

This is usual because, with rising taxes and costs of living, the maintenance of a single residence is getting out of hand. So, what happens? Usually this request has been granted. But multiple occupancy, sometimes entirely by renters, the office results in a min down yard and building, with loss in valuation and a down grading of the neighborhood.

A loss in valuation means loss of taxes. So the City loses two ways - in money and appearance and maybe in civic pride and morale. I don't think we are doing Plymouth any good to continue this course, especially when other ways are available to correct the problem. The Federal people call this Rehabilitation, or Conservation. There is not room here to go into very many details about this renewal of life in the older parts of the city. Possibly only a listing of some of the ways this "upgrading" can be realized can be given here.

But this subject merits serious thought and study by the City, business men and every citizen property owner in Plymouth. City planners, driving around Plymouth, have pointed out areas where they think "Urban Renewal" is indicated; with displacement of residents and rebuilding the area with new buildings. And in at least some cases they are very

I could point out one of our oldest streets, with houses probably older than I am, which presents a picture of well painted houses, well kept lawns and a general air of residential pride. Nobody did anything about this street except the citizens living there. The general appearance of this street compares with any in the newer more expensive streets in Plymouth.

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This is evidence that age doesn't necessarily mean decadence and that civic pride can show anywhere. On another of our oldest streets the City is planning concrete curb and gutter to "dress the road. This is one way which could very easily be a "spark plug" to awaken this pride in ownership or in occupancy, resulting in a "paint up, clean up, fix up" campaign. Block or neighborhood associations could do a lot in arousing interest in a better looking street.

Then, possibly, one even might live and dress to match! Who knows? Guiding our citizenry in this program for a better looking City, with renewed life for buildings and an uplift in morale due to the fresher, cleaner look to our city, might be the City itself, or the Chamber of Commerce, or the Jay-Cees, who like projects, or the other service clubs.

Of course the Federal people are ready to help with partial financing and chance for lower rates for loans for improvement. But I hope I am right in thinking that there would be much more pride and satisfaction in doing all this work here at home with local cooperation and financing.

We might as well spend our money here where it will do some good rather than to send it to Washington to send it back here - at a price. Prizes might be offered for phases of improvement in neighborhood looks - or ... you use your own imagination. The possibilities have almost no ceiling. It seems to me that an awakened civic pride sparked by such schemes would be so contagious as to be almost city wide. Who knows what new businesses or plants might be lured to Plymouth by such a "new look".

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


