

The christening took the form of a pseudo-authentic Hawaiian Luau, complete with swaying mock palm trees, Island music, hula dancers and native punch.


After a fun-filled dip in Merriam's new pool, the club members feasted on pot-luck foods, all of which were made to resemble Hawaiian specialities.

Thanks to members of the Plymouth Dentists' Association, football players at Plymouth High this fall should all be wearing personally-fitted mouth-pieces, instead of the looser commercial ones that seldom stay snugly in place.

Made of a soft, but durable, rubber substance called "neo prene," the mouth-pieces are so designed as to virtually eliminate all threat of damage to teen-age teeth that might other-wise result from the rigors of football's ordinary body contact. And if there's a Plymouth High gridder who takes the field without first obtaining one of these personally-fitted teeth-guards, he's missing a solid bet.

Local dentists are literally donating their time and services in order to make the project a successful one. As a result, each gridder will be required to pay next to nothing for a

mouth-piece that is tailor-made for his chomper Exact cost to each player "will not exceed \$1.50," according to one of the dentists who engineered the program. Even the most expensive commercial mouth-piece sells for about \$1.75, and it seldom fits really well enough to do the best job The program has the sanction of Plymouth High athletic director John Sandmann and varsity football coach Mike

A year ago, the Michigan High School Athletic Associa-tion decreed that all prep gridders must wear mouth-pieces. The commercial ones, made of resilient rubber, come in three sizes. They're similar — if not identical — to the ones that boxers and wrestlers wear, but they are no hard-and-fast guarantee against the possibility of chipped or even broken

One of the few growers boasting a storage cooler is the Palmer family. When cross country vans aren't available for late afternoon loading the iced bags of corn are placed in the cooler and held over night for early morning shipment. Here Richard and Russell Palmer stack their cooler high with the days surplus picking keeping it fieldfresh for delivery to the market the next morning.

According to Wayne County Agricultural Agent, Edgar Kidd, there are usually about 2,500 acres planted to sweet corn in this area each year. Average yield is about 200 to 300 five dozen ear sacks per acre and the sacks sell wholesale from the farms at \$1.25 each. Corn growing is not an easy job, says Mr. Kidd, and in addition to having available the valuable, fertile land the modern grower needs expensive field equipment, an excellent fertilization program and now, today, cooling facilities.

These same fields when used in rotation, says Mr. Kidd, also produce some of America's finest cantalopes, another product for which this area is noted, in fact there is no doubt, says the agent, but what Michigan's best melons and sweet corn are grown in and around Plymouth. Interestingly enough corn growing isn't the only activity of these industrious farmers. Most have large herds of cattle and do general farming along with their corn growing.
