Since then, four members of the Commission have retired-Mayor Robert Sincock. Marvin Terry, Carl Shear and William Hartmann-and the reservoir matter has been allowed to sit dormant in the press of other business.

The four retiring Commissioners were replaced by Arch Vallier, George Lawton, Robert Smith and James Jabara, all freshmen and all carefully feeling their way before taking

However, the reservoir decision was brought to a head two weeks ago when Vallier demanded that it be placed on the agenda for the Aug. 5 meeting for discussion and action.

At the moment, the Commission appears to be split by a 4-3 vote on the proposal-three commissioners, Mayor Richard Wernette, James Houk and Vallier in favor while Robert Beyer, Lawton, Smith and Jabara are against immediate action pending additional study.

The reservoir became a major issue at the recent meeting between the Commission and Plymouth Township's Board which presumably was called to informally discuss the water

The Township contracted for Detroit water two years ago and Supervisor Roy Lindsay told the Commission his group was very happy with the change from "well water."

He indicated the Township has no problems with rust and only minor problems with pressure. It was the latter that attracted the attention of the Commissioners.

Lindsay and Township Engineer Herald Hamill admitted that there had been a pressure problem during the lengthy dry spell in early July and the Township had to tap into its own wells to maintain a constant flow. This situation existed for only a day or so.

Inasmuch as the Commission has been looking into the Detroit water situation. especially since Detroit Water Board General Manager Gerald Remus proposed that Plymouth and adjoining communities join the system, the pressure problem hit home.

Cuts were made in the reading. foreign language, and athletic programs; also in home economics, industrial arts, physical education, consultant staff, maintenance, and last, but far from least, the science coordinator who left a year ago, was not replaced.

The three mills will not buy back what we have already lost, but it guarantees that we will keep that which we now have. We don't have the best, but let's keep it good!

The third high school and addition to Bentley must be built as we will be 1,475 over capacity in 1966. Our present high school capacity is 3,960yet the enrollments will be 4,500 in '64, 4,845 in '65 and 5,475 in '66. On the basis of these figures we can see the need for supporting the school bond issue.

In a comparison of 62 metropolitan schools Livonia ranks second on membership. Our administrative costs per pupil were lower than that of 43 other schools-less than 3% of our budget. Our instructional costs were lower than 18 other schools. Our operation costs were lower than 31 schools. Our maintenance costs took less than 3% of our budget and we ranked 28th in the comparison with other schools.

These facts speak for themselves. It's imperative that we all get out and support our schools on August 5th. No threats have been made but it should be obvious to all that something is going to give way if the two propositions on the ballot are not passed.

"Building school pride took some time. Very often, those who came from Bentley mumbled out: 'That's the way they do it over there (meaning Bentley)'. And, even, now, you still hear such statements made.

"We were kicked around trying to find a spot to call home for practicing football during the first five or six weeks. We went from one place to another to work out and played over at Bentley. Once we got our own practice grounds, you could sense immediately a change in the attitude of the players. Having their own home made a

"And it was the same in basketball. Once the gym was our's, the story altered 100 per cent."

And, what about the future? Hudnut took issue with statements that Franklin should prosper in sports because more and better athletes reside in Livonia's South End (Franklin's district) than in the area which feeds pupils to Bentley.

"I used to hear such talk about the South End kids being better athletes while I was at Bentley," explained Hudnut. "But when you stopped to analyze matters you discovered that we had more pupils coming from the south side to Bentley because there were more junior highs shooting in pupils from that particular side of town.

"The way I see it, there are good kids, athletically speaking, all around the city of Livonia. You'll find that as the years pass that the cycle will shift. Bentley will have its fine teams, then Franklin will. Some years both teams may be 'up' together. But, it's ridiculous for anybody to think that either team will constantly dominate the Livonia

"Going into our new league (with Thurston, N. Farmington, Birmingham Groves and Oak Park) should make a great deal of difference. When you play an independent schedule, you lose a game or two and there doesn't seem to be much for which you can shoot

The subject of rivalries came up . . . and, surprisingly, so far our kids seem to have built up something special with North Farmington. You might have thought it might be with Bentley, whom we'll meet in every sport, but it doesn't look like that's the way it will be.

Personnel wise, said Hudnut, Franklin should be in great shape next year. "We'll have everybody back. We don't lose anybody

because we don't have anybody graduating. Of course, it's possible we might lose a boy who moves away, or a kid becomes ineligible."

In general, one left Hudnut with the impression that as time goes on Franklin high will be heard from around the sports world



'Curtain Going Up'

"Anything Goes" at the Vanguard opened a busy week for your peripatetic drama critic. And anything did go in this spicy, but nice musical. The songs by Cole Porter had a brilliant lilt to them. Bill Feaster, Rennie Lee, John Gregory, and Warren Colster performed superbly. In fact, John Gregory was as close to perfection in his role of Billy Crocker as you'll ever see him. Warren Colston as Public Enemy Number 13 added to the original touches given the role years ago by Victor Moore. Before the evening ended you were convinced that Moonface Money was a living, lovable character. And Mr. Colston can take extra credit for making the evening such an entertaining one. Edward Shelton's staging of the musical added zip and dash. Never was there a dull moment. The "Let's Misbehave" number with Helen Alexander and Tom Pazik stopped the show cold in the second Act. The entire show is simply gorgeous and plays havoc with your funny bone. Here's a musical comedy that stresses funny lines. Call WO 3-3863 for tickets to an evening of fun in a wonderfully air-conditioned theater. "Anything Goes" is just the right type of hilarity for some of these sodden, high-humidity evenings. I'm hoping that Bill Gregory keeps this show running beyond the intended August 10 closing date. It deserves to be seen by all of Detroit.

The Windsor International Festival of fine plays came next on the schedule. Mr. Wayne Martens and Jonathan Knopf have assembled an excellent group of New York actors to perform some mighty difficult plays. "O Mistress Mine," a Terrence Rattigan play that featured the Lunts some years ago, occupied the bill last week. Jerry Ritzer stole the show with ease away from Yvonne Doolittle and Philip Baker Hall, although I will admit that Phil Hall didn't give in without a struggle. His deep, resonant voice did much to convince the audience that Sir John Fletcher was an important figure in British government. Biggest flaw of the evening was avoiding the obvious "updating" of the play. "O Mistress Mine" came out shortly after World War II and concerns itself with the manufacture of tanks and a governmental official that dallys a bit with another woman in preference to his own mate who in turn has a few men on the string. The present scandal over Christine Keeler and Mr. Profumo zooms this play into sharp focus. Sir John Fletcher might have been working on a space ship and Michael Brown's girl friend could have been called Christine. Additions of this nature wouldn't harm the basic comedy line so aptly scribed by Mr. Rattigan. Mark Schoenberg's direction for a jolly play of this nature was far too static. The stage should have been filled with bristling movement for a bright, witty comedy such as "O Mistress Mine." Too often during the evening the action dragged. Here is where an inventive director takes over and makes the play continue its headlong plunge to the next brilliant situation.

The Cleary Auditorium in Windsor is the real star of the evening. The acoustics are perfect. The view from the lobby is a perpetual joy. The sweep and magnificence of the Detroit River with the skyline is an intermission feature that is the delight of delights. Go to "Gideon" or "Shot In The Dark" in the coming weeks. Take time to enjoy a fine dinner at the Top Hat Club in Windsor before or after the show as we did. I'm sure Mr. Martens will present livelier productions in the weeks to come.

The Fifth Annual Detroit Summer Repertory swung into view on Thursday evening. As usual the Repertory group gave a highly competent professional performance of a Shaw play, "Captain Brasshound's Conversion." This wonderfully funny Shaw play had the engaging services of Seamus O'Brien and Mary Lee Brownlee to keep the audience in high spirits. Pat McElroy as Captain Kearney did an outstanding bit of character work in Act III. He stopped the show for old Wally with this uproariously perfect portrayal of a navy captain beset by a charming woman who has taken over. Robert Hachlinski's Sir Howard Hallam was a masterful job of underplaying for top comic effects. Bob's experience with the U of D group came through on many occasions and helped make "Brasshound's Conversion" a most successful riot of laughs, James Rodgers continues in the tradition out at U of D as a stager par excellence of any work by G. B. Shaw. Year after year, five to be exact, the U of D under the able tutelage of Evelyn MacQueen has been able to come up with some glittering, professional productions of works by G. B. Shaw. Once again I doff my cap to the U of D players for a most enjoyable, rewarding evening in their summer ten theater.

Late in the week after seeing many fine productions I ended my travels at the Quirk Theater and "She Stoops to Conquer". This 1773 comedy is not the easiest theatrical venture to stage. "Stoops to Conquer" calls for imagination and great inventiveness since the play is quite verbose. First task for a director would be to cut down the number of speeches drastically. Since this play appeared (1773) soon after the theater had been closed for a number of years by Cromwell, the length of a play tended to be a bit long. Most of the patrons were so starved for plays they didn't mind a lengthy evening in the theater. Many of the references that were topical surely could have been eliminated from this version of "She Stoops". Most high schools when they do this play eliminate the garden scene and the tavern scene to keep the "two hour traffic" upon the stage to its minimum time schedule. George Bird, designer and stager of this production, gave us the full length un-cut version of "She Stoops".

Such a spectacular version would have been acceptable had he moved the actors with the ease and fluidity that a Tyrone Guthrie might have. But no, the actors seldom cris-crossed themselves in frantic action. Chairs, davenports and other objects for the posterior were well-depressed by the end of the performance. Too much sitting and lack of movement made old Wally retitle this EMU production, "She Stood Stock-Still To Conquer".

In spite of these technical difficulties Marshall Borden managed to show a continual spontaneous brand of humor as he approached his role of Mr. Hardcastle with rich inventiveness. Patrick Connelly, Karen Forester, and Marti Virtue turned in more than adequate performances as they struggled to make the production move in a more lively fashion. Tony Lumpkin as played by Maraman Glossenger lacked a certain whirlwind quality that would have saved the show. Mr. Glossenger needed an impishness, a twinkle in his eye, and a laugh that sounded at least sincere. His approach to the part was all sound and fury. To be funny you must win the audience over by naturalness and a sense of credibility. Biggest mistake of the evening was that the actors seldom took the audience into their confidence and let them share the delightful zany happenings at the Hardcastle
