that the dreams of this new generation must not be ignored, because a victory for the Negro is a victory for America.

Langston Hughes' "Fight for Freedom: The Story of the NAACP" reviews the progress of the Negro fight for equality during the past 50 years and the battles still to be fought.

Other books which discuss the race question in the U.S., include "Black Like Me," by John Griffin; "Killers of the Dream," by Lillian Smith;

"Brothers Under the Skin," by Carey McWilliams; "Black Bourgeoisie," by Edward Frazier; "Race and Reason," by Carleton Putnam; and "How Far the Promised Land?" by Walter White.

"But Not Next Door," by Harry and David Rosen tells of the problems of integration in housing. Another book of housing integration is Dennis Clark's "The Ghetto Game."

Novelist James Baldwin, one of today's best known spokesmen for the American Negro, has written such books of essays 'on the Negroes'

plight as "Nobody Knows My Name" and "The Fire Next Time."

The history of the Negro in America is covered in "Pictorial History of the Negro in America," edited by Langston Hughes and "A Century of Civil Rights," by Milton Konvitz.

# Educational Television Nears Reality In Livonia School System

Educational television is slowly moving towards reality in the Livonia Public School System. Alex Baskin, Director of Instructional Television, has issued a report summarizing the District's progress to date.

The report covers a wide range of activities which point up the difficulties of making a beginning effort in this comparatively new field of educational activity. The District's work so far has included an extensive study of curriculum possibilities, several experiments with ETV in the classrooms, a program to gain teacher acceptance of this newly evolving teaching technique, and an investigation of the possible financial and technical problems to be faced.

Baskin has filed a petition with the Federal Communications Commission in the name of the Livonia Board of Education requesting establishment of an Ultra High Frequency station for Livonia. The process used for obtaining this station is complex because of the number of UHF channels available in any one part of the nation is severely restricted. The possible assignment of a UHF channel to Livonia is particularly significant in view of the fact that all TV receivers manufactured after April 30, 1964, will be required by law to equip sets with both VHF and UHF tuners.

If Channel 68 is assigned to this community it would be the first broadcast station in the area. Since it will be a non-profit educational station, it will be prepared to offer programs of local community interest. Cultural, civic, and educational

organizations will be able to use its facilities and the effect on the intellectual life of this community could be far reaching.

It is expected that the Schoolcraft College will participate in presenting broadcasts

which will be received in the home. Approval of Livonia's request is still pending and action on the petition should be completed within the next two or three months.

The television report also had recommendations submitted to the Board of Education by the Advisory Committee on Instructional Television. These recommendations include intro-

tucing closed-circuit television on a limited basis in the Franklin and McKinley schools next year. This project will be care-

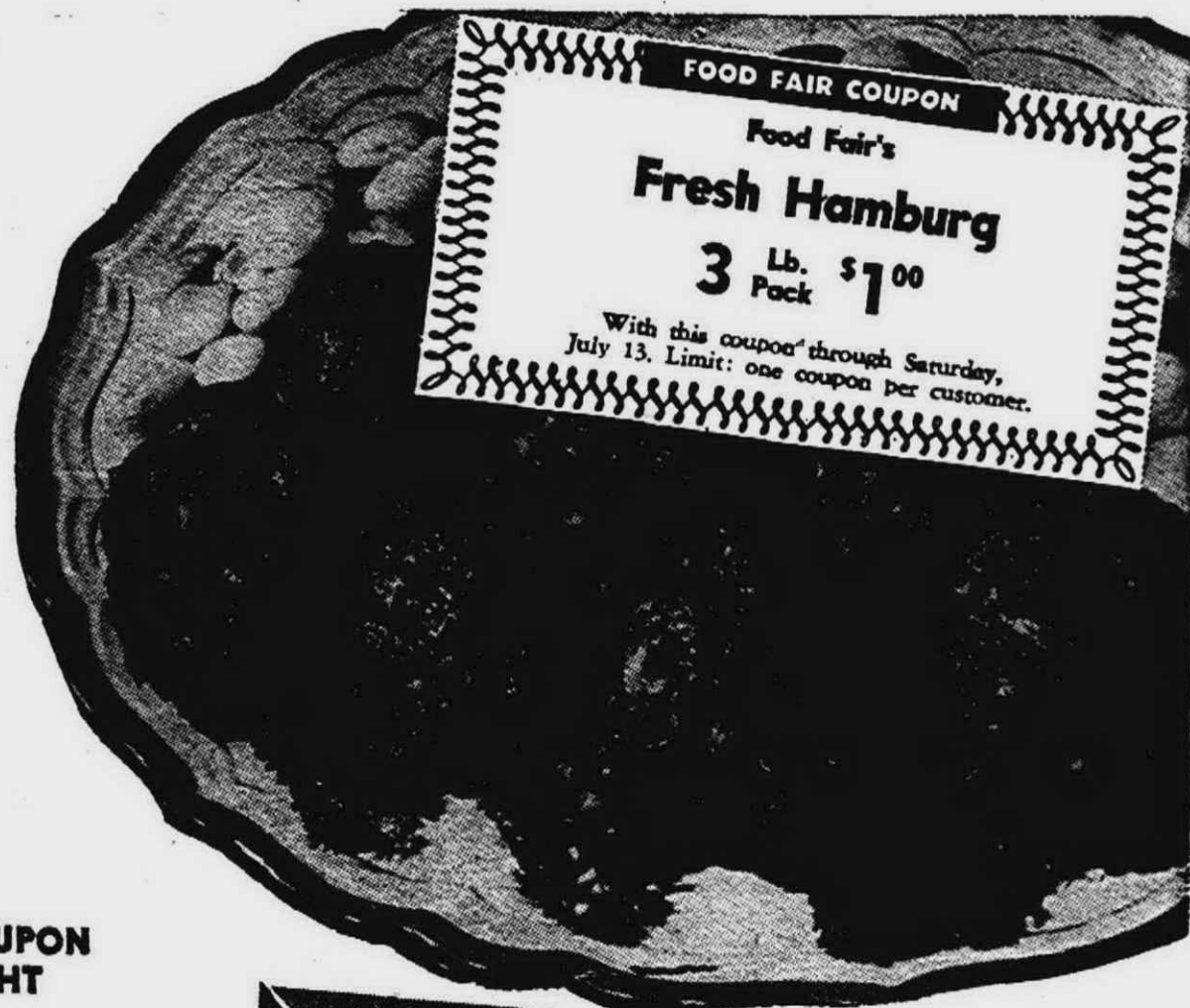
fully planned and evaluated in an attempt to assess the value of educational television in the instructional program.

### National Bank Earnings Show Marked Hike

Net operating earnings of National Bank of Detroit for the six months ended June 30, 1963 were \$8,824,969 or \$2.45 per share, it was reported by Donald F. Valley, chairman, and Henry T. Bodman, president. This compares with \$7,943,312 or \$2.21 per share in the corresponding period of 1962.

Total capital funds of the bank were \$184,967,580 on June 30, reflecting an increase of \$8,712,894 in the last 12 months.

Total resources aggregated \$2,461,098,617 and were \$149,200,542 higher than a year ago. Total deposits amounted to \$2,237,290,405, which is an increase of \$132,003,473. Savings and time deposits, excluding public funds, were \$713,150,392, and showed a gain of \$109,128,258.

Loans and mortgages at \$946,178,799 were up \$44,765,786, while holdings of U.S. securities totaling \$680,577,752 were \$81,106,766 higher, and other securities at \$305,293,734 were \$14,207,906 above the figure of June 30 last year.

# Area Firm Creates Image For New Lansing Center

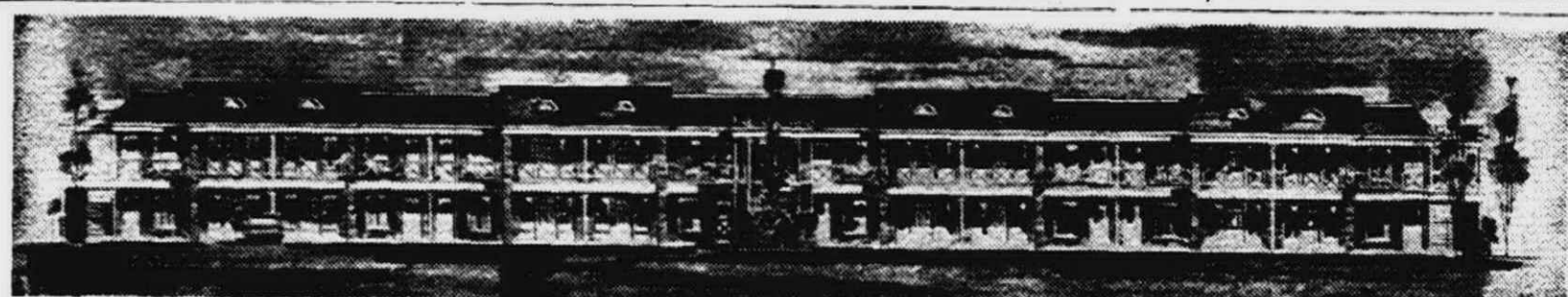
Midway Center, a new 250-acre community for industrial and research firms, has been developing in Lansing, Mich. for the past three months. Developers are the Midway Realty

Company, 2720 Pleasant Grove Road, Lansing. The project has stirred the imagination of some in the City of Livonia and Theodore L. Doman of Livonia, president of Industrial Development Consultants, is planning and promotional consultant for the new Lansing industrial center. (He also recently was engaged to develop industry in Sault Ste. Marie, Mich.)

William Forgrave, President of Midway Realty, described the new facility as: "Michigan's first fully integrated industrial district, in that it provides all the essentials of transportation, utilities, commercial services and district management required for profitable industrial operation. It incorporates today's best ideas of plant location technology."

"When completed," Forgrave said, "it will contain approximately 160 million in plants and equipment and employ more than 7,000 people."

The development, four miles from downtown, is connected to the central Lansing business district by modern multi-laned paved highways, yet is far enough removed to avoid the possibility of devaluing encroachments into its planned industrial areas. It is bounded on the south by Miller road, on the west by Pennsylvania Ave. and by Aurelius road on the east. In the plot are 61 sites in separated zones. There are 33 sites for light and medium manufacturing, two for warehousing and cold storage complete with railroad, five for distribution and eight for the essential commercial services of the district. Sites range from two to eight acres and can be combined up to 20-acre parcels if needed. A special area of 13 sites is reserved for firms engaged in Research and Development. These are in the most scenic part of the development and will provide opportunities for aesthetic plant placement and employee recreation. To insure investment protection and site and plant saleability, protective covenants are a part of every deed to Midway Center's occupants. Covenants regulate and define types of industries and permissible operations. Smoke, fumes, noise and odors are controlled by modern performance standards, acceptable by industry. Aesthetics of the development will be guaranteed through architectural controls and building material specifications. Front setbacks and side yards, storage placement, service areas and landscaping will be prescribed. No on-the-street parking will be permitted. To allow for company growth, plant-to-land occupancy will be limited to 20 percent of site size at initial construction. Maximum plant occupancy will be 50-60 percent of site, depending on nature of operation and parking requirements. Servicing the various commercial needs of the project's occupants, an eight-acre shopping complex will contain office supplies and furniture, banking facilities and needed personnel conveniences. An office plaza for accountants, advertising agencies, medical clinics, and insurance offices is part of the development.

## Western Electric Aids Firms

Mention names like Al Kaline, Gordie Howe, Bailey Howell, Milt Plum, Rocky Colavito and most lovers of sports will know all about the achievements of the aforementioned.

But pop such names as Stan Walden, Art Sterns and Bob Berg around the athletic scene . . . chances are very few will know who these men are.

Not to keep you in suspense, men like Walden, Sterns and Berg are just three of the hundreds of fathers who contribute their time to making the vast Livonia minor baseball program for boys 13 and under click in high gear.

"Say something about the minor league managers and coaches," suggested Al Rosko, director of Livonia's sports recreation program.

"They are our unsung heroes," Rosko continued. "Some of these men start way back in February to get things going for the season."

"You know we have 117 minor teams going this summer. Each team has one manager and two coaches. All of which means it takes about 350 dads to handle the clubs."

So the operator of this corner takes his hat off to all the managers and coaches of kids teams . . . not only those who guide teams in Livonia, but those who work in conjunction with the Little League programs in Plymouth and Redford Township.

Add all the teams together in the three communities and the total runs around 500. Multiply the figure by three adults in our community who give of many hours each week to make the youngsters better and healthier citizens.

Rosko added: "Don't forget the mothers either. They may not physically coach or manage. But it usually is mom who has to drive the boys to practice or to the game because dad has to rush directly from work to the diamond."

"Mom also sees to it that the boys don't go hungry. And mom always is around to cheer the boys on . . . win or lose. "Yes," added Rosko, "mothers have a great deal to do with raising the funds so necessary to stage the vast little league baseball programs."

In Livonia, the Little League Football League (yes, we said football), is responsible for organizing the teams and also purchasing the shirts and caps the players wear. The Recreation department is responsible for the administration of the program. The "Rec" supplies bats and balls, umpires and the diamonds on which the games are held.

With the opening dates for play less than two weeks away, the Livonia Department of Parks and Recreation has announced plans for the third annual Livonia Invitational golf tournament at the Idyl Wyld golf course on Five Mile Road.

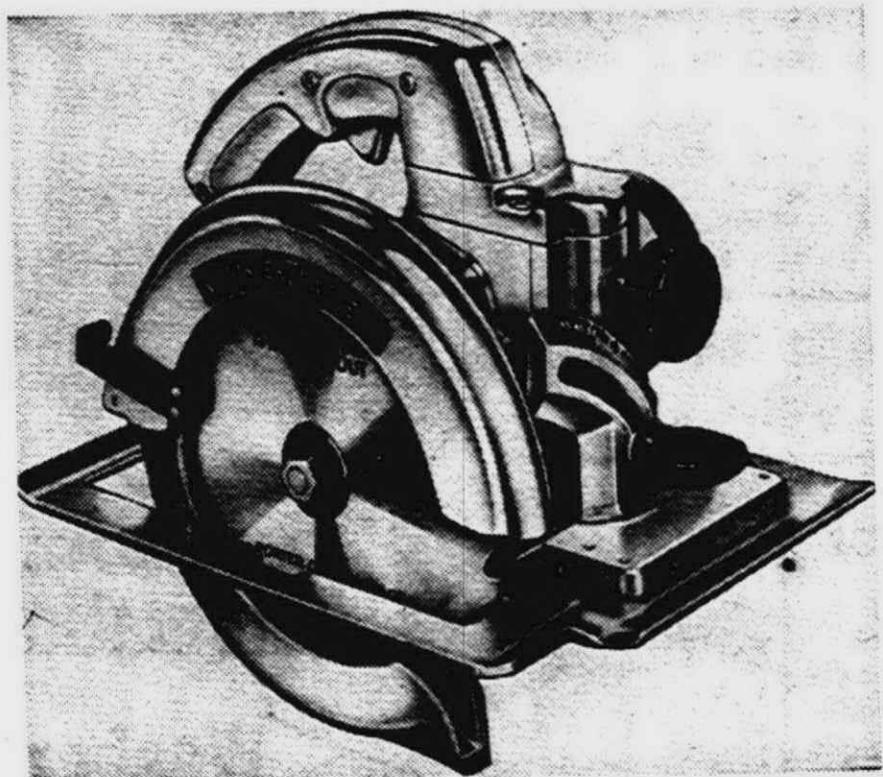

# 100 Area Witnesses at New York Assembly

David N. Hoffman, 14110 Cavell, Livonia, left by car with his family this week for an eight-day international convention of Jehovah's Witnesses scheduled for Yankee Stadium, New York, July 7-14. Mr. Hoffman is the presiding minister of the local congregation of the religious group.

A total of over 100 members of the Livonia congregation will serve as delegates at the assembly. Mr. Hoffman said delegates are traveling to New York by car, bus, train and plane. Convention officials have estimated 125,000 persons from the Eastern United States, South and Central America, Canada and the Caribbean are expected for the meeting.

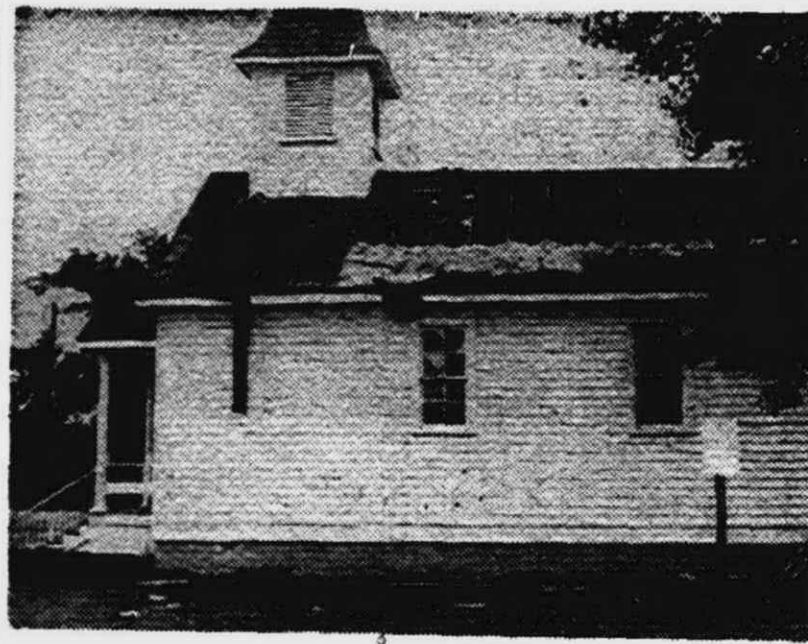
"All meetings of the local congregation will be cancelled until after the convention," Mr. Hoffman said. "Since there is no special selection of delegates for assemblies of Jehovah's witnesses, whole families attend. In most cases, the entire congregation will go. This requires suspension of our local services for the next two weeks."

Mr. Hoffman said 12,000 volunteers in New York and vicinity spent thousands of hours searching for rooming accommodations for delegates in private homes. A total of 90,000 delegates will be placed through the convention rooming department. Other volunteers are

staffing information booths throughout New York to provide conventioners with travel data, subway routes and location of accommodations in relation to the convention site.

"For thousands of the delegates it will be their first trip to New York," Mr. Hoffman said, "and members of the New York Congregations of Jehovah's witnesses will do everything possible to make our visit comfortable. This helps a great deal," he said.

"Thousands of cars are flooding the highways of the Eastern United States this week," he said, "equipped with bumper signs reading 'JEHOVAH'S WITNESSES, Yankee Stadium Assembly, New York, July 7-14. We have looked forward to this convention for many months," he concluded, "and we are anticipating a program that will instill within us a deeper appreciation of our Christian responsibilities and obligations. It should be a great aid to us as we plan our future work."



## Local Church Landmark Tumbles

A Livonia landmark that at one time represented the Church, Church School and Fellowship Hall of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, Inkster and Five Mile Rd., has been demolished to make way for a new sanctuary to be erected on this site. Although construction of the new sanctuary is still some months away, it is necessary to make preparations now to carry out the Church's long-range building plans.

The recently razed building was originally the property of the Bushnell Congregational Church located at Five Mile and Southfield Rd. in Detroit. When St. Paul's acquired the building, it was necessary to move it from its previous location in two units. It was used for the worship service until the first permanent chapel was built in 1954 at a cost of \$100,000.

In recent years this white frame landmark continued to be used for the Sunday Church School and various other meetings. Because it also housed the kitchen equipment, it will be remembered by many members for the Church dinners which seem to be a part of the Protestant tradition.

The congregation of St. Paul's was begun in 1951 with 100 members as a mission church. It was organized at that

time by the Calvin Presbyterian Church of Detroit. Each year has shown steady growth with today's congregation totalling 1,700 members and still growing.

Each Sunday approximately 1,400 youngsters of all ages attend the Church School. By way of comparison, the attendance in the Church School is about the same as that of the new Franklin High School.

The first pastor to serve St. Paul's was Rev. Charles Duffy who was killed a few months after his arrival in Livonia.

Rev. John Davies served the Church from 1952 until 1960 when Rev. William Whitledge became pastor. During this time a number of associate and assistant pastors aided in the Church's growth including Revs. Taylor, Milford and Wright.

Whereas in the beginning one minister handled the numerous duties at St. Paul's, today there are three full-time ministers: Revs. William Whi Jedge, Arnold Dalzell and Thomas Estes.

The congregation is awaiting the day when the new addition will be erected as the Church expands to serve the communities of Livonia and Redford Township, plus parts of Dearborn Township, Nankin and Farmington.

Are we striving towards an image in the educational field or true education, letting the results be not only an image but an historical fact?

Are the pupils a fixed quantity or do they vary in direct proportion to their number?

Is our material progress the result of modern education, or does our present vast store of information stem from the auto-catalytic nature of the industrial revolution?

What portion of the child's training takes place in the home or at least should?

Do some parents in an attempt to shirk family responsibilities demand too much of the school systems, and should these duties be accepted by the system, or should they be handed back to these people?

In direct reference to the reserve fund, isn't it just as feasible for the citizen to privately invest his financial reserves and earn a rate of interest, at least equal to that returned to the school district? He would thereby retain complete control until it was needed, or perhaps he may divest himself of his interests in the district and move to another.

There was an expression coined during the war that perhaps should be used quite often in deciding whether or not to spend the district's funds, I quote, "Is this trip necessary?"

Federal aid to local education, or for that matter any local project, provokes a question also. If a relatively prosperous community of two-car families such as ours, requires federal aid, where is the national government to get these funds? Is the nation at large so wealthy that we are a distressed area and entitled to a parity subsidy?

If the above questions can be answered unemotionally and to the satisfaction of the people that are asked to pay the bills, no school board will have any financial problems.
